

DRIVERS STILL USING PHONES

BIGGEST ROAD SAFETY ISSUE

RACV poll has revealed that many Victorians consider drivers using phones as one of their biggest road safety concerns.

The latest figures from the Victorian Government reveal over 17 million dollars in fines were issued to drivers for breaching the distracted driving rules during the first six months of enforcement from detection cameras introduced in July last year.

From 1 July to 30 December 2023, 30,231 drivers were captured by the cameras, with drivers facing penalties of four demerit points and a fine of \$577 for using a mobile device, including phones, when driving.

RACV Head of Policy James Williams said the distracted driving rules aimed to keep road users safe, reflecting the significant increase in technologies capable of distracting drivers.

"The RACV poll highlights that Victorians are still noticing people using their phones or devices while driving and they have highlighted it as their top safety concern on our roads,"

"Distracted driving is a major contributor to road crashes and we all need to do our part and make sure we put our devices away and concentrate on driving safely.

"This poll and the data from distracted driver cameras, highlights that we still need to focus on educating drivers about this rule — which, put simply, generally means don't touch your unmounted or wearable device while you're driving or sitting in traffic." Mr Williams said.



REMINDER: What drivers or riders who hold a full licence need to know about the road rules for portable devices

Don't touch your unmounted or wearable device while you're driving or riding – this includes cars, motorbikes, bicycles, e-scooters and even rollerblades.

Drivers may briefly touch a mounted device or inbuilt system for functions such as music and navigation, provided they are not entering text, scrolling, or viewing images, social media, websites, or videos.

For wearable devices such as smart watches, you can't touch the device while driving or riding. You can only use voice controls to initiate, accept or reject audio calls, play, or stream audio materials, or adjust volume levels.

For mobile phones and tablets, the mounting must be commercially designed and manufactured for that purpose, and the device must be secured in the mounting.



New toilet facilities for Rene Fox Gardens

The upgrade to the Rene Fox Gardens public toilet facilities will start soon.



We were recently granted Heritage Victoria approval for the project and the tender for the contract has been awarded to Masterson Builders following a public tender process.

The \$211,000 project is fully funded by Council and will deliver:

- upgraded disabled toilet to comply with current standards
- ♦ full refresh of the male and female toilets
- ◊ replacement of the existing roof
- replacement of the existing crushed rock with exposed aggregate throughout the Gardens.

The project is expected to be completed late June.

LOCAL LAWS

Nature Strip Parking

A reminder from our Compliance Team that Victorian law prohibits parking of vehicles on nature strips throughout our Shire.

Parking on nature strips can cause damage to utilities and their access points, impede access for utility companies and even obstruct emergency services. It can also be a danger to pedestrians and motorists. Plus it can be expensive, with a range of fines up to \$600. Trailers, cars, caravans, boats, campers - any vehicle except a bicycle, is not allowed on a nature strip.

A HALF RING By Velay Friggell




Sitting engrossed in the Sunday paper puzzles I was startled to hear the doorbell. Strangely it was only half a ring.








It all began last February when Michelle Ross and John Tully got together and launched their first video for their YouTube Channel, Victorian History Adventures.

The channel will focus on lesser known stories that most people are unaware of or tales with a twist including early explorers, unexplained mysteries, murders and of course, the Gold Rush.

Michelle Ross, who created the successful Goldfields Guide website and YouTube Channel for several years, had always been fascinated by Gold Rush mining stories, often heading out to the bush with her kids. As Serendipity would have it, respected historian John Tully as an authority on the Gold Rush, participated in several of Michellee's videos and when she proposed a new history channel, the germ of - Victorian History Adventures came to life.

Michelle confirmed that the story ideas are usually John's as he has an extraordinary knowledge of Gold Mining History and the Goldfields region and her role is to bring them to life on screen. John saw the new Channel as an opportunity to showcase some of the fascinating stories from history we have in Victoria.

"Michelle and I are concentrating on lesser known stories so there is always

something interesting to learn.

"History is important. Those in power that ignore history will make the same mistakes and we the majority are the ones who will suffer. Michelle added, "It is very important for everyone to be educated on our local

history — otherwise, how do we progress as a society."

John believes that the channel would boost tourism interest and visitation.

"I have no doubt that tourists will want to come and look at some of the places we film. Some of the sensitive places we are not releasing their locations but there will be plenty of other places that will receive increased visitation" he concluded.



ith over 47,900 registered beekeepers who own approximately 855,300 hives, keeping Australia's honey bee population healthy is no mean feat.

'Bee Pest Blitz' is an annual month-long national campaign to increase awareness of the importance of bee biosecurity and encourage beekeepers to inspect their hives for high priority exotic and established pests.

Launched in 2023, the annual campaign calls on all Australian honey bee beekeepers to undertake biosecurity surveillance activities.

"Surveillance is key to the timely detection of new pests and provides the best chance for industries and governments to respond before pests become established and widespread," Sarah Hilton, Bee Biosecurity Manager at Plant Health Australia said.

Under the Honey Bee Industry Code of Practice bee-

keepers are required to inspect their hives twice per year, using a method that looks for the presence of arthropod pests, including Varroa spp. (varroa) and Tropilaelaps spp. (tropilaelaps) mites.

By participating in 'Bee Pest Blitz' beekeepers will fulfil one of their annual bee biosecurity obligations and requirements.

This time of the year is ideal to conduct hive inspections which are crucial for the early detection of exotic and reporting of high priority established bee pests. Beekeepers are asked to keep samples of suspected pests and report their findings via the Exotic Plant Pest Hotline 1800 084 881.

Surveillance reporting will be handled at a jurisdictional level and all personal information will be kept confidential.

"Maintaining honey bee health and sustainable bee populations is essential for the future production of Australian honey and supporting those agricultural sectors that depend on honey bee pollination services," Sarah said.

'Bee Pest Blitz' is a Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (DAFF) funded initiative, led by PHA, and supported by the Australian Honey Bee Industry Council and all state and territory governments. Visit beepestblitz.com.au for free surveillance


