FLYING THE CFA FLAG FOR DUNOLLY

Two teams of Dunolly Fire Brigade members participated in the 60th Senior VFBV State Rural Championships held at Colac on 2 April 2016.

Dunolly A team – Martin, Cameron, Taylor and Elliott Gale and Jayne Young competed in the B Division, consisting of 25 competing teams.

Dunolly B team – Daniel Christensen, Amy Holloway Coaker, Megan Bond, Maree and Elliott Gale competed in the C Division, consisting of 26 competing teams.

Events conducted included: Low Down Pump and Ladder (5 competitors), Hydrant 7 and Tanker (4 competitors), Hose and Ladder (4 competitors), Tanker- Hose, Reel and Ladder (5 competitors), Tanker-Priming, Pumping and Ladder (4 competitors) and Tanker – Drawing Water from Tank (4 competitors).

Congratulations to the Dunolly A Team who placed

third in the Tanker – Drawing water from Tank event. The event requires the connection of two hoses to the pump and three targets to be struck. The first target is struck and then the second, but not before the first outlet has been cut off. The second hose is then uncoupled and connected to the end of the first hose, run out and the third target located further down the track is then activated.

Unfortunately this year Dunolly was unable to register junior teams in the 11-13 and 11-15 years age groups due to a current deficit of junior members.

CFA Championships

On Sunday 28 of February the Region 19 Rural Championship Committee ran their annual CFA Rural Demonstration Championships at the Dunolly Delidio Recreation Reserve. This year Dunolly had two senior teams entered into the championships, and they were all set to make the most of their home ground advantage. With a total of six events, and 11 other senior teams to compete against, the day was set to be a fantastic competition.

The first event was the Hydrant and Tanker for four people. Both Dunolly teams made it through without a disqualification but, unfortunately, were no match for the ever-so-slick Beazleys Bridge A team, who completed the event in a record breaking 21.94 seconds.

Beazleys Bridge A continued their record breaking streak in the second event, Tanker Hose Reel and Ladder for five people, smashing the previous record by three seconds. Both Dunolly teams had good clear runs narrowly missing a placing in the event.

The Dunolly A team found their form in the third event, the Wet Hose and Ladder for four people, coming 3rd in the event, with 0.1 of a second separating them from the 2nd place winners Beazleys Bridge and 0.4 seconds between them and first place winners Mandurang A, who narrowly missed beating the record which was set by Dunolly in 2014.

Dunolly continued their good form in the fourth event, Priming Pumping and Ladder for four people, receiving a 4th place, with Mandurang A taking out the event in 23.27 seconds. The fifth event, The Low Down Pump and Ladder for five people, saw Dunolly receive another 4th placing, with the event being taken out by Beazleys Bridge by another record breaking time.

The final event for the day, Tanker drawing water from Tanker for 4 people, was another close event but unfortunately Dunolly missed out on a placing by only a whisker, with Beazleys Bridge and Huntly taking out the placings.

The final aggregate trophy was convincingly won by Beazleys Bridge with a total score of 80 points with runners up being won by Mandurang with a total of 56 points. Dunolly came in at fourth place overall, proving it was another successful day on the track for the brigade. Unfortunately Dunolly were unable to put together any inner teams for this year season and are currently in the

junior teams for this year season and are currently in the process of recruiting new junior members between the ages of 11 and 15 years.

This means that no local family will be excluded from attending the only playgroup in our town. At times, this has been a gruelling campaign for us, and I would like to thank a few people for their ongoing support. Thank you to Costa Di Biase for writing to the Minister, and for his interest in our efforts. Thank you to Fiona Lindsay for her role as mentor to our group. Fiona

Dunolly Supported Playgroup

Extract from Parliamentary Debate from the office of Louise Staley

My adjournment matter is for the Minister for Families and Children in the other place. The action I seek is that she directs her department to implement the proposed trial of an integrated supported playgroup for all children in Dunolly. Over the past few months there have been a number of conversations between members of her department, the Central Goldfields Shire and the Dunolly Reference Group for the playgroup as to how they can structure a different model than the government has introduced for supported playgroups. The new model requires that supported playgroups are only available to healthcare card holders. In Dunolly there is only one playgroup, and if that model were introduced in Dunolly that would mean that there would be no playgroup because there are insufficient healthcare card holders to have a supported playgroup. It also means that the other parents would also miss out. The council and the department had come to agreement on an idea that Dunolly could have a trial of a new model that would allow healthcare card holders to gain places first and if there were any places left in the playgroup after all healthcare card holders had received a place, then nonhealthcare card holders could also receive a place. Dunolly is a rural community in severe drought, but because of the structure of many people's farms they are not available to get a healthcare card even though they have an exceptionally low income due to the drought. As a result it is many of these parents who face the challenge of not being able to create a community-run playgroup but want to seek to continue to access a supported playgroup, which is what they have at the moment. The minister turned up in Dunolly unannounced the Friday before last. The playgroup thought that she was there to announce the final fix in this trial, but instead she reiterated some fairly tired rhetoric that suggested to them that in fact she had not heard anything about this proposed trial. The purpose of her visit was and remains a complete mystery to them. These parents have worked very hard to communicate through to government and to their council what they need and how they can make this work, and I would really call on the minister to get herself across this and save this playgroup. Time is running out. They have only got, they believe, until the beginning of April for it all to be settled for next year, so it is time she got on with it.

Letter from Jenny Mikakos MP

Dear Ms Raczynski

Thank you again for taking the time to write to me regarding the Dunolly Supported Playgroup.

The Department of Education and Training (the Department) and the Shire has had a number of meetings with local parents about a potential transition approach.

On 26 February 2016, I visited Dunolly Kindergarten, having invited families who attend the playgroup to meet with me to discuss the community's needs. We had a very productive conversation and after the meeting I asked the Department to consider a more enduring approach to respond to the issues raised about operating a supported playgroup in a town like Dunolly.

I am pleased to let you know that at my request, the Department has developed a more inclusive and flexible approach to eligibility in small rural communities where there are limited alternative support services. I understand this has been communicated to the Shire of Central Goldfields, which means that both eligible and non-eligible families can continue to attend the Supported Playgroup at Dunolly.

All families have been invited to continue to attend the Supported Playgroup and the Shire of Central Goldfields has agreed to work to engage families experiencing disadvantage who are not currently attending the Supported Playgroup and prioritise access for families holding Health Care Cards,. If needed, the Shire has adequate funding to commence operating a second Supported Playgroup in Dunolly.

Bealiba Silo


It is many years since the siding at Bealiba was last used. Once it was a hub of activity with wood, wool and grain being transported to market, and contractors could have difficulty ordering railway trucks in a timely fashion. The wheat silo was built in 1960 and the precinct was the scene of a near fatal accident a few years later. Worker Mr W Kellett fell and was almost fully buried in oats. Fortunately Maurie Hunt and Noel Milley were at the

scene and reacted very quickly and bravely to rescue him. Such accidents happened, probably yearly, at silos across the state and were often fatal. The buildings were all locked, motors removed and stairs sealed for safety when the silo was decommissioned years ago. Now they sit quietly, gently rusting in the April sun.

FLYING WAS HIS PASSION

The ongoing story of Maurice Butler's love of flying

On our overseas trip in the first half of 1974 Maurice took every opportunity to keep his flying expertise current. While spending two weeks in the North Island of New Zealand with both our lovely mothers and Maurice's sister, we drove into Masterton Airport and he did circuits with an instructor. At Gisborne Airport he did more circuits and stalls with an instructor. At New Plymouth Airport he asked if we could fly with an instructor to Mount Egmont, 8,260 feet, nearby - higher than Mt Kosciusko, Australia's highest mountain. I had received

my restricted licence in December 1973 and Maurice graciously let me fly. What a spectacular flight with magnificent scenery – beauty is everywhere. The flying school gave me my wings.



The purpose of the north island

trip was to visit Kerikeri as Maurice's parents had donated a plaque for the Reverend John Gare Butler in St James church which he'd set up there in 1829. The present wooden church was built about 1874 on the same position. Sadly Maurice senior died in 1970, but the family were anxious to visit. Since then Maurice's son Ian married a delightful New Zealander and their children too have also been to visit. We left our folks to visit the South Island and more Butlers from the family tree.

In the USA we were lucky enough to stay with the parents of two husband and wife teams who came to Watsonia High School in 1972-3 when Victoria was so short of teachers. They were all such good value to our education system and basketball certainly took off. In Arcata California Maurice took mother Charlotte, who had stayed in Sydney with my mother, teachers Muffy and Garry for a scenic flight which they loved. While we were staying at the university campus in Boulder Colorado at the base of the Rockies, Maurice took a flight with an instructor and really worked hard controlling that Beechcraft in the rotors coming off the Alps. Now that really is spectacular scenery and we thoroughly enjoyed their ski resorts too.

His next flights were in Great Britain. He did a flight check at Fairoaks Aero Club doing stalls, spins and circuits but the weather was not suitable for a flight around the islands, so we came back three days later in beautiful sunshine and the Chief Flying Instructor pulled rank on his staff as he wanted the flight, ha! Taking off from Glasgow we headed for the islands; it was a grand The islands of Islay and Arran were so lush. CPR by neighbours saves Waanyarra man



A local Waanyarra man, aged in his 60s, suffered a sudden cardiac arrest at his home, back in December last year. Living in quite a remote and isolated area, the patient's wife called Triple-Zero and also reached out to her two neighbours for help, who were quickly on the scene.

The two neighbours, quickly initiated effective CPR, and continued until paramedics arrived at the scene. The paramedics couldn't be more

thankful to the two neighbours who rushed to the aid of the patient, using their wonderful CPR. Both women did a fantastic job.

The patient was flown to Melbourne, and is now back home in Waanyarra recovering well.

The patient and his family will be reunited with the two neighbours - and for the first time - the patient will be meeting the paramedics who attended to him when he was unwell.

The patient's nephew is actually a Melbourne-based paramedic. He will also be at the reunion with his family and is also looking forward to meeting the local paramedics and also the two neighbours, who attended his uncle's case.

This story serves as a perfect example of how important bystanders are and how critical early CPR is when somebody suffers a cardiac arrest.

The case also demonstrates the important point that, "bystanders are the critical first link in the 'chain of survival' and can help keep patients alive before our highly-trained paramedics arrive," as stated by Ambulance Victoria Research and Evaluation Manager, Dr Karen Smith.

The 'chain of survival' is a process which can help save the lives of people in sudden cardiac arrest. A MICA paramedic will be in attendance on Friday 8 April in Waanyarra at 2pm, to talk about the 'chain of survival' and also to chat about the case and the great work of the bystanders.

One of the bystanders is also happy to chat about her first time doing CPR - and saving a life.

For further information on the importance of early CPR and the fact that many more bystanders are actually stepping in and saving lives should they see someone suffer a cardiac arrest, please see the media release attached.

It was released on February 26 and discusses how bystander CPR rates have reached a record high in Victoria.

Bystander CPR rates reach record high

More bystanders than ever are stepping in to help save lives if they see someone collapse in cardiac arrest, according to the latest Victorian Ambulance Cardiac Arrest Registry (VACAR) Annual Report.

The VACAR Annual Report, released today, found a record 64 per cent of onlookers attempted CPR if they witnessed someone collapse in cardiac arrest. In 2005-06 the rate was 35 per cent.

It also found bystanders used Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) on patients in a shockable rhythm 70 times in 2014-15, a six-fold increase on the 10 times AEDs were used in 2005-06. Lead researcher and Ambulance Victoria Research and Evaluation Manager Dr Karen Smith said minutes mattered in cardiac arrest, and the sooner a person received CPR and application of a defibrillator the better their chances of survival.

'Bystanders are the critical first link in the chain of survival

and can help keep patients alive before our highly-trained paramedics arrive,' Dr Smith said.

Patients who received bystander CPR were much more likely to be found in a shockable rhythm, the cardiac rhythm most favourable to survival.

`But in a third of cases where a bystander sees someone collapse they don't do CPR. We know any CPR is better than no CPR so we would encourage the community to call Triple Zero for an ambulance and start CPR. The Triple Zero call-taker will provide instructions on how to do this.' Dr Smith said Ambulance Victoria had a comprehensive research program which aimed to improve patient care and outcomes.

'The VACAR Annual Report is the cornerstone of our research program. It paints a comprehensive picture of cardiac arrest in Victoria and is internationally-recognised,' Dr Smith said.

'We are one of the few out-of-hospital cardiac arrest registries to routinely follow up on survivors' quality of life. The report shows 77 per cent of patients who were working prior to their cardiac arrest returned to work within a year.

'Our research program also involves supporting paramedics studying for PhDs and contributing to international journals.'

Despite continued growth in demand for ambulance, the 2014-15 VACAR Annual Report showed:

- Emergency responders attended 5,657 out-of-hospital cardiac arrests in the 12 months to 30 June 2015.
- Cardiac arrest patients who received an electric shock with an AED were most likely to be discharged from hospital alive if a bystander delivered the shock. Almost half (49 per cent) of patients shocked by bystanders were discharged from hospital alive compared with 40 per cent by first responders and 26 per cent by paramedics. This was mostly likely due to bystanders being early on the scene and time to defibrillation being a critical factor in out-of-hospital cardiac arrest survival.
- More than a third (35 per cent) of patients in metropolitan areas who were seen to collapse, found in a shockable rhythm and then received resuscitation by emergency services survived. In comparison, London's survival rates for people in the same situation is 31 per cent.
- Median response times to cases receiving an attempted resuscitation in regional Victoria improved from 11.5 minutes in 13-14 to 10.2 minutes in 14-15, while they remained steady in the metropolitan region at 7.5 minutes.

Ambulance Victoria Acting General Manager Emergency Operations Mick Stephenson said MICA paramedics in Melbourne and Geelong recently starting to carry a mechanical CPR machine was another example of trying to improve cardiac arrest survival rates.

'We are also expanding our Emergency Medical Response (EMR) program to include more Country Fire Authority (CFA) brigades following a successful trial. The program has been in Melbourne for almost two decades and sees trained firefighters and paramedics dispatched to cases simultaneously,' Mr Stephenson said.

'We are also going to focus on engaging with rural communities to improve early CPR and defibrillation response.

'We'll use our data and work with stakeholders to identify suitable towns for this initiative, which was recommended in the Ambulance Performance and Policy Consultative Committee report, released late last year.

`There will be 1000 extra AEDs in the community in the next four years, with the first 100 recipients of the government's defibrillator program for sporting clubs announced earlier this month.

`The community can also purchase AEDs. These machines can save lives and you don't need any training or special skills to use them.

Owning a dog is not the same as being a fish-fancier, for example. Although, come to think of it, whenever I arrived home the goldfish greeted my presence with enthusiasm. They raced up and down, eyes bulging, mouths agape, in much the same fashion as my father's dog, Fred. His tail beat nineteen to the dozen and the fish couldn't compete in that department.

Fred was a friendly canine, but I think he suffered from Short Dog Syndrome. He either didn't realize his compactness of stature or resented it. Big dogs, enormous buck kangaroos, towering humans - they were all fair game for Fred's 'I'll have ya' attitude. He wasn't aggressive by any means; anything unfamiliar was a welcome challenge. There was another storm, of sorts, when Fred died. My father had never owned a dog until he was well into his forties. I think the dislocation brought on a heart attack of his own. There was the subsequent rush of the ambulance and a lengthy stay in the Alfred Hospital in Melbourne. He survived, but he could never allow himself to care that deeply for a dog again.



Extracts from the newsletter of the Goldfields

TRACING ANCESTORS ON THE GOLDFIELDS

The first in a series on different subjects of interest to family historians.

Births

Many people start their family history by searching the birth, death and marriage indexes. When they get back to the goldfields era they often locate their ancestor by where their children were born. This gives a snapshot of where they lived every two years or so. There is a problem with relying on just the indexes. The location given is not the birthplace but the district of registration. A good researcher will obtain full certificates to confirm birthplace, address of the parents and registration place.

Births were to be registered within three months of the birth. In a miner's life three months can be a different rush. Sometimes whilst travelling from one rush to another the family stopped at a place and registered the birth. So they may never have even lived in the area. Looking through births registered in Dunolly we see children born in Wedderburn, Bendigo and other distant places.

Compulsory registration in Victoria commenced in 1853. Yet on the 1850s goldfields at least 5% of births were not registered. In these cases supporting evidence may come from church baptism registers. For Dunolly we have Church of England 1860 and 1863 onwards and some Catholic christenings. Again the child of a mobile mining family might be baptised in a totally different place to their birth.

A good resource at the Dunolly Museum is a file called Movement of Miners 1852-1870. This lists major rushes suggesting where to look for a miner before or after they were at a known location. In 1856 Dunolly had a population of about 35,000, later that year there were 30,000 at Chinamans Flat followed by 50,000 at Ararat. They were mostly all the same people. So if

your ancestor was at Dunolly and did not have a good claim then they were probably also at Chinamans Flat and Ararat. Likewise, many of those at the rush at Dunolly had in the previous twelve months been at Avoca, Beaufort and St Arnaud.

Miners often did not appear in official records. Of the 35,000 at Dunolly in its heyday we know the names of perhaps 2,000.

STREETS OF CHINAMANS FLAT

This rush started off as Chinamans Gully near where the Maryborough airport is now. It was abandoned, then in October 1856 traced further down towards Timor as Chinamans Flat. There were many Chinese miners at the rush but it was not discovered by Chinese. but by a man named McMillan.

The first main street was along the edge of the diggings. In a very short time the rush expanded and this street had diggings both sides and was abandoned for the street behind the shops. Some of the shops were probably turned around to face this new main street. It was called Piccadilly. Other streets were named The Strand, Regent, Quadrant and Pall Mall. Much like what you would expect to see on a Monopoly board. Piccadilly was on the edge of the diggings but soon the lead was widened even more and it had holes both sides. Being originally a back street, Piccadilly was only 15 feet wide. This caused traffic congestion, particularly with Cobb & Co who wanted to race quickly through the town. As the lead was wet, miners bailed out the water from their claims. The water ran across the surface, down the street and through properties. Soon Piccadilly became a quagmire and the shops moved again. This time they went to Pall Mall, also known as High St. Pall Mall is what is now the current Timor Rd about halfway between Maryborough and Timor.

What's the chance of rain over the next three months?

Average to slightly wetter on balance, is the good news from Agriculture Victoria's seasonal risk agronomists, who have crunched the numbers on a range of oceanic and atmospheric climate driver indicators. The bad news is that wetter signals for autumn have faded slightly since the last outlook in January.

Indicators are currently showing winter temperatures are likely to be slightly warmer, although this is notoriously difficult to predict so far out. The Equatorial Pacific Ocean remains in an El Niño state, but only the surface temperatures and cloud at the Dateline are in that mood. Under sea heat, the Southern Oscillation Index and trade winds are more in line with a neutral Pacific pattern. A La Niña and/or IOD (Indian Ocean Dipole) is a possibility later in winter according to half the models. The undersea shows further progress to potentially become a La Niña, but there is plenty of time over the next few months for a hiccup in its progress. Oceans and seas to the north of Australia are warm, which is good, but triggers to get the moisture down are lacking. Model's

still predict the Indian Ocean to stay warm or warmer than normal for the next six months. Pressure is still higher at Darwin and the position of high pressure systems over Victoria is reminiscent of summer. Changes to pressure are needed before rain patterns become normal. A positive Southern Annular Mode has been



dragging frontal triggers south and this also needs to change. The Fast Break is a quarterly weather update, providing details and modelling results of oceanic and atmospheric climate drivers.

Residents in the North West urged to check alarms

CFA and MFB are urging residents in the North West Region of Victoria to take greater care around the home as new figures show electrical fires were one of the most common causes of preventable house fires last year. Firefighters attended 3,211 preventable house fires across Victoria in 2015, with more than 40 per cent of these starting in the kitchen. Electrical fires were responsible for 22 per cent of fires in the home across Victoria, with half of these put down to faulty appliances or electrical distribution. The number of bedroom fires was also on the rise, accounting for almost one in 10 fires, up 14 per cent on the previous year. CFA Chief Officer Joe Buffone said he had no doubt our love of modern technology played a part in many of these fires. "Just like any electrical appliances, phones, laptops and tablets are at risk of faults which could cause items to overheat and spark a fire," Mr Buffone said. items can pose a danger, especially if left charging on flammable materials such as a bed." CFA North West Region Manager Community Safety Mr David Allen said the findings highlight the importance of ensuring homes are fitted with working smoke alarms. He said it was also important homes were fitted with more than one smoke alarm, especially inside bedrooms where the doors can be closed, but they can be fitted legally outside a bedroom area like a hallway if you sleep with the bedroom door open. "Many people don't realise that our sense of smell is dulled when we're asleep," Mr Allen said. "The smell of smoke isn't going to wake you up. Only working smoke alarms save lives, and they have to be maintained to ensure they're in working order." Smoke alarms have a 10-year life span. Anything older should be replaced with a long-life lithium battery powered alarm.



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Channel swim challenge set for September

Maryborough resident Rick Seirer will brave one of the hardest open swims in the world when he attempts to cross the English Channel later this year.

The determined 56-year-old is preparing to face the choppy waters between England and France, and swim approximately 42 kilometres on September 22. The solo swim will take Rick anywhere between 12 to 20 hours to complete, depending on weather conditions and his speed. Rick said he is taking on the challenge for the love of swimming. "I love swimming, I love long distance swimming," Rick said. Rick admits the swim has not been a life-long dream, but as a swimming enthusiast he had thought about it for about six years. "I just like setting a goal, and it's a bloody great goal to do," Rick said. "The English Channel is the premier swim for long distance swimmers, it sets the benchmark." Rick has participated in a host of ocean swim events all over the coast including the Pier to Pub in Ocean Grove and swim events in Lorne and Apollo Bay. Rick trains with the help of English Channel swimming coach Chloe McCardel, who has successfully conquered the channel 13 times. He swims 25 to 30 kilometres a week during five to six sessions. "I've done distance swimming but never that sort of distance. Having someone give me an individualised program means when the time comes, I will be in a position to do the best swim," Rick said. "At the moment I'm in the pool doing intensity training and on weekends I go to the lake or beach and do distance swims." Rick said the challenge of the swim will not be the distance but the conditions on the day." He said it will come down to "one person, one boat, one swimmer, one chance." Rick will have a two week window to complete the swim from September 22. "Once I'm in the water going that's the start," he said. Wife Julie and youngest daughter Bridgett will accompany Rick during the swim on a support boat. Ms McCardel will also join the support team thanks to the generosity of individuals, community groups and sporting clubs who raised money to get her to the swim. "That will make a huge difference having her on the boat," Rick said. He said if he succeeds it would be "bloody awesome".

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Cookery Corner

SELF SAUCING GINGER TOFFEE PUDDING

Makes 4 servings

Ingredients:

Batter

1 cup plain flour
2 tsp baking powder
2 tsp ground ginger
1/4 cup soft brown sugar
1/4 cup white sugar
50g butter
1tbl golden syrup
1/2 cup milk

Sauce

1/2 cup soft brown sugar 1/2 cup white sugar 1 tbl golden syrup 2 tsp ginger 2 cups boiling water

Method:

- 1. Combine dry ingredients in a large bowl.
- 2. Melt butter with golden syrup.
- 3. Pour into dry ingredients with milk and mix.
- 4. Place in greased oven-proofed dish that is quite deep, such as a small lasagne dish.
- 5. Put sauce ingredients in a bowl (you can use the same one you used for the batter).
- 6. As you add the boiling water, stir until ingredients are mostly dissolved, then pour over the batter mixture.
- 7. Bake for 45 minutes at 180°C.

Serve with vanilla ice-cream or whipped cream.

Daniel Andrews Back to Work Scheme a spectacular failure for Regional Victoria
