The Tree of Knowledge

In response to our little article on the front page last week, Tom Benson, a reasonably new resident of Dunolly (two years), offered some information on other Trees of Knowledge, wherein nearly all rural towns have one. Most of them are either outside the general store, or post office, but often in the caravan park. Under their branches people congregate and talk about the day's events, mainly prospectors who may have had some luck with digging up some gold and would like to raise a glass or two in celebration of their finds.

Tom has also passed on the following information about the tree in Barcaldine Qld that became the icon for the Australian Labor Party.

**The ghost gum *Eucalyptus Papuana*, which grew outside the Railway station, earned its claim to fame as the founding site of the political movement we now know as the Australian Labor Party. In 1891 Barcaldine was the centre for the striking shearers during the "Great Shearers Strike" when they met under its boughs. In May 1891, about 300 shearers marched under the "Eureka" flag to put forward their protests. Against poor working conditions and low wages. Because the area beneath the Tree of Knowledge was the scene of actions and decisions which had a profound effect on the future of labour and politics in Australia, it has become an icon of the Labor Party and Trade Unions.



The Tree of Knowledge was included in the National Heritage List on 26 January 2006. Sadly it was poisoned in 2006 and did not recover.**

Bridge Load Reductions Mullins' and Freemantle's Bridges In order to comply with council's responsibilities under the Road Management Act, Council undertakes a

assessments on shire bridges over the course of the year. As a result of the 2015-2016 assessments, Council is required to reduce the load capacity on the following

- two bridges, to a 20 tonne limit;
- (B0117) Mullins' Bridge on Mullins' Road, and
- (B036) Freemantle's bridge on Bet Bet Mt Hooghly Road

Both of the above bridges will be limited to 20 tonne for all future traffic.

Central Goldfields Shire has 258 bridges and major culverts, and Council maintains an active inspection and maintenance program for all of these structures. Many structures are the result of works undertaken in the 1960's which unfortunately, were neither designed nor constructed with current traffic loads in mind.

Council is currently preparing a request for tenders to replace its last timber composite bridge structure located on Bet Bet Creek Road Timor. These works will cost an estimated \$500,000 with half of the funding derived from external sources.

The Dunolly Public Places and Street Tree Advisory Committee has endorsed a plan proposed by Council Officers to give Rene' Fox Gardens a makeover.

An existing sprinkler system, that hasn't been used since pre-drought, was found to be largely operational, there were some repairs done where marquee pegs had punctured the line, and faulty solenoids have been replaced.

Works to upgrade the gardens will include renewing and formalising the gravel paths and car park, re-edging the garden bed, plantings, removing and renewing the old picnic tables and of course having a green patch thanks to the sprinklers.

Rene' Fox is a memorial Garden and must be reflective of Rene'; she was certainly passionate about roses. The Committee agrees that plantings within the gardens must reflect Rene's passion.

The Committee is also committed to making Gordon Reserve more user friendly. It has been requested that the playground be consolidated rather than spread apart as it currently is. This is currently being assessed by Council Officers and is awaiting a proposal to be put forward to the committee. It has been asked that a green grassed area also be part of the consideration

Fabulous Marilyn



Tansy Curtain, the exhibition curator of the Bendigo Art Gallery, has once again put together an excellent display with this featuring one Marilyn Monroe. 1 was not surprised at how good the exhibition was, because I been to a few have presentations at the gallery over the years and they have all been outstanding in their own way. I was surprised, however, by how much enjoyment I got out of this one.

The first couple of rooms at the gallery are arranged

with photos of Marilyn, many from her days before she became a star; there is also plenty of memorabilia from her estate. Marilyn had specified in her Will that her personal effects were to be distributed amongst her friends, but perversely the two people who cleared out her house also packed up her belongings and put them into storage for many decades.

There have been many auctions over the years since the items have been released for sale, for instance, the famous Jean Louis-designed dress, made from soufflé (a fine woven material designed to resemble skin) dyed to the exact shade of Marilyn's skin and encrusted with sparkling brilliants. She wore this form-fitting gown when she sang "Happy Birthday" at President Kennedy's birthday gala held in New York. Realising more than US\$1.5 million, this dazzling gown became the single most expensive item ever sold at auction. The dress was purchased by a private collector and has not been seen since. (Tansy Curtain, essay *Understanding Marilyn*, 2016.)

Also displayed in a glass case at the exhibition, were Marilyn's copies of scripts for two films in which she starred. Included on the scripts were her handwritten notes. I had to wonder how much these had cost the present owner. Apparently any item, be it clothing or a cooking utensil, that can be authenticated as being worn by, or having belonged to Marilyn, can be sold for extraordinary amounts of money.

Among the many articles of clothing displayed are some from Marilyn's own wardrobe and they are subdued, classic styles and very different from the clothes worn by her in publicity photos, or in the movies.

And then, of course, there are the rooms containing the glamorous gowns, which are stunning. These gowns were mostly owned by the studios and would have been returned to the wardrobe department after filming, where they would be stored or sometimes altered and worn by other actors. The gold lame gown, which Marilyn wore in *Gentlemen Prefer Blondes*, was there and although it was only seen briefly from the back in the film it was used in many of the publicity shots to advertise the film.

The exhibition evoked so many memories for me from the 1950s, when going to the movies, or to the pictures as we called them then, was the highlight of the week. Living in a small town where there was only one film screened, we went along and watched whatever was showing.

As I looked at the film clips running continuously in one of the rooms and listened to the old familiar songs featured in them, memories came flooding back. I realise that the colour and glamour these films brought into my life then could never be replicated, but the atmosphere at this exhibition came close, with its reminders of that long forgotten excitement of "going to the pictures". I left the gallery feeling very nostalgic.

Goldfields firefighters honoured with award

More than 100 CFA volunteers from the Goldfields region have been recognised for their efforts to protect the community during the 2009 bushfires.

The group was recognised for its service rendered during the Black Saturday fires in 2009 with a presentation of National Emergency Medals on Sunday 20 March.

Firefighters from the Goldfields Group of Fire Brigades were joined by their families for the special ceremony held at the Maryborough Highland Society.

The large turn-out included Member for Ripon Louise Staley, Central Goldfields Shire Council Mayor Geoff Lovett, Cr Helen Broad (Tullaroop Ward), VFBV Board Member Samantha Rothman, VFBV State Councillor Darryl Wagstaff and Goldfields Group Officer Robert Ipsen.

All 10 brigades within the Goldfields Group – Bealiba, Bowenvale, Carisbrook, Dunolly, Maryborough, Moolort and Joyces Creek, Mt Cameron, Natte Yallock, Talbot and Wareek and Bung Bong – were represented with more than 100 Australian National Emergency Medals awarded by CFA Duty Chief Officer Bruce Byatt and District 2 Operations Manager Steven Smith.

Goldfields Group Officer Robert Ipsen acknowledged the hard work undertaken by the firefighters and the invaluable support of their families.

"Some of the members that received this prestigious

award were part of the first and second crews into Kinglake," Mr Ipsen said.

"Black Saturday had an enormous impact on Victorians, especially on the lives of these individuals."

Maurice really loved Beechcraft aircraft, so strong and wonderful to fly. We had been flying a Beechcraft Debonair that had become available, owned by a Melbourne solicitor. Maurice had always jokingly said to the owner, "If you ever want to sell 'alpha uniform delta' please let me know and give me the first knockback". Imagine his surprise when having sold our property in Yarrambat on vendor terms the new owner, a surveyor, rang Maurice and asked if he would mind if he paid him out as the old title allowed him to subdivide but he must be the owner. Then . . . the solicitor rang and said he had to sell the Debonair, with three daughters in university. Whoopee. She certainly was his baby and we did lots of flying from then on. We certainly got to know Victoria as we had only moved from Sydney in 1968 when Maurice took on the job of Data Processing Manager. Flights to Sydney to visit the family instead of that long drive were most enjoyable. Kingscote on Kangaroo Island became a regular haunt visiting John and Jenny Ailiffe and camping on the beach each Australia Day weekend. We had quite a team of good fun followers too, ha! We regularly visited Tocumwal for gliding with the world famous champion glider pilot Ingo Renner and the Monash Flying Club had no trouble filling aircraft for those beaut weekends. With Maurice's enthusiasm the club had about 80 members, not all pilots, just folks interested in flights away and the

luscious cray bakes (boils) we had each year.

Maurice continued his night circuits and ADF orientation practice and even convinced me into night circuits just in case we were caught out after dark.

For more than four people aboard he loved the A36, six/ seven-seater Beechcraft. In May 1976 good friends, a family who regularly visited us on the farm at Yarrambat to get their three lovely children used to animals, asked if we would take them around Australia. They did not have to ask twice! We left Moorabbin, enjoyed the Duke's hospitality in Andamooka, Ayers Rock, Alice Springs, Fitzroy Crossing, Broome, Kununurra, Darwin, Tindal (Katherine), Karumba (those prawns, ahhhh) Cairns (that reef, wow) Dunk Island, Townsville, Brampton Island, Mackay, Great Keppel Island, Rockhampton, Lightning Ridge, Nyngan, West Wyalong, Corowa to Moorabbin. They still talk about that delightful trip. Time spent on the islands was especially good with lots of swimming in lovely warm clear waters. The weather turned black as we approached Corowa so we were forced to land and hoped it would pass. Before departing the aircraft on landing a pilot called us to enquire about the weather as he needed advice - he was caught in the crud. We advised that he continue to Corowa as the visibility was still OK but very black to the south. He continued from Benalla and was most grateful - he kissed the ground. We checked the weather on the radio then made it home Carolyn Butler safely.

Matilda's Story

She had beautiful, big brown eyes and lovely, long curving horns. She was a Jersey cow and the first one we ever had.

Dad called her Matilda because when she was a very tiny calf he carried her home in a bag and said he was carrying his swag or "Waltzing Matilda". After a while though, we only called her Tilda.

Dad had to teach her to drink milk out of a bucket. She was too big to drink out of a bottle. She could drink three big buckets of milk a day.

We kept her in the house yard as she grew up but we couldn't play with her like we did with the lambs because she grew so big. As she got bigger she started to eat grass but also started to eat other things too. She liked the washing on the line and often had a nibble. One day Mum caught her with a tablecloth half way down her throat and had to pull it out. Mum got mad and said that the calf had to go out in a paddock.

Tilda was Dad's first cow and he loved her. She loved him too and would run up to him whenever he went out in the paddock and would want to be scratched behind her horns. If she wanted your attention she would nudge you with her horns. As she got bigger her horns grew longer and sharper. One day Dad put her in the bale and sawed the ends off her horns and he kept the pieces in his drawer.

When she was two years old Tilda had her first calf and Dad started milking her. I called the calf Bluebell. Each night the calf was locked in a shed so that she couldn't drink the milk and Dad would milk Tilda in the morning. He would leave some milk for the calf to drink and let the calf out when he finished. It was my job each night to lock up the calf.

As I grew older Dad taught me how to milk a cow and I had to milk every weekend. Dad said he had to have two days off each week. Sometimes it was fun, but other times.... When my sister got older she had to milk too, and she hated it. She used to pretend that Tilda was kicking the bucket and said she was frightened. Dad growled at her. One day the dog barked and made Tilda jump. Dad fell over and landed in a cow pat. He was mad at the dog.

Over the years Tilda had a lot of calves, so always supplied milk. Milking was done in the mornings. It was alright in summer, but I didn't like it in the winter. You had to get out of bed while it was still dark and light a lantern in the shed. On a cold, frosty morning it was warm to cuddle into Tilda, but on a rainy morning she would be dripping with water and you had to dry her with a cloth so the water wouldn't run into the milk. Dad always said he could get out of bed and do the milking without waking up. I suppose he could, as he had more patience than us. One morning while it was still dark he came running in and woke us all up because it was snowing. It was the first time it had ever happened in our district.


Mum used to make butter with the cream we got from the milk from our cows and when there was plenty of milk Dad sometimes bought a pig to fatten with the extra milk.

When Tilda got old she couldn't have any more calves so Dad had to sell her. He didn't like doing that at all. When we took her to the sale Dad said he got dust in his eyes and that was why his eyes were wet.

Not long after that he bought another Jersey cow which

we called Endora, after the lady on the TV show bewitched. She was very quiet and all of us could pat her. By then the younger kids of the family were old enough to do the milking and our turn didn't come around as often. Dora was very quiet, but it was funny how she always seemed to kick when my younger sister was milking. She never seemed to get much milk when it was her turn.

Since then we have had other cows, but we will always remember the first ones. Perhaps one day I'll tell you about Ginny.

Heart attack victim reunites with paramedics

Last week, Waanyarra local, Dennis Lacey and wife Ros, had the opportunity to be reunited with the paramedics who attended to his case, when he fell unwell back in December last year.

Dennis was sitting on the couch watching television when, without any warning, he suffered a cardiac arrest.

"I didn't have any chest pain, or any other signs, when I had the cardiac arrest," Dennis said. "All I remember was waking up three days later in a hospital in Melbourne."

Ros said, while the couple were in the lounge room, she noticed Dennis suddenly shudder.

"I thought Dennis was dreaming, so I shook him and said to him, 'wake up, you're dreaming'," she said. "He shuddered again, which got my attention, so I shook him again, and then I asked him if he could hear me."

When Dennis didn't answer her, Ros immediately called Triple Zero and her neighbour Sue Henderson - who was quickly on scene. Sue immediately commenced CPR and called another neighbour, Val Cunsolo to help. Sue and Val performed effective CPR on the 66-year old, and continued until paramedics arrived at the country property.

Val said, she had done first-aid training in the past, but had never done CPR on a person who was in cardiac arrest before."The CPR training I did certainly helped me a lot the day Dennis collapsed. It was also good having Sue there, who has done CPR before, because I had confidence in what I was doing," Val said.

Once paramedics arrived, they took over treating Dennis.

Dennis' nephew, Troy Harvey, is a Melbourne-based paramedic and said this case highlights how imperative CPR is, prior to the arrival of an ambulance. "The outcome of this case is amazing. My uncle has come home deficit free after such a short period of time," Troy said. "Without immediate bystander CPR, this situation would have been a lot different."

Further highlighting the importance of early CPR is Ambulance Victoria's Research and Evaluation Manager, Dr Karen Smith. "Bystanders are the critical first link in the 'chain of survival' and can help keep patients alive before our highly-trained paramedics arrive," she said.

Troy was not only thankful to Sue and Val for their incredible help on the day his uncle collapsed, but was also grateful for the work of his rural colleagues. "As a paramedic, we respond to cardiac arrests every day, but when it's your own family, it's amazing the gratitude you have for the people who respond to these kinds of cases," Troy said. "When it hits home like that, it's a lot different to just doing it (CPR) day-in day-out to complete strangers."

Anthony McQueen, a MICA Paramedic who attended to Dennis back in December said, when he arrived on scene, Dennis was still in cardiac arrest, and had to be airlifted to Melbourne for further treatment. "Dennis has bounced back extremely well, and a big part of that is thanks to the effective CPR done prior to our arrival." Bianca Villarosa, Ambulance Victoria

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In the Vegie Patch with Alf

This time last year, we were hoping to get some good rains. Now we are still waiting for rain, and so are most of the plants. However gardening must go on, in spite of the season's conditions. While trying to keep some plants alive that are making growth, there are some seeds and plants that do need to be sown or planted out this month.

Light frosts can start later this month, so it is wise to sow seeds or plants of frost resistant plants now while there is some reasonable good growing weather and the soil is still warm. If gardeners do not want to chance another very dry autumn, the soil can be turned over and fertilized for the later planting. By keeping the soil turned over and fertilized for the later planting it helps to upset the breeding cycle of pests and also helps to keep the weeds from obtaining a hold in the soil.

For any gardener who prefers to grow their own asparagus plants, now is a good time to try your luck. It is one of the few perennial types available and can produce up to twenty years! Two year old crowns are the best to start with. They are better covered over during the winter months with a good layer of compost and manure. The tips or spears should not be cut out for the first season after planting. This allows the crown to become established, and to form many new buds.

Broad beans can be sown near the end of this month, but later sowings are more successful. Seeds or plants of the white onion can go into the garden bed this month. Also seeds of the long keepers can be sown, nearer the end of April. These onions are slow growers and they do like the soil to be warm. The seed does not germinate well in cold soil. Late short varieties of carrots sown now can still result in a very useful crop. They will not grow a large root, but can be very welcome in late spring when the winter crop is spent. Telephone peas can be sown in containers and transplanted when grown enough; they do need a sheltered position and where they can get the most sunshine.

Now the fruit tree leaves are starting to fall, don't waste them. They make very good mulch and rot down rapidly. They are also very good for the warm pits. If maple birch or walnut trees need pruning, now is the right time. If pruned during winter they are more likely to bleed.



Persian Love Cake

Ingredients 360g almond meal 220g raw sugar 220g brown sugar, firmly packed 120g unsalted butter, softened 2 eggs, lightly beaten 250g Greek-style yoghurt, plus extra to serve 1 tbsp freshly grated nutmeg finely grated zest of ½ a lemon 100g pistachio kernels, split orange segments, to serve Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 180C (160C fan-forced). Grease and line a 26 cm (10½ in) springform cake tin.
- 2. Combine almond meal, sugars, butter and add a pinch of salt in a bowl. Rub the butter into the dry ingredients until it is evenly incorporated; the mixture should be crumbly, but still able to be squashed into a ball.
- 3. Split the mixture in half and press one half evenly into the base of your prepared tin.
- 4. Add the eggs, yoghurt, lemon zest and nutmeg to remaining crumbled mixture and beat with a wooden spoon until smooth and creamy. Pour over prepared base, smooth top, scatter pistachios around edge and bake until golden (35-45 minutes, it's cooked when the top is deep brown and the edges look caramelised).
- 5. Cool on a wire rack, then carefully remove from the tin. Serve with more yoghurt and a few orange segments.



Notes: This cake will keep in an airtight container for up to a week. Also individual slices can be wrapped in baking paper and placed in an airtight container for freezing.
