During the storm the Racecourse was a sea of water which miraculously ran off or soaked in by the start of the Cross Country phase on Sunday morning. Conditions were favourable for the Dressage on Saturday. Showjumping and Cross Country jumping were held on Sunday.

Horse Trials and a lot of work was put in by members to prepare for the event and to ensure its success over the weekend. We appreciate the efforts of all volunteers both from our Club leading up to the event, and during the event, and help from visitors over the weekend judging on Cross Country jumps and packing up arenas. Dunolly Community Market Update



Nightingale/Palmerston Street Intersection Safety Upgrade

Your comments are sought in relation to the

suggested safety upgrade treatments at the intersection of Nightingale and Palmerston Streets Maryborough.

Council is currently considering the following two intersection upgrade solutions;

- Implementation of a left turn only into Nightingale St from the Palmerston St north side with centre islands to align and slow traffic along Nightingale St and Newton St; and
- Placement of a button type roundabout treatment to provide give way control from all approaches to the intersection.

Left Turn Only:

The left turn only treatment addresses the lack of sight distance in Palmerston St north side by dis-allowing straight through movements or right turns therefore removing the potential accident conflict points. Traffic counts suggest that about 40 vehicles a day are affected by the straight through movement and little or none by the right turn. The centre island in Nightingale St and Newton St will align vehicles through the intersection and slow them down. All other turns are achievable, including the access into the Nursing home entrance. The centre islands in Nightingale St and Newton St would provide a safer passage for pedestrians across the busy street.

Button Roundabout:

The button roundabout treatment is similar to the treatment at the Burns St/Mark Twain Drive intersection. Vehicles from all directions are required to give way to any vehicle in the intersection slowing all vehicles down. The lack of sight distance for vehicles in Palmerston St north looking towards Nightingale St is not removed. The mountable centre button island allows larger vehicles such as buses and the garbage truck to undertake turns through the intersection. All turns are retained. Pedestrians would need to walk further to get across the intersection approaches.

Concept drawings of each of the alternatives are available to view at the Council office.

If you wish to comment on the proposed upgrade works, please download a survey form from Council's website, or pick one up from the Council office. Completed survey forms should be returned to the Council office by Wednesday 18 May 2016.

Draft 2016/17 Budget Released

Central Goldfields Shire Council has voted on a draft 2016/17 Budget which proposes full maintenance of spending on roads, footpaths and bridges; together with major extensions at the Goldfields Children's Centre and provision for undertaking significant flood mitigation works at Carisbrook.

The adoption at a Special Meeting on Tuesday night of a draft Budget for public display follows recent community consultation around Budget proposals.

"There is obviously the Statutory process" advises Mayor Geoff Lovett, "and this current procedure is part of that, but Council also wanted previously to facilitate community discussion on potential Budget adjustments.

Mayor Lovett says Council is pleased to have received feedback and has made a number of changes.

The rural transport program, that is the bus service to rural areas, was planned to cease however will be retained for 2016/17," he says, "and will be funded through the sale of one of the buses. This will provide a twelve month period to review the service in terms of sustainable options".

The other change to proposals is the retention of assistance to public halls at previous levels. "Contributions to public halls were flagged to reduce by 10% however funding will be provided at 2015/16 levels. This will be funded using a portion of the moneys planned to go to an increase in Community Grants," the Mayor advises.


Mayor Lovett says the imposition of a 2.5% rate cap increase by State Government has had an impact on Council services and the initial community consultation was to provide full details of potential adjustments.

"There are planned to be increases in some fees and charges and some adjustments to expenditure," Mayor Lovett says "but overall it is pleasing to be looking at the service levels provided in aged care, maternal and child health, environmental health, building and planning services, waste management, pools, parks and gardens, and on key infrastructure across the municipality like roads and bridges, like the Art Gallery and like Station Domain".

"It's easy to take for granted things like street lighting, library services, public conveniences, immunisations or something like Energy Breakthrough, but Council is behind all of these activities," he says.

Submissions to the draft Budget close 10 June, 2016, and Council will finally adopt the 2016/17 Budget on 21 June, 2016.

Loddon tourism in the spotlight

A five year plan to guide Loddon Shire's tourism direction as part of a cluster of neighbouring municipalities was unveiled in Castlemaine on Friday.

Loddon Shire acting CEO Marg Allan and I, along with key tourism and economic development staff and Loddon tourism business operators attended the launch of The Bendigo Regional Tourism Destination Management Plan. The plan, which provides a strategic approach to growing tourism within the region, identifies a number of key promotional opportunities.

Some of the key projects include Bridgewater and Inglewood township and foreshore improvements, increasing awareness of indigenous heritage sites as part of the Lake Boort tourism development project, and exploring farm-stay accommodation focusing on the Shire's agricultural strengths.

What's encouraging is we're already seeing aspects of the plan swinging into action with a branding personalities workshop planned on Tuesday 10 May, in a bid to capture the essence of Inglewood and Bridgewater.

Inglewood is also in the spotlight following the production of a television commercial designed to unlock the historic town's hidden treasures. The commercial, currently screening on WIN television, is the result of the town's businesses working with, and contributing to, a separate Council supported project. We look forward to seeing the advertisement featured, as part of the broader media campaign, at Bendigo Cinemas and on Facebook pages in the coming weeks.

Council supports street art

Young people living in rural areas are entitled to the same educational opportunities as their city cousins. With this premise firmly in mind, Council has once again actively supported a Street Arts Program which took 24 students from across the Shire to Melbourne to immerse themselves in a three day program.

Council's recreation and youth officer took a hands-on approach, by coordinating and participating in the event organised in partnership with secondary colleges in Wedderburn, East Loddon, Boort and Pyramid Hill. The Street Arts program, funded through FReeZA, included a studio based component where participants learnt a range of techniques they could use to produce art work displayed in Melbourne alleyways. The program, which complements the KooL SKooL Program, has been running for four years and is a keenly anticipated part of the arts curriculum at all participating colleges.

Participation in The Street Arts Program helps fulfil Council's goal of providing a range of cultural opportunities to young people within Loddon Shire.

Explore the world of high speed internet access

With the NBN turned on in Inglewood, Boort, Korong Vale, Serpentine, Laanecoorie and Tarnagulla late last year, many within our geographically diverse municipality have been benefiting from high speed internet.

It's now time for Pyramid Hill, Dingee and Bridgewater residents to find out how the NBN can help bridge the gap between city and country. Pyramid Hill residents are expected to be able to have access to the NBN using fixed wireless in about a month, with Bridgewater scheduled to follow suit in December. Construction is scheduled to start soon in Dingee.

Smoother video conferencing, more efficient use of online education tools, home banking, home shopping and ondemand entertainment are made available through high speed internet access. I would encourage interested residents and community groups to find out more about how having an active NBN service can assist them to do business, study, and manage their household and in doing so, continue to invest in our Shire.

Agricultural traineeships for school leavers

Loddon Shire is undoubtedly facing the challenge of having an ageing community and workforce, but we have a fantastic opportunity to take a step towards turning the tide, with 20 agricultural traineeships to be created through the Drought Support Fund.

Skillinvest is seeking expressions of interest from potential host farmers and trainees to be matched under their guidance. The trainees will be employed by Skillinvest and placed with host employer farmers under group training employment arrangements for the course of their 18 month traineeship.

Host farmers will be fully subsidised in the first year and partially subsidised in the second year to host an agricultural trainee, creating a win-win situation for the farmer and school leaver.

Throughout the Shire we have been seeing a significant decline in the number of school leavers taking over the family farm, presenting longer term implications for replenishing the ageing agricultural workforce and meeting local skill needs.

A year of Op Shopping

Rachel McConville from Loddon Mallee Waste and Resource Recovery Group submitted some thoughts on shopping. Twelve months ago I committed myself to a year of buying no new clothes. Every item of clothing I had bought had to be second hand. There were a few reasons behind my decision, firstly

cost. I regularly found either vintage or nearly new items of clothing that would retail for \$100s of dollars each in high-street stores can be found for a fraction of the price in op shops. Take a green Zara top as an example. I had fallen in love with it in their store but hadn't been able to justify the \$60 price tag. Skip forward a couple of months and there was the exact same top in my local Salvos, barely worn and only \$5.00. With household expenses increasing all of the time this seemed like an easy way of saving some money but still having a fashionable and varied wardrobe. The second reason behind my choice was the environmental cost of clothing. With new fashions replacing old every few months the demand for clothing is increasing and so is the pressure on our environment. Fashion is a complex industry involving the growing of raw materials, manufacturing of textiles, clothing construction, transport, retail and ultimately, disposal of products. All of these processes create waste and negative environmental impacts. More than 5,000 litres of water can be used to produce a simple cotton shirt and a pair of jeans and all of the waste textiles and clothes that are unused and unwanted are sent to landfill. It is estimated that 80-100million kg of textile waste is collected by Australian charitable recyclers through bins and donations every year. 60% of this material is recirculated through charity shops, 15% can be processed into functional textiles, such as rags, but up to 25% of this waste is sent to landfill. Finally, there is an ethical dilemma when it comes to buying new clothes. The majority of clothing sold in Australia is produced in third world countries where pay, working conditions and environmental impacts of production are often secondary to the pursuit of profit. Some clothing companies are beginning to trace their supply line to ensure that there is no exploitation, however these companies are an exception rather than the rule and so the environmental and social impact of clothing production is largely unknown. And so I stopped visiting malls with their brightly lit shops and overpriced clothes and started visiting op shops, vintage stores and garage sales North Central News instead.

iPhone Medical ID

Medical ID is a feature on your iPhone that could save your life in an emergency. According to Tom Aczel, a EMT Paramedic and First Aid Trainer with Emergency Medical Response, *"Many people don't know about it, including many health professionals,"* said Mr Aczel.

The Medical ID feature is built in to the new Health application found on your iPhone. Users can configure it by launching Health, tapping the Medical ID menu in the bottom right, and then choosing "Create Medical ID."

iPhone users with a passcode-locked handset should consider enabling the "Show When Locked" function, providing first responders, paramedics or anyone else with emergency access to their Medical ID. Enabling this feature allows the Medical ID to be viewed by swiping the lock screen, tapping "Emergency," and then viewing the digital information.

A user's Medical ID can be configured with a custom picture and name, date of birth, list of medical conditions, notes, allergies, reactions and medications. It also allows users to display an emergency contact with name, telephone number, and relationship.

The Medical ID also allows users to enter their blood type, height and weight, and whether they are an organ donor. And if someone changes their mind about having such information available from their lock screen, all of the Medical ID information can be deleted via one button at the bottom of the editing page.

After the Medical ID has been created, iPhone users can always go back and update their medical conditions and make changes at any time through the Health app.

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Grants available to fight ice in Western Victoria

Community groups in Western Victoria can now apply for grants of up to \$10,000 to help tackle the drug ice.

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said ice was a scourge on our community and the grants would help tackle the drug at a grass roots level.

Community Ice Action Grants can be used to deliver local initiatives in response to ice, for example, workshops, forums, local campaigns, training for specific groups and engaging with young people.

This is the second round of Community Ice Action Grants. Last year, 13 community groups received grants, including community health services, sporting clubs and local safety committees.

Ms Pulford said Community Ice Action Grants are part of the Victorian Government's Ice Action Plan which is supporting families, providing treatment for users, protecting frontline workers, closing down drug manufacturers and making our community safer.

"The Andrews Labor Government has invested a total of \$103 million as part of its Ice Action Plan, including \$57.6 million in the 2016-17 Budget to expand treatment services, protect frontline workers, and make communities safer," Ms Pulford said. The funding includes:

\$5.5 million for further training and support to better equip frontline workers

- \$6 million to develop an 18-20 bed mental health facility in the Grampians region servicing the Ballarat community
- \$10 million to improve selected mental health, alcohol and other drug facilities to achieve greater therapeutic and safer environments for patients
- \$32 million expansion of the Drug Court of Victoria
- \$4 million over four years for a pilot project to respond to Ice in Aboriginal Communities.

Applications for Community Ice Action Grants close on 20 June 2016.

"Ice is a vicious drug and it's having a disproportionate effect on regional and rural Victorians," Ms Pulford said. "It takes a coordinated approach to stop ice, and the Western Victoria community can play a key role. This is about finding local solutions to local problems," she said. love of flying

Maurice did lots of flying in 1977. He loved his Beechcraft Debonair and any excuse to be in the air was rapidly picked up. When the Monash Flying Club had its annual cray bake, he and his cohorts would be off to King Island to buy the crayfish from the boat with a specially prepared garbage bin so that it would not leak. We had a bath tub in the laundry and the crays rested peacefully until the cooking began for 80 or so members. Always an excellent turnout! A Monash friend and pilot had a wool business in Bendigo and they would regularly fly there.

In April that year we spent Easter flying from Moorabbin, Mungo Station, Mootwingee, White Cliffs, Mootwingee and back to Moorabbin. Mootwingee is such a wonderful place north east of Broken Hill with ancient landscapes and loads of aboriginal history, bush walks and camping under the stars. We organised with National Parks to fly into the park; there were three aircraft in the group and the ranger met us at the airport and transported us to the campsite. Permission to camp and the park regulations observation were necessary. We all set out to walk around the lovely lake/dam which was most enjoyable, and a swim was great to cool off. Unwittingly we must have walked contrary to the usual passage because as we finished the walk there was a sign "No Swimming" as a special liquid cover had been placed over the surface . . . oooops! We told the ranger and he did not lock us up, thank goodness as we all had to get back to work. Maurice decided that this was such a wonderful place so we flew there again in June; this time Moorabbin, Bendigo, Swan Hill, Broken Hill, Mootwingee and back the same way. A PhD student specialising in spiders always carried her prized tweezers with her and when we arrived back at camp she realised she didn't have them. I am usually a hawkeye and could see her anguish so we all set out on a backtrack to look for them. Yes, I found them. She loves me forever, ha.

In May, with a schoolteacher friend of mine and her husband, we flew for a 10 day holiday during the school holidays to Sydney, flying Moorabbin, LaTrobe Valley, Orbost, Merimbula, Moruya, Wollongong to Bankstown, then returned to Moorabbin. Dunolly Groups benefit from Grants

Livestock on public roads

Livestock on country roads can represent significant danger to the public, stock and stock handlers.

It is the responsibility of all road users to be vigilant when travelling on roads that are regularly used for grazing or moving stock.

Agriculture Victoria Dairy Extension Officer Mick O'Keefe said municipal councils and state road authorities administer guidelines for farmers, drovers and other people who may require a permit, or who are exempted by a local law to need a permit to have stock on roads or road reserves.

"Designated stock routes, municipal roads or declared arterial roads and freeways have differing requirements for managing safe stock access," Mr O'Keefe said.

"There is a guide available on the VicRoads website called 'Manual for traffic control at stock crossings', which contains a short checklist that can be used to determine if a permit is required, and includes graphics that show approved layouts for high-use and low-use stock crossings.

"It also details the appropriate type and/or size for flashing lights and signage to be used at the stock crossing sites."

All motorists travelling on country roads need to be on the look-out for 'STOP' and 'GIVE WAY TO STOCK' signs that are displayed by farmers when they have stock on roads.

For producers wanting to move stock on public roads, the relevant authority will assess requests and determine:

□ if a permit is required; and/or

□ specific instructions for selecting stock crossing sites, signage, lighting; and/or

□ specific conditions that need to be applied where stock graze or traverse along roads.

Mr Barling said education funding, housing affordability and the retention of a university campus in Warrnambool were his main priorities going into the campaign.



Operation Axe targets illegal commercial firewood sales

The Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) has launched a state-wide operation targeting the illegal commercial sale of firewood sourced from public land. DELWP Senior Forests Investigator Samantha Moore said: "The aim of Operation Axe is to gather information from the community about the illegal sale of firewood from public land and then prosecute anyone found to have broken the law. This follows last year's Operation Chainsaw which resulted in the identification of 121 persons of interest and the prosecution of numerous individuals who were convicted and fined up to \$10,000 as well as having items such as chainsaws and trailers seized and forfeited to the Crown.

"DELWP regional authorised officers will be conducting investigations to determine the legality of commercial firewood suppliers across Victoria," Ms Moore said ."Operation Chainsaw has shown that firewood is still being illegally removed from public land and sold. This activity is making a profit from taking firewood that should be available free of charge to the community during the domestic firewood season. Operation Axe will seek new information and use it to stop these illegal activities. "Commercial firewood suppliers need to have the appropriate licences and permits to sell firewood obtained from public land. Commercial firewood suppliers must be able to produce their licence or permit to anyone considering buying firewood from them." We also want to remind the community that it is illegal to remove firewood from any public land other than a domestic firewood coupe during the designated firewood collection seasons. These domestic firewood coupes are not available to commercial firewood sellers. By purchasing firewood from unlicensed suppliers, purchasers are undermining licensed firewood suppliers resulting in increased prices for firewood. The illegal sale of firewood is viewed as a serious offence which attracts penalties of up to \$7,583 or one year imprisonment, or both. If you know of anyone who is buying or selling firewood taken from public land illegally we want to know about it. All information provided will be treated in strictest confidence and those persons who supplied information last year are encouraged to do so again by calling DELWP on 136 186." **DELWP Media Release**

Country Roads and Local Bridges issues

Member for Ripon Louise Staley has called on the Andrews Government to recommit State Government funding to the former Country Roads and Bridges Program which was introduced by the previous Coalition Government; following news that Central Goldfields Shire has been forced to downgrade the weight limit of two local bridges.

A lack of funding has recently forced Central Goldfields Shire to restrict a smaller weight limit of just 20 tonnes on Mullins Bridge in Eddington and Freemantle Bridge in Bet Bet.

A council report classified the bridges as high-risk structures and that a bridge collapse was likely.

Council has had to resort to enforcing a lighter weight limit to prolong the life of the bridges life due to a lack of funding caused by Daniel Andrews vicious cuts to the country bridges and roads program.

Ms Staley said the State Government needed to restore this funding and prove that they are interested in country Victoria.

"Our local bridges are crumbling while Daniel Andrews' attention remains fixated on Melbourne." Ms Staley said.

"Country Victorians need to be able to have trust that their brides are safe and reliable, we cannot allow bridges to be downgraded and put local lives at risk."

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

Some welcome rain at last. Amazing how a little rain will penetrate the soil compared to hand watering. This month is more preparing the soil for the spring and early summer planting. Most fertilizers are better spread on top of the soil, and then dug in. Over the winter any garden bed that is not in use is better turned over and the soil left open as much as possible to let air enter the soil. Air is just as important as fertilizers in the garden soil. Fine soil that has run together over winter will not grow a good crop. There are some winter plants that can go in the soil this month. Broad beans can be sown from May to July. The later sowings are more reliable; the early are more likely to get the brown spot on their leaves. Now is the time for planting of early maturing onions or seed, the long keepers, the brown skinned variety. Now is the time to sow the non-shelling variety of peas; the snow pea is an edible podded variety, very young pods can be used for cooking, without shelling, or can be sliced like beans. Snow Pea is a climber and has purple flowers, but there are dwarf varieties as well. Sugar Snap is a very popular variety of the podded pea. This vigorously growing climber will produce heavy crops of pods over a long period of time. Peas are one of the best late winter crops for the home gardener. They do improve the soil for a following crop of root vegetables. Peas do not like lime, but friable soil well drained and free of rough clods. These plants will stand frost, but a heavy frost can damage flowers and young pods. All shelling varieties of dwarf peas are best sown in August to early October. Dusting the seed with a light coat of fungicide before sowing is highly recommended. Rhubarb crowns can be planted out this month. The best method is to divide the crowns if you do have old stock. That way you can choose the variety you prefer. Rhubarb will adapt itself to climate conditions. It is one of the few perennial plants that can be left in the same soil for a few years, providing the soil has been well prepared before planting and generous feeding to get best results. Strawberry plants that did not bear a second crop in the early autumn are better dug up this month, divided, and replanted. By replanting now it will help to give an early spring crop for this year. The first runners with some of the old healthy stock are best to plant out again.

Lamb Hot Pot

Ingredients

- 6 chump chops
- 2 large onions
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 packet French onion soup
- 1 tablespoon tomato sauce
- 1 tablespoon flour
- Pinch basil and thyme
- 4 potatoes, thinly sliced
- 1 carrot
- 1 tablespoon sugar

Method

Add all ingredients into casserole dish with potatoes layered on the top. Bake covered on 180°C for 1¼ hours and uncovered for a further 30 minutes or until the potatoes are brown.

Chris' Apple and Blueberry Crumble Ingredients

- 1½ kg Granny Smith apples
 ¼ cup sugar
 1 teaspoon finely grated lemon rind
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice 1 cup fresh blueberries

Topping

- 1 cup rolled oats ½ teaspoon cinnamon 75 grams soft butter
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup plain flour

Method

Pre heat oven to 180°C

Place apples, blueberries, sugar, lemon rind, lemon juice in a bowl and stir to combine

Transfer to a large greased ovenproof dish.

Topping

Place oats, sugar, flour and cinnamon in a bowl and rub in the butter with your fingers.

Spoon mixture on top of apple mixture and bake for 55 minutes or until golden brown.

Serve with custard, cream or ice cream.




