

Joe Lovel's milestone of 50 games is especially outstanding at the very young age of only nine! He started his career with the Eagles in 2014 playing alongside brother Alex and playing 14 games in u12 as a seven-year- old. In 2015 he played 16 games in the u12 side. This year Joe plays two games each week and has lined up for 10 games in the u11.5 and 11 games in u14 this year. For his u11.5 team, Joe is a key player through the mid-field and enjoys going into the forward line having a go at snapping goals.

Jaxson Jago was the reason his family joined the club in 2014, after he came home from school buzzing with excitement about wanting to play football. Jaxson also gets to line up with brother Thomas and sister Amelia in the u14 team most weeks. Jaxson played 11 games in 2014, 16 games in 2015 for u12 and this year has lined up for the u11.5 team 11 games, and u14.5 team 12 games. Jaxson doesn't let his smaller stature hinder his tenacious attitude towards getting the ball and he also provides plenty of run especially for his u11.5 team.

Club President, Steve Riley, addressed the junior playing group prior to the match and commented "The young guys are the future of this club, and to have this achievement you've got at such a young age is absolutely brilliant. You have the support of everyone at the club behind you and we look forward to building a positive future for all of us". Junior coach Cam Anscombe echoed Steve's sentiments also when he said "These boys put in so much for the club, and especially to Joe and Jax to have this achievement at such a young age is massive. I couldn't be prouder of them all and they do their club proud each and every week. They put in 110% in their own games but also help out with the seniors and reserves; definitely club men and we couldn't ask for any more from them".

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Man fined for Dunolly Bowling Club break-in

A man has fronted Maryborough Magistrates Court on Thursday in relation to burglary and theft charges.

The court heard the accused was involved in gaining access to Dunolly Bowling Club on 1 February 2016, at 10pm where he and his co-accused stole cash, a safe and alcohol.

The group took the safe back to the accused's brother's house and gained access to it using an axe. The safe contained historical documents.

Then two days later on 3 February at 6.30pm, the group attempted to break into Maryborough's Ripples On The Res. The group thought about breaking a window to gain entry but decided against it, the court heard.

The defendant's lawyer, Nicholas Rolfe, told magistrate Jennifer Tregent that his client 'just went along for the ride.' "He's someone who needs structure in his life," Mr Rolfe said.

Ms Tregent told the accused she did not want to see him in court again. "I hope this is not going to be a repeat performance," she said. "These are serious offences."

The accused was ordered to repay the Dunolly Bowling Club \$450 and \$590 as compensation. Ms Tregent also recorded a \$1000 fine but did not impose a conviction.

The magistrate warned the defendant not to keep associating with his co-accused or others who might lead him astray.

"You are not to keep associating with these people, they will get you into a lot of trouble," Ms Tregent said.

Shade grants providing protection for Dunolly kids

Dunolly Primary School has received a grant for some much needed protection from harmful UV radiation by installing sun shades around their school.

The Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, today announced the recipients of grants from the first round of the Andrews' Government School Shade Grants Program.

The Labor Government has committed \$15 million for skin cancer prevention initiatives, including \$5 million for SunSmart campaigns and \$10 million in grants for shade in public places.

"Dunolly Primary will receive \$25,000 to build new shade areas in its playground," she said.

Ms Pulford said Australia has the highest rates of skin cancer in the world and in 2014 melanoma was the fifth most common cancer in Victoria.

It's estimated that 40,000 new cases of skin cancer are diagnosed in Victoria every year.

"I urge all students to be sun smart by slopping on the sunscreen, slapping on a hat, sliding on some sunnies, and seeking shade," Ms Pulford said. "We need to teach children as early as possible the importance of being sun smart and maintaining a healthy balance of UV exposure when playing outdoors," she said. "If our schools have strong sun protection policies in place which promote good sun protection practices and behaviours in our students, it could reduce their risk of developing skin cancer later in life," Ms Pulford said.

"Shade is a simple and effective way to protect ourselves from the sun and by doing so reduces the likelihood of deadly skin cancer," she said.

Residents rallying after pub's closure

The Bealiba community says it will remain positive in the face of adversity after the town's only pub closed its doors.

One of just two businesses in the town's main street, the closure of the Evans' Hotel led the community to call an urgent meeting last week.

Community member Ruth Bumpstead said despite concerns, local residents have decided to remain positive.

"One option we looked at is holding monthly events in the town hall," Ruth said.

"That means the community is still coming together and people get to meet with one another."

Currently, the main street's only other business, the Bealiba Post Office, is functioning as a supermarket of sorts, selling some food items and other supplies.

"We're very thankful to the post office, and to the Central Goldfields Shire, who helped out with getting that set up quickly." Ruth said.

"The problem with that is, you can't fit too many in the Post Office because it is quite small, and at the moment it's too cold, wet and windy to stop and chat with people outside.

"The pub closing has really taken away the town's central meeting point."

Ruth also said a lack of youth getting involved with local causes was another issue raised during the meeting.

"We need to find a way to get the young people involved with some of the committees and groups in the town," she said.

"At the moment most of these committees are run by older people, and unless we get some younger blood involved, these groups and committees might disappear."

In the meantime Ruth said the community had resolved to get together and support the ongoing activities of already established groups.

"There's still things out here for people to do – we've still got things like carpet bowls, the bingo and the CWA," she said.

"We all just need to remain positive and stick together if we want Bealiba to remain the vibrant community we all know and love."

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
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Positive Living Group Duke of Edinburgh Awards Volunteers

Diabetes Educators help Loddon resident's live healthier lives

The prevalence of Diabetes is growing in the Loddon Shire with the amount of residents diagnosed in the years 2001 – 2011 doubling to almost seven per cent.

Inglewood and District Health Service, Diabetes Educator, Jenny Boromeo said Diabetes Educators were specialists in diabetes who've undertaken further study help people manage the disease effectively and prevent complications.

"Our role is to support people throughout their journey. Sometimes this is explaining what diabetes is to a newly diagnosed client or assisting people to make lifestyle changes," said Ms Boromeo.

"We can also help organise tests and screenings for diabetes complications but our main aim is to empower people with diabetes to self-manage their diabetes through knowledge, motivation and support."

For those needing help to manage the condition there's no need to travel to Bendigo or Melbourne with Diabetes Educators based out of both Inglewood and District Health Service and Northern District Community Health Service.

Northern District Community Health Service Diabetes Educator Alex Carter said the free service was available to all Loddon residents, even people with pre-diabetes. "Diabetes Educators can provide you with initial information, what can happen in the future and what to look out for if something goes wrong," said Ms Carter.

For people with type 1 diabetes, we can assist you to do things like manage your medication, meal plans, eye

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care and looking after your feet.

"For people with type 2 diabetes, we can help you prolong needing medication through healthy eating, exercise and weight loss.

"Type 2 diabetes is a progressive condition and eventually it may be necessary to start medication. We can be there to help you make the transition to medication."

Services available to improve South Loddon's low cervical screening rate

A newly released report shows that fewer women are getting their Pap test

every two years across Victoria, with one of the lowest participation rates in the Loddon region.

Data from the Victorian Cervical Cytology Registry's *Statistical Report 2014* shows that the Loddon region ranks 72nd out of 79 regions for cervical screening participation. Unfortunately the rate has dropped from the previous two-year period.

Currently, a Pap test is the only way to look for abnormal changes to the cells on the cervix, which if left undetected and untreated, could develop into cervical cancer.

Rebekah Ryan from Inglewood & Districts Health Service is a female nurse cervical screening provider for the South Loddon region.

Ms Ryan said: "Year after year, we're seeing that about one in two women in the Loddon region aren't having regular Pap tests as recommended.

"The latest statistics from the Victorian Cancer Registry show that in Victoria, the number of cervical cancer diagnoses and deaths have risen from 2013 to 2014 with 177 new cases of cervical cancer recorded and 53 deaths in 2014.

"Cervical cancer is a very preventable disease. Pap tests can be a little uncomfortable, but there's no better feeling than the peace of mind that routine screening can bring," said Ms Ryan.

The ongoing story of Maurice Butler

In mid-December 1977, one of Maurice's secretaries at Monash University and her husband had just purchased a newsagency and realised that they would not have holidays for a very long time, so they asked if we would fly them to Tasmania. Of course Maurice just needed a slight prompt or suggestion and he was back in the air!

We departed Moorabbin and flew over beautiful Wilson's Promontory and Flinders Island, but the weather turned bad and we could not make it to Launceston so landed at Bridport.

The wind was howling. That wind had been so strong that VH-AUD actually clocked up flying hours while sitting on the ground overnight. We could not believe it!

We asked the taxi driver about accommodation and he drove us to the pub. Well . . . the Bridport Football team won that day and after we had feasted and settled into our accommodation above the main entertainment centre, they all came to celebrate. The beds shook, the walls shook and the noise was riotous.

Next day the weather was kinder and we flew to Launceston over Ben Lomond and St Helens to Hobart to spend two days. We stayed at the motel next to the Casino, dined there and went along to play - not something we would normally do. We surveyed the place and watched as our friends did really well at 2-Up, drawing quite a crowd. Maurice decided to have a go at Roulette, always loving anything French. He was even betting on single numbers and winning. (I asked to pocket some of the winnings, enough to cover our delicious evening meal and accommodation!) Keen Chinese seamen were following Maurice's moves on the roulette board with enormous bids - piles, and doing very well. I can see where the fever must come from, but we were not persuaded.

We had hired a car and the next day drove to New Norfolk, Richmond, visited the Shot Tower and climbed it, and Battery Point. It was magic. From our sailing days in Sydney, Constitution Dock held our interest. Maurice had been in two Sydney-Hobart races in the early forties in its beginning years.

From Hobart we flew to Devonport, over The Nut at Stanley and on to King Island where we bought crayfish from the boat, then on over Cape Otway to Moorabbin beside that exquisite GOR. A truly memorable journey for all of us and especially our friends as it was their last holiday for a while.

Another pilot who used to take regular charters had been let down by a pilot and the second plane and asked if we would find an aircraft for six to do a big trip to the west – SO already that trip was planned to take off on 26 December. Already I'm feeling giddy at the pace we lived. Guess it's called youth, ho-hum.

School breakfast program helps Central Goldfields families in need

Children from families in need will get a brighter and healthier start to the day, with Carisbrook Primary School starting School Breakfast Clubs in term three.

"One in seven children arrive at school with an empty stomach. Without breakfast, growing kids struggle to pay attention throughout the day, affecting their ability to learn and do their best," Ms Pulford said. Carisbrook Primary School became the sixth school in

Carisbrook Primary School became the sixth school in Central Goldfields Shire to run Breakfast Clubs, which also includes Bealiba Primary School, Talbot Primary School, Timor Primary School, Dunolly Primary School and Maryborough Education Centre.

"The Andrews Labor Government's School Breakfast Clubs program will provide a free breakfast to up to 25,000 kids in 500 of Victoria's primary schools most in need," Ms Pulford said.

"Breakfast clubs help improve student learning and attendance while also building connections between families, schools and their local communities," Ms Pulford said.

"Our Government has partnered with Foodbank – the largest welfare food agency in Australia – to establish and lead the state-wide program, using their existing warehousing, storage and freight network," she said.

"Carisbrook Primary School will join five other schools in the Central Goldfields Shire delivering this fantastic program," Ms Pulford said.

"Students at the six schools will start the day on a full stomach so they can concentrate in class and get the most out of school," she said.

"Breakfast is the most important meal of the day because it sets our children up to concentrate, learn and be at their best but, unfortunately, not all kids are able to start the day with breakfast at home," Ms Pulford said.


Messy Church

Battles of Fromelles - 100 years



Fromelles was the first major battle fought by Australian troops on the Western Front.

Directed against a strong German position known as the Sugar Loaf salient, the attack was intended primarily as a feint to draw German troops away from the Somme offensive, then being pursued further to the south.

A seven-hour preparatory bombardment deprived the attack of any hope of surprise, and ultimately proved ineffective in subduing the well-entrenched defenders. When the troops of the 5th Australian and 61st British Divisions attacked at 6pm on 19 July 1916, they suffered heavily at the hands of German machine-gunners. Small parts of the German trenches were captured by the 8th and 14th Australian Brigades, but, devoid of flanking support and subjected to fierce counter-attacks, they were forced to withdraw. By 8am on 20 July 1916, the battle was over.

The 5th Australian Division suffered 5,533 casualties, rendering it incapable of offensive action for many months; the 61st British Division suffered 1,547. The German casualties were little more than 1,000. The attack was a complete failure as the Germans realised within a few hours it was merely a feint. It therefore had no impact whatsoever upon the progress of the Somme offensive.

Although Gallipoli is the theatre of war that receives the lion's share of publicity and reverence in Australian history, the battle of Fromelles has been described as the worst day in Australia's history.

The causalities suffered there are believed to be the greatest loss by a single division in 24 hours during the entire First World War. The losses were equivalent to the total Australian causalities suffered in the Boer, Korean and Vietnam conflicts.

In 2009, the remains of 250 Australian and British soldiers listed as missing after the battle on 19 July, 1916, were removed from a mass grave where the Germans had buried them. DNA taken from relatives was used to identify 150 of the Australian soldiers.

Yesterday at Fromelles, many of the relatives of those that fell at Fromelles attended a ceremony held at the site to commemorate 100 years since the battle. Many also got to visit a grave containing the remains of their ancestor for the first time in 100 years. Lest We Forget. Fave Arnold

One hundred years ago the Great War. The Somme campaign began on 1 July 1916 with the big push by the British. From the beginning of March 1916 Australian troops had been arriving in France. They were enjoying the green fields after the heat and sand of Egypt.

All this came to an end on 16 July 1916 when the men of the 5th Division went into battle at Fromelles near Armentieres in France approximately 100 kilometers from the Somme Campaign. Fighting alongside our 5th Division were men from the British 61st Division. This battle at Fromelles has been one of the greatest disasters in Australian history. Australia had 5,533 casualties, of these just on 2,000 killed and more than 2,000 prisoners of war. The British had 1,547 casualties; the German casualties totaled less than 1,500.

After the battle, diggers heard their mates calling from no -man's land. Single men and small groups ventured out after darkness to bring back their wounded comrades. One such story is of Sgt Simon Fraser of the 57th Battalion hearing the cry "Don't forget me cobber". This story is immortalized by Peter Gorlett's "Cobber's Statue" which stands in the grounds of the Australian Memorial outside Fromelles. Another replica statue is in the grounds around the Shrine of Remembrance in Melbourne. He was promoted to a Lieutenant in April



1917. Sadly he fell at 2nd the Battle of Bullecourt in May 1917 and ironically his body was never found. Hundreds of men were in mass graves which Germans the dug. Now, over the last dozen years, thanks to a dedicated team of people including Robin Corfield, Ross McMullin and Lambis Engelzos, some of these bodies have been exhumed, identified and have known graves.

I will break down how a Division is formed and will relate to the makeup of the 5th Division. The 5th Division consists of three brigades, the 8th, 14th and 15th. Each brigade has four battalions; the 8th brigade comprises of the 29th, 30th, 31st and 32nd battalions and their brigadier was Edwin Tivey who came from Inglewood.

The 14th brigade comprised of the 53rd, 54th, 55th and 60th battalions and their brigadier was Harold Pope.


The 15th brigade comprised of the 57th, 58th, 59th and 60th battalions and their brigadier was Harold (Pompey) Elliott, originally from Charlton.

The battle at Fromelles has been classed as the worst thought-out campaign in the war. At the head of the 5th division was an Australian, Major General McCay, infamous as one of the most detested officers in the AIF. Over all, in control was General Richard Hacking, a professional soldier. The three brigadiers pleaded for the battle not to go ahead as they could see that flat open country that the men would have to endeavor to take, and the Germans were well established, so it was a disaster waiting to happen.

Pompey Elliott never got over the loss of his men with 800 killed from his brigade alone. In 1929 and 1930 he gave a series of lectures criticising the British General Hacking. Sadly, everything became too much for him and he committed suicide in 1931.

ORIGINS OF THE MARYBOROUGH HIGHLAND GAMES

1858 was the first official New Years Day Highland Games organised by the North Western Province Highland Society. North Western Province was the name of the electorate west of the Loddon River. Initially they had a broader base with committee members from the various towns. By the 1860s they were concentrated in Maryborough and were also known as the Maryborough Caledonian Society. In the 1880s they renamed themselves the Maryborough Highland Society. The 1858 Highland Games were held south of Havelock as Havelock was much bigger than Maryborough at the time. The flat open ground is now part of the Maryborough wastewater treatment plant at Simson. The committee had been formed in late 1857 by mostly Maryborough and Havelock businessmen.

Havelock was actually the fourth Scottish sports held west of the Loddon River. The committees that had organised the first three games disbanded after each event.

For New Year's Day 1857 the Scottish sports were held at Alma. Alma was chosen as it was the established town and had a flat by the creek where sports were held. These events were organised by Andrew Elder, Donald McCallum, Stewart McAllister & Mackay Leith. The rush to Chinamans Flat 3½ km away was underway at the time. A contingent met at the John O'Groat Restaurant at Piccadilly in Chinamans Flat and travelled together to Alma.

The 1856 and second Scottish sports were held at Dunolly and organised by the same group that did the 1857 games. This was not Dunolly as we know it at its current location but the Dunolly of 1856 at Hard Hill 3km west of the present town. The most likely site of the games was at Hard Hill at a place called New Years Flat.

There is evidence that the first Scottish New Years Day Games were held on 1st January 1855 but nothing to say where they were held. As Alma had a population of some 25,000 at the time surely this would be where the first games were held.

Victoria's first highland society was formed in Geelong in 1856 but has since disbanded. Others to follow were Maryborough 1857, Ballarat and Melbourne 1858 and Bendigo in 1859. Maryborough is the oldest existing highland society in Victoria.

TRACING ANCESTORS ON THE GOLDFIELDS Movement of miners

The population of Dunolly in 1856 is estimated at 35,000. Some wildly exaggerated figures (including recent tourist brochures) put the population of Dunolly as up to 100,000. This can't be as there were only 115,000 miners in Victoria in 1856. Early the next year there were 30,000 at Chinamans Flat, followed by 50,000 at Ararat and 25,000 at Stawell. No doubt the majority of these were the same people moving to each rush. Only people with good claims or good business sites were induced to stay after the bulk had left.

When we do research at Dunolly Museum, if someone's ancestor was there and then disappears we refer to a list of rushes to see what was the biggest rush at the time. The majority of those at Dunolly would have been at Fiery Creek (Beaufort) the year before. If records of the ancestor are missing in 1861-62 or 1867-69 then we suggest they should try New Zealand, 10,000 sailed from Victoria to New Zealand rushes. Other Victorians may have left for New Zealand via NSW, SA or Tasmania. There are shipping records on microfiche for Victoria to New Zealand (with an index on the internet at PROV) and many NSW to New Zealand passengers and crew are on the internet. Also there are New Zealand newspapers and many New Zealand miners rights available on the internet.

Becoming a farmer

In the 1860s many miners selected land and turned to farming. They just didn't become farmers. Miners often had to stop treatment when they ran out of water, and small scale farming often had quiet times during the year. So for the first few years, at least, many people combined mining and farming until such time as the claim was worked out or the farm was sufficiently established to make a living out of. There are numerous local instances where a miner has selected land within one mile of where his mining claim was. So working in reverse, it is reasonable to suggest that if you know where your ancestor's first farm was, then their gold mine may well have been nearby.

TRIP TO ŤIMOR

In April 49 members and friends went on our historical tour of Timor. We actually stopped at five settlements adjacent to each other – Coxtown, Timor, Bowenvale, Central Chinamans and Chinamans Flat; each having different origins and stories. We saw a disused cricket pitch now surrounded by trees and walked down parts of main streets where buildings no longer exist. We stopped at a modern house built on the original Timor Cemetery where an estimated 200 people were buried.

We heard of Miss Julia Matthews playing at a theatre and her connection with Burke and Wills. Also the story of a little girl playing too close to a mine who got picked up by a rope and crushed to death as it wound round the capstan. At one place we were told a story of where miners tunnelled under a hotel and when the ground collapsed one of the hotel walls fell down. A large depression still marks the spot. The locals were kind enough to open up the Bowenvale Hall for us to look through.

Our next tour "Ghost settlements of the Central Goldfields" will be 19 September.

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
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GOLDEN TRIANGLE ARCHERS

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Bridgewater "ramping up" its tourism profile

Despite some delays due to wet weather and poor ground conditions, the new Bridgewater Boat Ramp is expected to be completed by the middle of next month. With the old boat ramp removed and the new boat ramp

now fully installed, construction of a boardwalk is currently underway.

Completion of the boardwalk running alongside the boat ramp marks the final stage of the \$242,500 project, however it will link into the overall foreshore redevelopment plan designed to draw people to the picturesque riverside town.

The boat ramp project itself was undertaken after the Ski Club raised concerns with Council about the poor standard and safety of access to the Loddon River at Bridgewater.

While at a cursory glance, Bridgewater sports and boating groups may appear to be the major beneficiaries of the project, works planned for the precinct, including the establishment of a designated parking area for boating users, will enhance the area for all.

The Bridgewater boat ramp project has attracted \$194,500 from the state government under the 'Boating Safety and Facilities' program.

Council has listened to the Ski Club and the local community, and in addressing their concerns added further value to a broader foreshore vision.

Word is ever spreading about the accessibility and natural beauty of the Loddon River and increasing numbers of people are making Bridgewater Caravan Park, and nearby riverside locations, their destination of choice.

Council is confident that once the foreshore precinct redevelopment is complete, residents and visitors will be further drawn to the river for a range of leisure activities including quieter pursuits such as fishing, paddling, swimming and walking.

Leisure opportunities for all abilities

Loddon Shire Council is committed to ensuring an active rural lifestyle is available to as many people as possible.

Residents and visitors with limited mobility will soon have the opportunity to explore outdoor tracks and trails which traditional wheelchairs can't reach, by booking a time to use our new trail rider.

The trail rider is a cross between a wheelbarrow and a sedan chair with handles at the front and back which allows companions to guide the rider up and down previously inaccessible tracks.

It is anticipated the trail rider will be available to book free of charge so more people, regardless of age or disability, are able to more fully enjoy Loddon Shire's outdoor trails

The trail rider, expected to be available for use in spring, is just one of the exciting initiatives currently being undertaken by Council's disability inclusion team.

A wheelchair lift to be installed at Inglewood Swimming Pool next year is also set to provide people of all abilities independent access into the pool.

Work has also begun on the construction of a pergola to increase all weather outside play opportunities for the Dingee pre-schoolers.

While the painting and tap installation was managed through Council's building maintenance fund, the pergola is being built after The Bendigo Community Bank donated a sum of \$5,500 and the Dingee preschool parent committee fundraised to contribute the remaining funds required for the project.

Library agencies to create social hub

Loddon Shire residents will have further reason to borrow a library book when "bricks and mortar" agencies are launched across the municipality early next year.

Planning is well underway on the introduction of five new library agencies which will replace and increase the level of service provided by the mobile library truck service.

Under the new model, residents across Loddon Shire will have access to more than 100 hours of library service per week, in comparison to the 15.5 hours currently provided by the mobile library.

The Pyramid Hill Neighbourhood House currently houses Goldfields Library Corporation's only library agency in the Loddon region, providing 24 hours of service per week.

It will continue to operate and has recently moved to a new building with renovated spaces where people can catch up with a friend or take a quiet moment to read a magazine.

Some library agencies will be able to offer free programs and workshops with a focus on children's literacy and digital literacy for adults.

I hope to see more families within our municipality becoming active library members over the coming months, ready to enjoy all the new community hubs have to offer.


