The scourge of family violence

80,000 calls to Police last year to attend family violence incidents - one call every eight minutes. As shocking as this number is, it is estimated that still only one in six incidents is reported.

Superintendent Matthew Ryan supplied the above figures when he gave the keynote speech at the CNAV (Community Newspaper Association of Victoria) Conference on 8 October 2016. He is the sole superintendent in the Victoria Police Family Violence Command, a position he took up when the Command was formed in March 2015.

Since that time there has been a 40 percent increase in reports of family violence and assaults. Superintendent Ryan says this is a good result, and demonstrates that what they are doing is working. He wants to see the percentage go up again this year. It is hoped that the budget for not-for-profit organisations will be increased, which will mean that the recommendations of the Royal Commission into Family Violence can be implemented.

Superintendent Ryan also leads a taskforce targeting the highest risk recidivist family violence perpetrators in Victoria. The taskforce consists of 11 divisions in the Melbourne metropolitan area and 10 in rural Victoria. These divisions, and the taskforce, encourage major groups such as child protection, sexual assault units, and Police to work together and to share information. This cooperation between organisations has resulted in major breakthroughs in several cases. One particular case he mentioned involved a person who had assaulted many woman over a period of years; six of them had been so seriously injured they had been hospitalised.

There are 37 different support groups in Victoria dealing with these crimes. Getting them to share information has been difficult, but it is now paying off with several people being charged.

Superintendent Ryan stated that during Police basic training, more time is spent learning about traffic offences and the law than time spent on how to deal with family violence. This is surprising considering that 48 percent of Police time is spent on dealing with domestic incidents. Police are now undergoing extra training on how to cope with these cases, and teaching participants respect for women is considered a high priority assisting members gain an understanding of this problem.

Superintendent Ryan ended his speech with an appeal to everyone to encourage victims to report domestic and family violence. He particularly emphasised how important it is "to look after your mates" - much the same as friends look after one another when enjoying a night out by not letting them drive if they have drunk too much. He advocates taking particular notice that if a friend of yours is in a new relationship, is receiving 100 plus text messages a day from the new person in their life, and is being isolated from friends and family: be aware that these are controlling behaviours and can lead to your friend being dominated, isolated and possibly becoming yet another victim.

Maryborough students to learn respectful relationships

Maryborough Education Centre students will learn about respectful relationships as part of a new mandatory primary and secondary school subject to help end the vicious cycle of family violence.

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said the Andrews Labor Government is investing \$21.8 million to roll out the initiative, delivering on a recommendation from the Royal Commission on Family Violence.

Ms Pulford said the Respectful Relationships curriculum includes age-appropriate resources, including lesson plans and activities that help students learn and practise social skills and apply them in a positive way to learning, life and relationships.

The resources have been developed by world-leading experts from the Melbourne Graduate School of Education, led by Associate Professor Helen Cahill, who worked with UNESCO on similar resources used in the Asia-Pacific.

"From next year, Maryborough students will learn about respectful relationships in primary and secondary school as part of the Victorian curriculum," Ms Pulford said.

"The evidence shows that education is key to ending the vicious cycle of family violence and this new subject is about teaching our kids to treat everyone with respect and dignity so we can start the cultural change we need in our society to end the scourge of family violence," she said.

The new curriculum has been developed following a trial of a whole-of-school approach to respectful relationships that was run in 19 Victorian schools, including Maryborough Education Centre, by the Department of Education and Training and the anti-family violence organisation Our Watch.

Our Watch's report evaluating the trial found embedding Respectful Relationships education in a school's culture leads to clear improvements in student and staff knowledge, attitude and confidence in discussing issues of violence, equality and respectful relationships.

The new Respectful Relationships curriculum starts in term one. 2017.

Completed ballot material must be posted by 6.00pm this Friday. Alternatively, it can be hand-delivered to the election office during business hours at the Loddon Council Chambers, 37 Peppercorn Way, Serpentine, and for Central Goldfields Shire, Community Hub 12-22 Nolan St Maryborough. Extended hours apply from 9.00am to 8.00pm on Thursday 20 October and 9.00am to 6.00pm on Friday 21 October.

Voters who still haven't received their ballot pack should call the election office immediately on 1300 583 870 for Loddon and 1300 591 299 for Central Goldfields Shire to arrange a replacement. Voting is compulsory for voters who were on the State roll for this election at 4.00pm Friday 26 August 2016. State-enrolled voters who don't vote may be fined. Voters aged 70 or over and council-enrolled voters are encouraged to vote but will not be fined if they don't.

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Funding for Central Goldfields students most in need

Central Goldfields Shire students most in need are getting extra support at school to achieve their best and break the cycle of disadvantage, thanks to the Andrews Labor Government's record boost to equity funding.

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said schools have now received their indicative budgets for next year, with the Labor Government delivering \$6.1 billion to Victorian government schools for 2017.

Ms Pulford said the budget includes \$358 million in equity funding, which is needs-based funding used by schools to introduce programs that help disadvantaged students achieve better results at school and reach their full potential.

Local school budgets for 2016/17 include:

- Maryborough Education Centre \$12,155,838 plus \$2,022,835 equity funding.
- Talbot Primary \$1,004,626 plus \$128,309 equity funding.
- Carisbrook Primary \$2,863,068 plus \$358,547 equity funding.
- Dunolly Primary School \$1,048,649 plus \$143,891 equity funding.
- Bealiba Primary \$317,552 plus \$26,976 equity funding.
- Timor Primary School \$686,208 plus \$114,104 equity funding.
- Avoca Primary \$1,040,193 plus \$82,502 equity funding.
- Clunes Primary \$1,520,255 plus \$154,510 equity funding.

Ms Pulford said equity funding to schools is ensuring Victoria meets its Gonski funding contribution for 2017.

"This funding is making a difference to the lives of Victorian students and is here to stay," Ms Pulford said.

"While the Turnbull Government has walked away from funding the final two years of Gonski funding by slashing almost \$1 billion in funding to vulnerable students, our Government will continue to provide equity funding to help our schools and students most in need," she said.

"We know that needs-based funding works and is making a difference for Central Goldfields Shire students," Ms Pulford said.







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Moira and Martin's

Moira and Martin Saul built their house in 1972 when they were married. It was built on the site of a much older house which belonged to Martin's great, great uncle Martin who selected the farm in the mid-1800s. Behind the house is an attractive stone building which was intended to be a laundry when work was first started in 1945 by Martin's father Norman. But somehow it was left open to the elements until 1972 when Martin completed the masonry and put the roof on. A shed was relocated from Bet Bet to the Saul farm in the 1930s. The sheets of tin are still numbered to make sure they were replaced in their original spot. Nearby is a 1932 Morris Commercial truck undergoing restoration. For many years it was the Saul family vehicle taking the sheep to market and the family to church on Sundays. Because it had no doors and no padding on the wooden bench seat, a dusty and spine jarring trip was assured every time it left the farm. Young Martin learned to drive in it, probably after it was replaced by a brand new Plymouth bought from Halls of Dunolly.

An old beekeepers trolley, originally belonging to Martin's grandfather, is looking in good condition. It almost ended up in a bonfire until Martin reconsidered its future. This grandfather also made bicycles back in the 1920s when they were often custom-made to suit a rider's size and needs. He operated out of Rolf and Olvers garage on the corner of Napier and Nolan streets in Maryborough, where Wattle Office Supplies is currently situated. Obviously a man who liked to be busy, grandfather also hand forged wire strainers out of horse shoes and railway spikes and other

materials which were close to hand at the blacksmiths forge which was then on the Saul farm.

It was the original selector, Martin Saul, who built the butcher shop back in about 1870 and it operated until about 1930. The original zinc meat safe is still in Martin's possession and is covered in now faint hand pencilled figures and calculations. A meat cleaver hangs on a hand forged hook nearby. The butcher's shop has been restored and reinforced in recent years; a labour of love which filled many leisure hours for Martin over about two years. The old pine flooring was warped and bent and in danger of ending up in the cellar beneath until Martin soaked them in a dam for a week. He was then able to refix them to the reinforced beams where they are now flat, straight and safe to walk on. The wall frames are mortised and held in place by the weight of the shingled roof, which is now protected by corrugated iron. Along one wall an ancient meat preparation table still stands, while a great red gum block is outside the front door. A steel rod was put through the centre of the block which was harnessed to the back of a dray and it was rolled to its current site where it has stood for many years.

It was a very interesting afternoon looking at the history of one family farm in this district. However the best part was that a family member was able to interpret this history for us. Very few Australian families can trace their history back over four generations continuously on one site. Thank you Martin for being generous enough to share this experience with the rest of us.



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400 year - Dutch Australia History Celebrated

2016 - Year of Dirk Hartog

In the beginning, Aborigines populated Australia. It wasn't until 1606, when Dutch explorer Captain Willem Janszoon, in his vessel "Duyfken" (Little Dove), was the first European ship to reach the Australian coast. During his voyage, Janszoon explored and mapped the Gulf of Carpentaria in northern Queensland.

On 25 October 1616, the second Dutch Captain, Dirk Hartog, aboard the Dutch VOC ship "the Eendracht" landed at Cape Inscription (now Dirk Hartog Island) in the Shark Bay area of Western Australia,

To mark the 400th Anniversary of the Dirk Hartog landing, there will be a five day Festival in Denham – WA from 21 - 25 October 2016.

There will be a Race and Cruise from Fremantle to Geraldton and from Geraldton to Shark Bay starting on 15 October 2016. The fleet will be joined by the replica ships of "the Duyfken" and the "Leeuwin II" for the Plate re-enactment.

The Embassy of the Kingdom of the Netherlands in Canberra and the Consulate General in Sydney announced their support for four new "Dick Hartog 2016" projects.

"We won a gold medal this year in the savoury preserves section at the Australian Food Awards with one of our sauces and exhibited in the Winning Tastes Pavilion at last month's Royal Melbourne Show."
