The Welcome Record - our role in the community

We have had several emails over the past year at *The Welcome Record* criticising us for not reporting on various issues that have occurred in the district or that have been reported on in commercial newspapers. We have recently been accused of presenting an unbalanced 'rose coloured' view of Dunolly by ignoring certain events and wrong doings in our community. In reply to these criticisms we would like to clarify the role of *The Welcome Record* and why we try to remain positive, supportive and local.

The Welcome Record began life in 1979 as a record of the local football competition. It has gradually developed to become a record of events, news and business in the Dunolly district. As most people would know, it is staffed by volunteers who have no formal qualification or previous experience as reporters, writers or photographers. We are all retired people who have some time to give on a weekly basis to collate and edit local events and news. Our aim is to facilitate communication within the community, publish local events and news and to give local businesses and clubs a venue to publicise and promote themselves.

The Welcome Record does not employ reporters to gather stories. The editors and sub-editors simply collate what we are given from local people or what we find on social media and in commercial local papers. We set aside two days a week to put the paper together and although we are all involved in the local community we cannot attend all local events or be involved in all local organisations. Therefore we rely on the people that plan and attend events to write reports for us.

Our subject matter is as local as we can make it. We don't deal with state or national news unless it directly affects our community.

The following Wikipedia definition of community papers is relevant to helping define the role of *The Welcome Record:* **'Community paper** is a term used by publishers, advertisers and readers to describe a range of publications

that share a common service to their local community and commerce. Their predominant medium being newsprint, often free and published at regular weekly or monthly intervals, Community Papers are distinguished by their demonstrable levels of local engagement, rather than by the scope of their content.'

The key word for us, in this definition is 'service'. We see our role as serving and promoting the community. It is not our role to report or make comment on divisive issues or individual wrong doings. Those stories can be found in the many local, state and national commercial papers who employ professional journalists.

We have permission, with due attribution, to publish articles we think may be of community interest from Government Press Releases and publications and from *The Maryborough Advertiser* which is a commercial newspaper. We do not have permission, and are restricted by copyright laws, to publish articles from any other publications.

We do not believe our role is to be controversial, or to give editorial opinions about subjects that may divide or damage our community, and we do not enter into public condemnation or moral judgement of individuals within our community.

If members of the public wish to write to the paper with a letter or article about a topic they think is important and in the public interest, they are very welcome to do so. We will consider everything sent to us very carefully and publish anything we feel falls within our community role.

BETLEY MECHANICS INSTITUTE Seeking members for COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

The original Betley Mechanics Institute hall was built by the community of Middle Bridge, as it was known then, around the early 1890s. Since then the hall has served the community as a meeting place, library, dance hall, church and general place of entertainment. It has been managed by local people from the beginning.

The present building was opened in 1910; it was extensively renovated in 1999-2000 and celebrated a reopening in April 2001.

The current three-year term of the committee is coming to an end and several of our committee members are retiring after many years of service. This will leave us unable to function as a Committee of Management. For this reason we are seeking suitably qualified members of the Betley community who may be interested in serving on the Committee.

The appointment to the Committee is honorary and will be for a term of three years from 25 January 2017.

Members of Crown Lands Reserve Committees are appointed by the State Minister for Environment, Climate Change and Water to manage and develop the reserve under their control.

Interested members of the community are invited to attend the Triennial General Meeting at the Betley Hall at 7.30pm on 24 November 2016. Nominations for positions on the Committee will be accepted on the night.


Thank You

Permanent Library to be constructed in Dunolly

Central Goldfields Shire Council will consider plans for a permanent library to be built in Dunolly at the next ordinary council meeting.

With the closure of the Goldfields Mobile Library service scheduled for the end of this year, a static library plan has been proposed after consultation with the Dunolly community and a community meeting which took place earlier this month.

Set to house a collection of over 10,000 books, the library is expected to be open three days a week with services provided by Maryborough Regional Library. The library will also have access to Central Highlands Library database of e-books and e-magazines.

Provisions of library services will also include IT services provided by Central Goldfields Shire, two public access computers, Wi-Fi, photocopier and a printer.

Services will also include story time, school holiday activities, author visits and a monthly home library service for housebound patrons. The library will be placed in a temporary home until it's new building is built.

"Over the past month community members have been in consultation with the Central Goldfields Shire to create a report for the type of library Dunolly residents would like," secretary of the Dunolly and District Inc. group Marion Da Costa said. "In that report it is outlined that we would like a temporary library first and then a permanent library in the long-term. The temporary library will be staffed for three days a week," she said. Outlining facilities the Dunolly community would like

Outlining facilities the Dunolly community would like included in the plans for the library, Ms Da Costa said that all the services that are provided in the Central Goldfields Library should also be extended to Dunolly.

General Manager Go Goldfields, Sharon Fraser, said the library will become an asset to the local community and will continue providing the avid readers of Dunolly a place to source books.

"The library will benefit the local Dunolly community and its static home will provide far greater access to those wanting to use the facilities," Ms Fraser said.

Currently deciding on a temporary home for the library before the permanent home is built, Ms Fraser said



consultation is currently taking place to decide the next stage for the plans.

"A consultation will take place with council at a workshop on 22 November to decide on the temporary home for the library," she said.

Flynn Ward councillor Bob Henderson said the installation of a static library in Dunolly would become an asset for the town.

"It's very important for the Dunolly community to get a permanent library," Cr Henderson said. "We're currently looking for a temporary location and then we will be looking for a permanent home for the library. What we envisage is that we will have the temporary library up and running by January next year and that will stay there until a new building is built," he said.

"The community will benefit from having this space and so will the surrounding districts. Having this library permanently here will also benefit local businesses as people come into town to use library services."

An application for a building grant will be considered at the next ordinary council meeting.

G & S Society AGM President's report 2016

I have great faith in the ability of our performers in Dunolly to be able to present a quality **Gilbert and Sullivan Festival** every two years. Dunolly is becoming known as a successful regional centre for G & S shows. The selffunded productions by the **Melbourne Savoy Opera Company** have also contributed to this success. In 2016, the company came with two shows – *The Pirates of Penzance* on the Queen's Birthday weekend and The *Mikado* in late October.

It is imperative that we keep our own members engaged in the alternate year between the Festivals with our own repertoire up to date and polished. My solution was to present two concerts of highlights from shows we have previously performed. I spoke to **Newstead Words-In-Winter** organisers about performing a concert in August. I wrote a show that would demonstrate the witty words of Gilbert with songs by Sullivan performed by our singers. The organisers were appreciative and paid us for the well attended performance.

I secured another touring concert the following month with the **Avoca Arts Council**. Our cast had rehearsed for several weeks and was keen to repeat the performance. Once again this was well received and helped to advertise our ability to present the works of G & S in an entertaining manner. We presented a slide-show with the words and diagrams of the operas to make it easier for the audience to pick up the wit and wisdom of the librettos. We are indebted to Heather Cooper and Judy Meldrum for the power-point presentation.

We were also invited to perform at the Maryborough Agricultural Show. Queen Victoria made an appearance and prepared a series of numbers that could be sung with backing tapes.

Our branding of the character of **Queen Victoria** has been successful giving the *Victorian* feel of the operas in a Victorian era gold town. It was very common to have works of opera and G & S performed in Dunolly in the heady gold days.

Budget: Based on prior experience with festival management, I plan to manage the festival without the need of additional funding when possible. Grant money has its own complications and may jeopardise our grants for future festivals. Therefore it was beneficial for us to have the two extracurricular performances to raise a small amount of funds whilst giving our members an opportunity to refresh their repertoire. Hall hire and costume making have been the largest costs. Our job in the committee is to provide management and skilled budgeting to ensure that we have funds for next year's festival. We are in a sound position at the moment, and have a strong core of enthusiastic members to ensure our future. For this reason, I have changed the time of the Festival to be at the **Queen's birthday weekend** in June. This will coincide with the visit by Savoy Opera Company who will stage a self-funded production of Offenbach's **Tales of Hoffman**. As far as our company is concerned, it is easier to rehearse in the summer months and perform in winter.

I propose to simplify the Festival with our local show being staged in concert format with Queen Victoria providing the narration. There is less movement for the performers and the Bendigo Etude Ballet School will provide the dancing and ballet. With the local cast concentrating on music instead of learning the libretto, it will reduce the need for so many rehearsals and be less stressful to the performers. We have been extremely fortunate with our pianist David Steed - his playing has been of such a high standard and he has been pivotal to our success. We are also hugely indebted to Esmé Flett for her help as rehearsal repetiteur.

At present, the costumes and scenery are stored at my Foundry sheds. This is something that will have to be addressed in the future as to whether it is wise to keep so many props and costumes when the shows are not to be repeated for several years. Storage and rehearsal spaces are something we will need to think about in future.

The G & S group is inclusive and welcoming to new members regardless of background or previous experience. All are made to feel welcome and all have been able to contribute. We will start rehearsals just after Christmas at my house to learn the music for the fairy opera *lolanthe*.

I would like to thank the outgoing committee members Costa and Shelley Di Biase for the time and investment they have put into ensuring the festival and G & S shows have been a success.





here to unsubscribe" and you haven't subscribed to that newsletter or company then DO NOT click on "unsubscribe" as this will alert the trolls to the fact that your email address is "live" and you will be inundated with nuisance emails. Add the email address to "Junk / Block this Sender" and then Delete the email.

If you are unsure of any emails with a link in them just DELETE the email. This is especially true when you haven't subscribed to them.

Our roads after the floods

The September and October flood events have caused significant damage to our local road network.

Some roads are so severely damaged that they have been temporarily or partially closed to avoid risk to road users.

Drivers are strongly advised to take care on flood affected roads, particularly uneven or damaged road surfaces, and adjust their speed or path of travel to suit the road conditions.

Over the last four weeks Council has completed a comprehensive audit of its entire road network to identify flood damage which requires rectification. At present, the estimated cost of this work is in the order of \$10 million.

State and federal governments have given a commitment to work with flood affected councils to ensure funding is provided to repair critical public infrastructure such as local roads and bridges.

Permanent flood restoration works throughout our network is expected to commence following government endorsement of this program. In the meantime, we have been making temporary repairs to maintain, as far as possible, the availability of the road network and address immediate safety concerns.

Given the scale and nature of the flood damage, completion of restoration works may take some time to complete.

We appreciate your patience as we go about this significant task and will endeavour to return the road network to its pre-flood condition as soon as possible.

Swimming pools opening

Now that we are experiencing a few warmer days, Council is opening its five swimming pools for the summer months, starting from this Saturday, 19 November and running through to March next year.

If you are visiting the Inglewood pool this year, you will notice some changes. The new chair platform hoist at Inglewood pool will be operating, providing people of all abilities access into the pool. Other developments will be commencing in the next few weeks, and temporary arrangements for a kiosk will be in place while construction begins on a permanent replacement.

Talking about the weather

Time passes quickly on a wet Sunday afternoon when a group lingers over coffee and talk turns naturally to rain. Everyone has an interesting story to tell. I started off remembering a warm wet afternoon in mid-December sometime in the early 90s when I took a carload of children to Bendigo ice skating as a birthday treat for my son. It rained heavily all the way to Bendigo and even in the ice skating rink it was warm. In fact fog had formed inside and it was impossible to see the skaters on the far side of the rink.

Jan followed up with another trip to Bendigo in mid-December a few years later. Again in pouring rain. She had to get out of the passenger side of the car in central Bendigo and stepped into a gutter so full it came up to her knees. For the rest of the day she squelched around in wet shoes and clinging wet pants. She even had to wear the wet attire out for dinner that evening.

Marion and her younger brother, Bruce, found a lovely mossy incline in the bush not too far from their home and discovered the joys of skating down it barefoot after rain. Their skating track became very well marked. Jan's gang took a billycart down to the forbidden grassy creek bank after rain- it went very fast.

Sometime around 1956 Barbara and her family were enjoying a family day out at Eastern Beach in Geelong when a big storm blew up. With all the lightning about, her father went to the water's edge to call her brothers in. Another father did the same thing a little further down the beach when lightning struck and killed him. When Barbara's brothers got out of the water one complained that someone had hit him on the head. They realised it was connected to the lightning strike travelling through the water. After they left the beach they visited family in Geelong who did not believe their story until they read in the papers the next day about the man who was killed. Jan's brother was late getting home from school for his lunch one day so their mother sent Jan out to look for him. As she looked down the street a lightning bolt hit the ground right next to him and knocked him to the ground. A nearby man ran to help the boy, but he quickly bounced to his feet and ran home to tell his mother, "I've been killed!" A careful inspection revealed a very frightened boy, but no burns.

Marion was herding dairy cattle sometime in 1956 or 57 when she had the cattle in the paddock next to the huge silo shed which used to be next to the existing current silos. She left the cattle to graze while she wandered down to the creek. Gradually she became aware of an ominous silence. Not a bird called or leaf rustled. She headed back to her charges and found all the cattle lying down with their rumps facing west. Panicking in the silence, she tried to get them up but not one would move, even when whacked with a stick. It was then she heard a faint roar coming from the west which rapidly grew louder. Trapped in the open without any shelter she curled up amongst the cattle and watched in horror as the sky filled with debris from the huge wind. The big shed (which at that time had the largest roof area in the southern hemisphere) lost a third of its roofing iron and big trees were twisted and snapped off above ground. Around 1980 Jan remembers the sky turning green and a twister about thirty feet wide roared through parts of Tarnagulla. It took off some roofing iron from the corner of their house as it briefly kissed it before taking out a whole big liquidambar tree about fifty feet high, then veering off into the bush and eventually petering out. It was only later that she realised the same twister had unroofed several houses in Murphys Creek and snapped many trees off on its way into Tarnagulla. All too soon the rain cleared and it was time to pack up

our stories and go home. Thank you Jan, Barbara and Marion for sharing them. We hope they will not be added to in the near future because while they are interesting to tell, living through some of them is another matter entirely. Vicky Frizzell

The Super Moon

A Supermoon happens when a Full Moon or New Moon coincides with the Moon's closest approach to Earth; also called perigee. A Super Full Moon looks around 12% to 14% bigger than its counterpart, the Micromoon. A Supermoon can be a Full or New Moon.

A Super Full Moon is visible to us, but a Super New Moon is not.

The Supermoon on 14 November 2016 was the closest a Full Moon has been to Earth since 26 January 1948. The next time a Full Moon is even closer to Earth will be on 25 November 2034 (dates based on UTC time).

Perigee and Apogee

The Moon's orbit around Earth is not a perfect circle, but elliptical, with one side closer to Earth than the other.

As a result of the Moon's elliptical orbit, the distance between the Moon and Earth varies throughout the month and the year. On average the distance is about 382,900 kilometres. The point on the Moon's orbit closest to Earth is called the *perigee* and the point farthest away is the **apogee**.
