Banning fracking for good

Dear Editor,

There has been a great deal of uncertainty and largescale community concern about hydraulic fracturing ('fracking') and coal seam gas in Victoria.

The previous Liberal-National Government's moratorium did nothing to solve the problem. In fact, it only brought more uncertainty and caused a great deal of anxiety to our farmers in the process.

The Andrews Government was elected to put people first and that means supporting Victorian farmers, their families and regional communities by protecting their produce and our environment.

The damage fracking can do to our farmers, the environment and our water sources is too important to ignore. That's why we introduced legislation to ensure it never happens again.

Now the legislation to lock in that ban is being debated and voted on in Parliament.

Surprisingly, despite the scientific evidence and overwhelming feedback from experts and the local communities affected, some MPs are refusing to support the ban. It is still unclear whether the Nationals will support our move to ban fracking.

Your readers deserve to know – will the Nationals support the legislative ban or will they side with the Liberals' calls for more uncertainty, indecision and inaction?

I'm calling on all National Party MPs to declare their support for the legislation, which will ban fracking and coal seam gas once and for all.

Central Goldfields Shire Council and the Grampians Central West Waste & Resource Recovery Group are teaming up to encourage more local

residents to take up the options of a full food and green waste collection service.

The new campaign, kicking off with a pre-Christmas launch at the Maryborough Station market on Sunday, 27 November, will focus on encouraging more residents to sign up for the additional food and green waste collections.

The market activities will include some tips and hints on how to avoid waste, along with a cooking demonstration on how to use some of the Christmas leftovers but the main focus is on getting people to sign up for the service. FREE bags of compost and tomato seedlings will be given away at the market.

Detox your home

Saturday, 3 December, 2016

This free service enables householders to dispose of potentially dangerous household chemicals and a number of targeted products safely and easily without harming human health or the environment. The service, administered by Sustainability Victoria, is delivered in partnership with local governments and funded by the Victorian landfill levy.

The next available date and site for disposal of chemicals is Saturday 3 December 2016 10am-2pm at the Ballarat Transfer Station, Gillies Street South, Ballarat.

Stay switched on to stay safe as summer strikes

The CFA has declared the beginning of the Loddon Shire fire restriction season.

In broad terms this means residents throughout our Shire are unable to light a fire in the open air without an appropriate permit from Council or the CFA. This doesn't mean you're unable to enjoy throwing a snag on the barby, it just means it's a good time to vigilantly check any restrictions which may apply to that barbecue during the danger period.

A good source of information is the "Can I or Can't I" brochure which is available at www.cfa.vic.gov.au.

I would encourage residents to familiarise themselves with this brochure to help prepare themselves for fire restrictions, including total fire ban days. It's good to get into the routine of checking the fire danger rating which ranges from low-moderate to Code Red each day. This can be readily achieved by keeping an eye on media reports, logging onto the CFA website or the VicEmergency app, which replaces FireReady app this fire season.

Fire prevention property inspections

Slashing long grass, clearing rubbish and other flammable material from your property is vital to safeguarding yourself, your family and our community against fire danger. Council's local laws team is carrying out its second round of property inspections to ensure residents have completed fire prevention work. At the end of the inspection process Council will engage contractors at the landholder's expense to slash blocks which have not be adequately prepared for the fire season.

Non-compliance with fire prevention notices may result in a \$1500 penalty on top of contractor fees.

I urge residents who have not completed fire prevention works to do so immediately to help keep our community safe over summer and avoid facing a hefty financial penalty.

Keep an eye out for water infrastructure

While I'm on the topic of property maintenance, I would like to remind property owners to remain vigilant about water infrastructure around their boundaries. High spring growth along fence lines is obscuring Grampians Wimmera Mallee Water (GWMWater) air valves and pipeline pots that are an integral part of the pipeline system and farmers are in danger of damaging them when ripping, slashing or spraying. Landholders are urged to be aware of this infrastructure when maintaining their boundaries ahead of the summer fire season. Council has been alerted to the fact that reimbursement of costs may be sought for damage to GWMWater assets. The location of GWMWater infrastructure around property boundaries can be viewed by visiting www.gwmwater.org.au/map.

Library hubs herald new era for Loddon

The mobile library service will roll into Loddon for the last time on 23 December, ahead of plans to open several permanent library hubs across the municipality next year. Wedderburn Community Centre, Boort Community Centre, Tarnagulla Community Centre and Inglewood Neighbourhood House have been named sites of new library agencies. Plans are also underway for Dingee Railway Station to be renovated before the community is welcomed through the doors of their new library.

Under the new model residents across Loddon Shire will have access to more than 100 hours of library service per week, in comparison to the 15.5 hours currently provided by the mobile library.

The Pyramid Hill Neighbourhood House currently houses Goldfields Library Corporation's only library agency in the Loddon region, providing 24 hours of service per week. It will continue to operate and has recently moved to a new building with renovated spaces where people can catch up with a friend or take a quiet moment to read a magazine.

Some library agencies will be able to offer free programs and workshops with a focus on children's literacy and digital literacy for adults. I hope to see more families within our municipality becoming active library members over the coming months, ready to enjoy all the new community hubs have to offer. Dunolly Historic Cemetery

Now, before people get confused, I'm climbing on board my soapbox about the historic cemetery in *Painkiller Gully Rd* (opened in 1856), **not** the "new" Dunolly Cemetery on the St Arnaud-Moliagul Rd (opened in 1864). Surprisingly many people have no idea the pioneer cemetery even exists, just like the Central Goldfields Shire, as it seems they've forgotten to seek a heritage listing for it.

There are approximately 300 bodies buried in the Historic Cemetery (more than half of them being children), which started in 1856 but was not gazetted until 1860, then not fenced until 1862, which left several burials outside of the official boundaries.

In this age of fervent family research and 'tombstone tourism' the many cemeteries within a short travel distance of the Railway Hotel would be a nice little bonus if only they were signposted, tidied up and everyone was aware of their existence!

I've whinged about the dreadful state of the Dunolly Historic Cemetery for a number of years only to hear lacklustre replies of "organise a volunteer day" or "someone should contact the cemetery trust". Putting my money where my mouth is, despite my poor eyesight and dodgy back, I roped the teen son into helping me fling several tons and decades of fallen tree branches and the odd fallen tree or three from the cemetery last year.



We propped up the then-fallen down fence and gate. I considered pulling weeds but, owing to the fragility of the soil and the burial mounds, I did not. Because I didn't want to cause more damage!

According to several websites covering legal guidelines of cemeteries in Victoria, (yep, more legislation than you can shake a shovel at) cemetery trusts have obligations to maintain the safety of both the site and monuments but also conserve the heritage value, plus preserve the cemetery for its cultural, historical and ecological significance.

Last Saturday I hobbled out to cast my baby blues over the spot only to find, yet again, that no one has done anything. The grass is taller than myself, both inside the cemetery and all along the roadside. The fence, which may very well be the original, is still only propped up as my son left it, the tall widow-maker trees haven't been trimmed, there are still trees growing up through graves and brickwork, metal grave maker discs have been displaced by rabbits and are scattered. The broken gate is as useless as an ashtray on a motorcycle and, quite frankly, we as a community should be bloody-well ashamed of the state of this historic site.

I was only able to find a listing of Wayne Belcher (of the Central Goldfields Shire) as the Trust for the cemetery but I am not certain this is current.

The fact the cemetery has been allowed to deteriorate so far has gone beyond the scope of any enthusiastic volunteer working bee; the fence line needs to be resurveyed, the graves need to be pinpointed by Ground Penetrating Radar (GPR) including those outside of the fence line, a flora and fauna survey needs to be held to determine if there are any endangered/protected plants or animals within the cemetery but, most importantly, permits must be obtained before any works can be carried out on historic sites of significance, even if they have yet to be placed on the Heritage Database.

There is always the possibility of covering most, if not all, of these costs by applying for a Cemetery Trust Grant. Hopefully someone will get something started cos I'm getting tired of the sound of my own voice. Rant over.

Prospectors concerned over land investigation

A possible move to change the status of the Pyrenees and Mt Cole forests has been met with strong resistance. A crowd of close to 50 prospectors gathered outside the Avoca Hotel last Thursday to voice their concerns on the proposed change after the State Government enlisted the Victorian Environmental Assessment Council to investigate public land in the forests. The investigation will assess the condition of the forests and the current uses of the public land, before making recommendations on management and maintenance methods to conserve the environment. However local prospectors fear the findings could see the forest shut off to them. Prospectors and Miners Association president Ollie Oleszek headed up the gathering and said any such change to the forest's status would be disastrous for the local economy. "This will be a tourism and economic disaster," Mr Öleszek said. "So many people rely on the business it brings in each year and to take thousands of people out of the area is something we can't afford," he said. Mr Oleszek said that the money brought in from prospecting makes up to three quarters of income for some businesses in town and taking that away would have a ripple affect across the region. "If they close this area up, places like the caravan park here, where prospectors make up about 75 percent of business, suffers," Mr Oleszek said. "That trickles down and places like the bakery and the newsagent also suffer. Everybody profits from the prospectors coming in," he said. Closer to home, Mr Oleszek cited Maryborough's unemployment rate and said the loss of business from prospectors would only heightened the problem. "Maryborough has the highest unemployment in the area and this would have a large impact on them too," he said. "The loss of business from lack of prospectors in Maryborough could have a huge impact," Mr Oleszek said.

Donkey Heaven For quite a number of years Mike, my late husband, sponsored a donkey named Trish at the Yarrambat Donkey Shelter, so after Mike died I took over as Trish's sponsor. The Donkey Shelter recently

moved to Tongala due to bushfire hazards in the area. It is run and sponsored by Dr May Dodds who you would probably assume is a vet, but is actually a psychiatrist who loves donkeys. In the Tongala move May sold her own house to help finance the venture. She has a dedicated group of volunteers who help with the feeding, grooming and transporting the donkeys, and there are a lot of them.

As would be expected the various donkeys at some stage have ailments like foundering, colic etc. so they always had regular visits to the Werribee Equine hospital, but now have their own hospital. We, as sponsors, pay an annual fee to assist in the upkeep and at Christmas send money for presents such as a coat, a bale of hay or other needs. There are open days where sponsors are invited to visit for lunch and help groom the donkeys and make friends with their particular one.

We receive regular newsletters called Donkey Tales telling us of all the new arrivals, sad news of losing old or infirm donkeys and often amusing stories of their antics. Different donkeys have preferences for a particular mate and choose their company. Some of the more reliable ones are chosen for outside visits; for example at Christmas some churches hires a donkey to take part in their nativity play, carrying Mary up to the church door. One year Homer, who was used to these outings, was trotting up the church path with his charge on board when he spotted the trestle tables laden with food laid out by the church ladies and Homer, forgetting his manners, made a bolt for the tables, throwing poor Mary off into the bushes. No doubt Homer wasn't invited again.

Veterinary students are often sent to the shelter as part of their training and apparently most enjoy the experience so much they apply for a second visit. There is also a group of people who foster some of the donkeys in their own paddocks to lend a hand. My Trish, and I have her photo on the shelf, is getting a bit long in the tooth now, but if the time comes to say goodbye I will be given a new donkey.

Putting people first with free glasses in schools

Central Goldfields Shire students will receive free eye testing and glasses at school in a Victorian-first.

The Andrews Labor Government today launched the *Glasses for Kids* program where more than 30,000 Prep to Year 3 students at 250 schools most in need will have their eyes tested and receive free glasses.

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said children with undiagnosed vision problems often find it hard to concentrate at school, leading to poor results and bad behaviour.

"Many struggling families avoid eye testing because of the cost," Ms Pulford said.

Glasses for Kids has been trialled in 24 schools across Gippsland and Melbourne, and will now be rolled out in a further 226 schools around the state including Dunolly Primary School, Maryborough Education Centre, Bealiba Primary School, Timor Primary School and Talbot Primary School.

The Labor Government has also partnered with Melbourne University to deliver *Glasses for Kids*, with supervised final-year optometry students to carry out vision testing at 160 schools.

"We are putting people first with free eye testing and glasses for school kids in Central Goldfields Shire most in need so that every child has the opportunity to thrive in the classroom," Ms Pulford said.

Education Minister, James Merlino, said the results from the trial were astounding.

"At one school we tested 330 kids and 125 of them needed glasses, and once they were received, their teachers reported an immediate improvement in behaviour and academic performance," Mr Merlino said. "Whether it's making sure kids have a full stomach, access to a GP or the chance to go on excursions, we're making sure every student has the chance to make the most of school," he said.



Spring firewood season closing The Spring 2016 Firewood Collection season has closed across Victoria on the 30 November. From Thursday December 1, all designated firewood collection areas will be closed over the summer period and it will be illegal for people to collect firewood on public land until the start of the Autumn Firewood Collection Season, according to Forest Fire Management Victoria regional manager forest and fire operations Peter Kambouris. "Firewood collection may already have ceased in some parts of the state where supplies are exhausted or where rainfall or flooding has affected track conditions making collection unsafe," Mr Kambourtis said. "The public will be able to start collecting firewood again from designated areas from March 1, 2017, pending suitable conditions." Forest Fire Management Victoria staff will be patrolling parks, forests and reserves to ensure people are doing the right thing. Firewood collection is only permitted during designated times of the year and from designated firewood collection areas. Firewood collected at these sites is for personal use only and cannot be sold. Typical on-the-spot fines are around \$622 and for offences that go to court, a person may be liable for fines up to \$7773, one year imprisonment or both. To find the nearest firewood collection area to you or for information more and updates visit www.delwp.vic.gov.au/firewood, your nearest DELWP office or call the customer service centre on 136 186. Any information the community may have about illegal removal of firewood for sale can be reported to DELWP on 136 186 and quote 'operation axe'.
