# Chinese New Year

Chinese New Year is also called Spring Festival, or Lunar New Year. Celebrations start on the day before and last until fifteenth day of the New Year. Chinese New Year 2018 falls on 16th February; it is the year of the Dog according to Chinese Zodiac.

The Chinese Zodiac runs on a cycle of 12 years, with each year denoting one of the 12 animals. The 12 animals are: rat, ox, tiger, rabbit, dragon, snake, horse, sheep, monkey, rooster, dog and pig. 2018 is the year of the dog. This comes from the story where the Jade Emperor ordered that animals would become part of the calendar. He stated that the first animals to arrive to him would get this honour.

The cat and the rat were friends so decided to go together. The cat asked the rat to wake him up early the next day to go to the Emperor, but the next morning the rat was too excited and forgot his promise. The rat went straight there and saw all the other animals also on their way.

Since the others could run faster, the rat asked the ox if he could ride on his back in return for singing to him. He agreed, and those two made it there first - with the rat jumping in front. The other animals arrived one by one which gave them their order in the Zodiac, but when the cat finally got there it was too late. The legend says that that's why cats and rats are enemies, and the cat chases the rat when he sees it.

Strengths of people born in the year of the dog are courage, loyalty, and responsibility. Weaknesses are stubbornness and sensitivity. This year is also the year of the 'Earth Dog' specifically, the qualities of which include being persistent, meticulously attentive, attractive, and with good fortune in wealth.

People born in the following years are year of the dog : 1910, 1922, 1934, 1946, 1958, 1970, 1982, 1994, 2006, 2018.

Red envelopes are gifts presented at social and family gatherings such as weddings, birthdays or holidays such as Chinese New Year. The red colour of the envelope symbolises good luck and is a symbol to ward off evil spirits.

There are some superstitions around Chinese New Year, like you must not wash your hair on New Year's day, as in Chinese language hair has the same character and pronunciation as Fa, meaning wealth.

Another one is you must not sweep the floor on the day as you will sweep away your wealth and fortune. Also using a sharp object like a knife or scissors is a no-no on this day as it means loss of wealth.

Some of the celebrations include lion dances, dragon dances, fireworks, family gathering, family meal, visiting friends and relatives and giving red envelopes.



Some foods you may eat during Chinese New Year and their symbolism:-

- Noodles happiness and longevity.
- Dumplings and spring rolls wealth.
- Tangyuan (sweet rice balls) family togetherness.
- Niangao (glutinous rice cake) higher income or status.
- Tangerines and oranges fullness and wealth.
- Fish an increase in prosperity.

Chinese usually wear red or bright coloured clothes, as red is a good luck colour believed to scare away spirits of bad fortune. Black or white, symbolic of mourning and death would not be appropriate.

I collected many remnants of cartoonists drafts from the bins. It was a heady and exciting place to work for a young girl!


### Sincere Apology To Dr Nuala McAllister Hart

Shade shelters and seating provided, but bring along your own chair and picnic blanket if you wish and settle in for the afternoon.



Anyone who would like to join us in the Cantata would be most welcome and we would love to see you at rehearsals. This Cantata is loved by us all and is part of our Easter.





#### What's happening with recycling?

You may have heard (or read) recent reports of potential impacts on the recycling industry, after China placed restrictions on receiving recycling from Australia. I wish to advise our residents, at the time of writing, that this is not currently impacting Loddon Shire's kerbside recycling collections.

As stated by Council's Chief Executive Officer Phil Pinyon, in an article earlier this month by the Bendigo Advertiser (2 February), when it comes to recycling, it is still currently business as usual for our Shire. Collection services remain unchanged and Council is asking our residents to continue kerbside recycling as normal.

Together with the Loddon Mallee Waste and Resource Recovery Group, Council will work with the Victorian Government and industry to respond to any issues posed by the China restrictions on recycling, to ensure it will not impact on our residents.

According to the Loddon Mallee Waste and Resource Recovery Group, Victorians have a great record when it comes to recycling. Since 2001, the amount of recyclable household material diverted from landfill has increased by 70 per cent. Overall, Victoria recovers up to 70 per cent of its waste, with almost eight million tonnes of valuable materials being diverted from landfill each year.

One of the best ways you can help keep resources out of landfill is to buy recycled products, which helps close the recycling loop. Choosing Australian-made recycled office paper and 100 per cent recycled toilet tissue are easy options for any household or workplace.

#### Council welcomes kindergarten hours funding

Council has welcomed the announcement by the Federal Government that it will provide funding for 15 hours of kindergarten each week for four-year-olds until 2019. This funding announcement of \$440 million nationally, provides greater certainty when it comes to childhood education for children in the Loddon Shire area. In the past, short-term funding has made it hard for kindergarten services to plan, due to the uncertainty about the cost and availability of preschool from year to year.

This funding, until 2019, will enable our kindergartens to plan and support Loddon children to have the best start in life when it comes to their education. According to the Municipal Association of Victoria, high-quality early childhood education is linked to higher levels of employment, income and financial security, improved health outcomes and reduced crime. Early childhood education also helps children build skills they will need for lifelong learning and securing future employment.

#### Healthy Minds video launch

Following its reschedule from December last year, the official launch of the *Who are mental health carers?* video will now take place next Friday (23 February) in Serpentine.

Who are mental health carers? focuses on the carers of people with mental health issues and discusses their experiences as a carer. The video will be officially launched by the Minister for Public Transport and Major Projects, and Member for Bendigo East, the Hon. Jacinta Allan MP. The event will be hosted by the Loddon Healthy Minds Network in partnership with the Bendigo Health Carers Support Program.

As well as focusing on who a carer is and their role in caring for someone with a mental health issue, the carers featured in the video emphasise the importance of all carers looking after themselves. This includes recognising mental and physical exhaustion, and ensuring a carer has their own support. This may be through their GP, a mental health professional or informal support such as friends or family.

Who are mental health carers? will be launched next Friday 23 February at Serpentine's Janiember Park Recreation Reserve at 12.30pm. All are welcome to attend.







### **Dunolly flood mitigation**

A major \$300,000 flood mitigation project is well underway in Dunolly, with Central Goldfields Shire Council to reinstate the township's levee bank.

The flood mitigation works are part of council's flood study and will upgrade the existing contour channel on the east side of the township from the Dunolly-Bridgewater Road to the Dunolly-Eddington Road to improve capacity and the incorporation of a retarding basin.

Construction works will include clearing of vegetation along the alignment of the existing bank and construction of inlet and outlet structures. Council is advising residents that trees will be removed during the works and will remain on site.

Central Goldfields Shire chief administrator Noel Harvey said the flood mitigation works in Dunolly were essential. "The flood mitigation works to be implemented from the flood study are to upgrade the existing contour channel on the east side of the township from the Dunolly-Bridgewater Road to the Dunolly-Eddington Road to improve capacity and the incorporation of a retarding basin," he said. "Construction works are underway and are expected to take eight weeks to complete.

### Blue-Green Algae Warning for Laanecoorie Reservoir

Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) has detected high blue-green algae levels within Laanecoorie Reservoir. The blue-green algae represents a

high risk to the health of humans and animals. The algae detected are potentially toxic and may cause gastroenteritis if ingested. Contact with the water may cause skin and eye irritations.

The situation is being closely monitored and the following precautions are recommended:

- Wherever possible alternate water supplies should be used.
- Untreated water should never be used for human consumption (e.g. drinking, cooking, showering, bathing, washing).
- Boiling the affected water will not make it safe to use. Blue-green algae release toxins into the water when heated.
- People should avoid contact with the water.
- Stock and pets should be kept away from blue-green algae affected water.
- Water can be used on gardens; however water should not be sprayed on vegetables and fruit.
- Stock should be kept away from recently irrigated areas for at least 7 days.

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New Year greetings to all gardeners.



Planting time for winter greens is with us again. Maybe you might like to try something different like Chinese cabbage. It is easily grown from seed and produces masses of crunchy white hearts; it is ideal for salads or cooking. Other good cabbage varieties are the fast growing Mini cabbage or Sugarloaf, sweet and early maturing. February is the time to plant out plants of Brussels sprouts (too late for seeds). They must mature in the winter months. If left too late, they will only make plant growth and very few heads, if any at all. Cauliflower and Broccoli seeds or seedlings can be planted now; plants need to be fresh and healthy. Pull some of the lower leaves off to avoid moisture loss. Kale and silver beet seed or seedlings can go in also.

All young plants transplanted out in the hot weather need protection from the hot sun for at least the first two or three weeks. A 20cm to 30cm flower pot makes a good cover and also holds the moisture in.

Lettuce can be planted, but need to be shaded in warm weather or else they fret and rot. Lettuce can be sown in pots and moved to the shade on hot days or cover with shade cloth in garden beds.

Dwarf beans can be sown up to the end of February and early March and still produce a good crop. A lot of the flowers can be burnt off over the very hot spell. So that is the cause of these plants being slow to produce.

Chantenay carrots can be sown up to the end of March. They will grow and keep in the soil until mid-September or later.

Seeds of spring onions can still be sown and seeds or seedlings of leek. These both grow quickly and are a good alternative for onions that take a long time to mature. Leeks can last in the ground for 12 months or longer as they thicken their stems. Start eating them when they are about 2cm thick. Add some well-rotted manure and a sprinkle of crushed wood ash to the soil. A good crop rotation is to put in the onion family after potatoes, as the soil will be fertile and loamy and you may not need to add any further manure at the time of planting.

#### Fruit Trees

Peach, nectarine and apricot trees can be pruned when fruit has been harvested. As the trees are actively growing, wounds heal faster reducing risk of diseases. Remove dead or diseased wood, thin out unwanted branches right from the base and remove center growing limbs to open up the middle. Apple trees bear fruit on spurs formed on two-year-old wood. Most healthy trees also produce a forest of young shoots, all reaching for the sky. They can be cut back hard now to leave short stubs, each carrying about six buds.

### Summer garden tips

- Dead head roses and fertilise to promote a flush of flowers in Autumn
- Trim wisterias to keep plants healthy and promote next year's flowers
- Trim dead flowers from perennials and annuals for a longer display
- Order spring bulbs for planting in March
- Keep bird baths clean and filled with water for thirsty birds and bees

### Some common garden plants that are poisonous

- Oleander. Leaves stems and flowers are toxic if eaten and can irritate skin
- Euphorbia. Sap, called latex', is highly poisonous. Contact with this sap can cause serious inflammation of the eyes, nose or mouth, and even blindness.
- Brugmansia or Angel's trumpet. Despite their pleasant appearance and aroma, these common garden plants are highly toxic, particularly their leaves and seeds. Rich in alkaloids, if ingested, the trumpets can cause diarrhea, confusion, migraines, paralysis and even death.
- Deadly nightshade. The berries are very poisonous and can cause hysteria, hallucinations, erratic behavior and delirium.
- Lily of the Valley. All parts of the plant are highly toxic and can cause stomach pains and vomiting, reduced heart rate and blurred vision
- Belladonna and arum lilies. Sap can cause skin irritation and illness.
- Hyacinth, jonquil and daffodil bulbs are all poisonous if eaten.
- Agapanthus. Leaves and bulb can cause skin irritation and mouth ulcers.
- Rhubarb. Leaves are very poisonous causing nausea and vomiting
