Melbourne sculptor headlining arts trail

Big things are planned for this year's Tiny Towns Arts Trail, with Dunolly leading the way, securing famed sculptor Deborah Halpern to hold an exhibition. Now in its third year, the art trail will be held over two weekends, April 21 and 22 and April 28 and 29, when 10 towns and 25 venues will showcase local artistic talent.

Dunolly, Tarnagulla, Eddington, Clunes, Maryborough, Adelaide Lead, Bealiba and Avoca have signed up to the arts trail for another year while Newstead and Talbot are participating for the first time.

gathered а little more momentum each year and we've got a couple of new towns in," Dunolly's Ministry of Fun's, Judy Meldrum said.

"Everyone has responded from last year and have come on-board. We're continuing to grow."

This year's major drawcard for Dunolly is a month-long Deborah Halpern exhibition held in the Dunolly Courthouse. Beginning at the Easter long weekend, the exhibition is a way to introduce Ms Halpern's work to the community as the Melbourne artist is planning to create a massive public sculpture in Dunolly later this year. As part of her visit, Ms Halpern is also hosting a mosaic workshop during the arts trail.

"It's a fabulous opportunity to work in a small group with her. She'll lead us through her particular process of how she develops a drawing into a mosaic," Ms Meldrum said.

Leading up to the arts trail, the Ministry of Fun is hosting Saturday workshops where community members can paint pictures of their dog to honour Dunolly's Koko, who starred in the Australian hit film Red Dog.

Receiving \$3000 from the Regional Centre for Culture for the arts trail and the Red Dog project, the Ministry of Fun is hosting the workshops from 10am to 1pm at the pavilion in Barkly Street. workshops occur every Saturday in March and April.

"People are free to come along and just paint a picture of their dog. We're going to fill Broadway with dog art," Ms Meldrum said.

Independent Living Units for Dunolly: from possibility to reality?

There has been sporadic discussion for many years that to build Independent Living Units [ILU] on the hospital campus in Dunolly would go a long way to providing secure, convenient, affordable and high quality housing for older people in the district. The Dunolly District Hospital Auxiliary has taken up the challenge. We are concerned that there are gaps in the housing and care continuum between living an independent life at home and needing to access highcare residential aged care, especially for people on lower incomes. Many in our community are geographically and socially isolated and have poor quality, insecure housing. Even when people own their homes, the market value may be insufficient to buy into alternative and suitable accommodation. So the perceived need is there, but we need to identify the extent and significance of the problem to confirm our "hunches".

The ILU Project is gathering momentum. Maryborough District Health Service has donated land on the Dunolly Campus to enable up to 17 units to be built. The Health Service has also generously donated funds for a Feasibility Study to be undertaken over the next two months. Christine Nunn, from Project Partnerships, will prepare our Feasibility Study and will consult widely as part of her research. Two Community consultations are scheduled for Wednesday 18th April in the Dunolly Town Hall at 2pm and 6pm, so put the date aside. An extensive community survey will also be conducted through the district.

We have also begun consulting with organisations that finance and manage housing programs for vulnerable, older people and our project is generating a lot of interest. The intersection of housing and health issues we observe in the Dunolly district can be replicated throughout small rural communities. We are fortunate to have suitable land available and active support from the MDHS Board and Executive, so the Auxiliary is keen to prepare our submission as soon as possible. We will keep our communities informed at every step along the way.

There is a lot happening in Dunolly!

The Tiny Towns Arts Trail is now in its third year.

As the brainchild of the Dunolly District Inc., in collaboration with the Ministry of Fun, Central Goldfields Shire Regional Centre for Culture (RCC) and Creative Arts Victoria, we have some amazing events in the pipeline. There are some wonderful exhibitions coming to Dunolly, plus workshops that will launch in early April and continue through to the Tiny Towns Arts Trail. The Trail this year runs over two weekends: Saturday 21st/28th and Sunday 22nd/29th April.

Celebrate arts and creativity across the region over the two weekends that book-end Anzac Day. Great weather; great events and wonderful things to see and do.

We have Deborah Halpern coming to exhibit and work with the community in Dunolly. Deborah is an internationally-renowned sculptor, with work in most major Australian cities and regional centres. Deborah is probably best-known for her iconic angel that stood in the moat of the National Gallery Victoria (NGV) for 17 years.

Deborah's month-long exhibition at the Dunolly Court House Precinct will open Thursday 31st March and will feature both slumped and blown glass, ceramics, mosaic, fibreglass, plus works on paper. Along with photography by Richard Tatti, all the works will be on sale. We will then have an opportunity for eight local people to work with Deborah over the Easter weekend, learning with her how to design and complete a mosaic panel. All materials and tools supplied. The cost is \$380, of which Deborah is donating a percentage back to the community to augment a grant we have received from the RCC and Creative Victoria. The grant is to produce a large public sculpture. Led by Deborah and working with the whole Dunolly community, this six-month project will bring more workshops and up-skilling opportunities. This is an extraordinary chance to

be part of a public sculpture build with Deborah Halpern.

We also have two David Archer workshops coming later in April, all in the lead up to the Trail. Friday 13th April is a one day 11–14yr old Kid's Wacky Wire Critterbug workshop only \$25, to be held at the Ministry of Fun, followed by an Automata Workshop for only eight participants. It is booking fast. The cost is only \$125 for the whole 5-day workshop, Saturday 14th to Wednesday 18th April. All materials and tools supplied. We have this amazing opportunity due to the Regional Centre of Culture! To book email: ministryoffundunolly@gmail.com or text to 0491 002 484.

At the moment, the Red Dog on Broadway project has quietly launched, with workshops every Saturday morning between 10am and 1pm (except Easter) in the lead-up to the Trail. Come along; it is all free and we are painting portraits and other fun projects to celebrate the dogs in our lives. If you are not sure if you can draw or paint, we have some great ideas to get you started. Bring along your dog or a photo. The Art works will then be displayed up and down Broadway as part of the Tiny Towns Arts Trail and you will all have an opportunity to sell your paintings, or perhaps buy one! We are hoping to capture some pictures and stories of locals and their pooches and immortalise them in paint. Look out for information on Red Dog holiday activities for children.

The Fitness Seminar with Peter Conroy Fundraising Event

The Fitness Seminar with Peter Conroy held last Saturday 10th March, was a success despite last-minute changes.

We had a great attendance, even with the long weekend, where most people were away on holiday.

Peter Conroy has over 29 years experience in the fitness industry and he has a successful Karate Club and Tournament Squad representing Victoria in both State/National and International championships. Peter also works as a personal trainer based in Camperdown Victoria.

The seminar began with Peter talking about what he does as a personal trainer and shared his experience with his weight issue, which is a common and sensitive subject most people face nowadays.

All attendees then had a Free Body Composition Reading (RRP \$60) using the Tanita scale which measures the percentages of bone, fat, water and muscle in your body.

It also measures your metabolic rate (BMR) and Body Mass Index (BMI) and gives your metabolic age as compared with your actual age.

This body analysis scale gives a true indicator of your inner health and, when monitored over time, can show the impact of any fitness regime or weight loss programme.

Peter said body composition science was established in 1944 and is not the sort of thing that your GP will speak to you about. It is, however, used in the Australian Institute of Sport and by personal trainers worldwide to assist people to both understand and manage their health and fitness.

Everyone had a good laugh about their metabolic ages, some were younger than their actual ages, some were older, and some were exactly the same as their actual ages.

Peter also talked about some dietary supplement products, which also benefit most of his PT clients, and shared his knowledge and experience on these products. Peter's trip to Dunolly took several hours from home to run the seminar, plus, he is donating the commission of his sales to me to assist me with my fundraising. More people with a terminal illness in Central Goldfields Shire will be able to get the compassionate in-home palliative care and support they need, with additional funding from the Andrews Government.

Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, today announced Maryborough District Health Service would share in \$3.86 million this year to improve access to community palliative care services for people living in rural and regional Victoria.

The Labor Government is investing more than \$62 million in additional funding over five years to support more terminally ill Victorians to be cared for, and die, at home.

In 2017/18, this funding boost will provide home-based palliative care for additional 1,215 people and their families across country Victoria.

Ms Pulford said Maryborough District Health Service will receive \$29,822 this year to expand its in-home palliative care services.

"We know most people want to die at home, close to family and loved ones. This boost will give people with a terminal illness in Central Goldfields Shire more support to be cared for at home," Ms Pulford said.

"Speaking from my own experience, local end-of-life care services make a real difference helping people make the most of every moment as their life draws to an end," she said.

"I'm very passionate about this issue and I'm immensely proud to be part of a Government that is supporting quality and compassionate end-of-life and palliative care that relieves pain and suffering, giving more people the support they need to die in their place of choice,' Ms Pulford said.

The funding means more locals than ever can access high quality end-of-life care that relieves pain and suffering and provides empowering support to family, friends and carers, when they need it most.

In 2017/18, the Labor Government is also investing \$1.25 million to establish a 24-hour expert palliative care advice line, \$3.9 million for additional palliative care physician or nurse practitioner positions in Regional Palliative Care Consultancy Services and \$10 million in grants for end-of-life auxiliary support services.

The Government has also delivered \$5 million in equipment and infrastructure grants for community palliative care agencies to assist them to deliver care in people's homes.

The end-of-life auxiliary support services grant is available to a wide range of non-clinical informal and 'grass roots' ancillary organisations that are providing practical and timely support for people with life-limiting illnesses and their families and carers.

The 2018 Keep Victoria Beautiful Tidy Towns – Sustainable Communities Awards are now open.

These awards are an opportunity to recognise, highlight and celebrate what's great about our towns while acknowledging the hard work that has made your area special, sustainable and liveable.

Award categories include environmental sustainability, protection of the environment, litter prevention, active schools, resource recovery and waste management, young leaders, community actions and leadership, and more.

In mentioning Tidy Towns and taking pride in our beautiful region, it's timely to remind our residents to please ensure your property doesn't become unsightly and to remove any build-up of rubbish.

Unsightly properties, such as those littered with rusty machinery and cars, rotting mattresses, old tyres and other dilapidated and unused material, create a poor first impression of our region to visitors. Furthermore, no one wants to live (or work) beside an unsightly property. As litter builds on a property it lessens the ability of owners to mow and maintain their yards, while creating a haven for vermin and snakes. What's more, as surrounding grass and vegetation grows longer and thicker, these properties can become a fire risk.

Council's Local Laws officers continue to make regular visual assessments of properties and issue clean-up notices to residents whose properties become eyesores. Where possible, Council will work with residents who have been issued a clean-up notice to resolve the problem.

If owners refuse to cooperate, Council will either take steps to enforce the clean up or (as a last resort) undertake the work itself, requiring the property owner to reimburse costs to Council.

While Council respects ratepayers' rights to use or enjoy their residential land, we must also ensure we keep the best interests of the broader community front and centre.

Duck season opening

With the opening of the 2018 duck hunting season starting on Saturday 17th March, Victoria's Game Management Authority is reminding hunters that bag limits remain at 10 birds per person per day. The hunting of the Blue-winged Shoveler is prohibited.

New times for the weekend have been introduced this year, that is, 9am on Saturday 17th March and 8am on Sunday 18th March. Hunting ceases half an hour after sunset for every day of the season, including the opening weekend.

Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) is also reminding those taking part in the season to familiarise themselves with designated hunting areas at the water corporation's lakes, dams and reservoirs.




