## **A Proud Dunolly Veteran**



Four generations of the Rainbow family attended the Anzac service in Dunolly — Lindsay with his son Darryl, granddaughter Karlene and great grandson Connor.

In the small crowd that gathered around the cenotaph on Broadway on Anzac day was a long time Dunolly resident, Lindsay Rainbow. Lindsay's medals attracted my attention as they were all earned in a conflict that is often called the 'forgotten war', fought in Korea from 1950 to 1953.

The war seemed depressingly inevitable after the Korean peninsula was handed over to the US and the USSR after WW11. The two powers divided the peninsula into north and south. An uneasy peace reigned until June 1950 when the Russian-backed Korean People's Army invaded south Korea, reaching the capital Seoul in a week. The UN met and asked the security council for help and 21 nations, including Australia agreed to commit military resources to the conflict. The first Australian troops arrived in Korea in September 1950. In all 17,000 Australians were on active duty in Korea during the conflict with 339 casualties and over 1200 wounded.

Lindsay Rainbow was a young lad living on a farm in Tasmania in 1951, when he went in search of a navy recruitment office in Launceston.

Instead, he found an army office and was readily accepted for basic training at Puckapunyal in Victoria. Lindsay joined the 3<sup>rd</sup> RAR battalion as a machine gunner. He travelled to Japan and then to Pusan, South Korea, arriving in February 1952. He was 19 years old.

Lindsay remembers vividly the journey up to the front line. After travelling in trucks to Seoul and then to battalion HQ,

10 miles from the front line, Lindsay and several other new arrivals were put into a truck to travel the last 10 miles. It was dark and there were frequent stops to deliver men to various units along the way until Lindsay was the last man left in the truck, seemingly forgotten.

At last he was dropped at the bottom of a hill, with instructions to wait until someone came down from the hill to collect him. Standing alone in the pitch dark Lindsay imagined every noise was an enemy soldier. He was finally collected, as promised, and taken to his post. The hill proved to be hill 355, called Little Gibraltar by the US troops.

Although the American troops took all the praise for holding this strategic point, Lindsay knows it was the Australian troops who were in the front line here.

Lindsay spent three months in the front line, often under heavy shelling, living in the open in dug-outs in freezing winter conditions. His 'bed' was what he described as a rabbit burrow he crawled into and backed out of, until he managed to excavate enough space to enable him to sit up.

Whilst in the front lines, troops weren't able to wash or change their clothes for up to six weeks at a time. They slept in their clothes in an attempt to keep warm.

The cold must have been intense as tanks could be driven over the frozen rivers in the middle of winter.

As a machine gunner, Lindsay became used to carrying heavy weights. In addition to the usual pack and rifle that riflemen carried, machine gunners had to carry either the tripod gun or ammunition. Each part weighed 50 pounds.

On 27 July 1953 a ceasefire was declared in Korea and Lindsay headed back to Australia. His military service continued however, and he undertook a training course to gain the rank of Corporal. He was successful and was to continue his military service in Australia. However, Lindsay saw a much more useful and active role in Korea, so he headed back to the peninsula, arriving this time, in November 1953. Hostilities had ceased, so active service involved many training exercises and patrolling of the North/ South border. Lindsay proved to be a capable officer when, by a twist of circumstances, he found himself in charge of a machine gun shoot exercise, the success of which was noted and praised by the British officers in charge. After initially being told that he would never make an officer because of his limited education, Lindsay was promoted to Sergeant, a rank he is deservedly very proud of.

He left Korea for good in November 1954. He has never returned to the peninsula although he did have the opportunity a few years ago. He would not return without his wife, Marg.



Lindsay reflects on his time on active service in Korea, as mostly a very happy one. Conditions were harsh and the front line was a dangerous place to be but there was great mateship, with many firm friendships

formed along the way. Lindsay has no regrets and declares would 'do it all again'.

He returned to the farm in Tasmania after his military service but found it a hard way to make a living. After a variety of jobs around Gippsland, Lindsay found Dunolly through his interest in prospecting. He has called Dunolly home for almost 40 years and wouldn't live anywhere else. It was wonderful to sit with Lindsay and hear his story. Many thanks to Lindsay and his wife Marg for sharing his story of the 'forgotten war. Faye Arnold

Thinking about the various hotels Liz and I stayed at when travelling in America and Europe, and on a more recent cruise to the Greek Islands and Turkey, I think we both agree that Hotel Diva in Athens was our very favourite. It was just a small hotel in a residential street and we could wave to the families from our balcony to theirs across the narrow street where people would sit eating and drinking and talking and laughing. Diva, was so small that the man on Reception also served behind the bar and brought our breakfast. His name was Andreas and we used to choose the window table for breakfast because he would hang Billis, the resident bird, at that window each morning. We struck up a friendship with Billis and chatted together. Andreas would come over and give us helpful information about the places to visit, where to eat and how much we should pay for taxi fares. We had already been ripped off by the taxi driver from the airport.

This way we discovered interesting, local places not generally known to tourists as we preferred to stay outside the popular tourist areas. Arriving home, hot and tired, we rushed to the fridge for cold drinks only to discover that when you inserted your key card to open the door when leaving the room, everything turned itself off, including the air conditioner and fridge, which only came on when you put the card in once you entered the room. On our last night Andreas said he wanted to buy us a drink. I was about to demur when Liz whispered that in Greece it was considered impolite to refuse and not everyone was made that offer. So we happily sat up on stools at the bar and joined Andreas in a glass of Retsina, the popular Greek wine.

### Large Scale Solar Farm in Carisbrook

Community members will have the opportunity to learn more about plans to build a solar farm at Carisbrook this week.

German engineering company ib vogt GmbH has proposed plans to construct a 260 hectare solar farm which will be located near the Pyrenees Highway and Bald Hill Road. The plans for the farm include solar panels, battery storage, site offices and electrical connection works, including an easement to connect to the existing 66kv power line located to the west of the site. The company is hosting a community open day on Thursday 3rd May from 1pm to 7pm at the Carisbrook Senior Citizens Hall, where plans of the solar farm proposal will be on display and members of staff will be available to answer questions. Feedback forms will also be provided on the day.

According to ib vogt, the planning application will assess biodiversity post-contact and Aboriginal cultural heritage, visual amenity and landscape character, flooding and drainage, noise and land use and resources.

ib vogt specialise in large scale solar project development and operates in countries around the world. They first became active in Australia in 2016 and their first Australian project was an energy plant, Williamsdale Solar Farm, near Canberra in the ACT.

"Volunteers are the backbone of our society. From all across the state and here in Western Victoria, they work tirelessly to help others," Ms Pulford said.

"Now is the time to celebrate everything they do and I urge everyone to get nominating to ensure our great volunteers in Western Victoria get the official thanks they deserve," she said.

Victoria's volunteer sector is worth more than \$2.3 billion to the state economy, a figure that is expected to increase to \$4.2 billion by 2021.

### Policies adopted as part of Organisation and Governance Reform Program

An update on the Organisation and Governance Reform Program – Central Goldfields Shire was presented to a meeting of Central Goldfields Shire

Council on Tuesday (24/04). As part of the update the following policies were adopted/reviewed:

### Service Charter

The Service Charter demonstrates Council's commitment to providing our community with a responsive experience. Service to those who have dealings with Council is a high priority for our staff the Charter outlines service standards around quality, availability and reliability of the many services Council provides.

### **Complaint Resolution Policy and Procedure**

The Complaint Resolution Policy and Procedure was developed in accordance with the seven principles as outlined in the Victorian Ombudsman's Councils and complaints - A good practice guide'. The Policy provides a robust structure that the community and Council officers can use to resolve complaints ensuring the process is easy to follow and timely action is taken to respond to complaints received.

The Service Charter and the Complaint Resolution Policy and Procedure was put out for public feedback with one response received.

### Protected Disclosure Policy and Protected Disclosure Procedure

The Protected Disclosure Act requires Council to establish procedures to facilitate the making of disclosures, for investigations of disclosed matters, and for the protection of persons from reprisals by way of detrimental action for having made a disclosure. The Protected Disclosure Policy and Protected Disclosure Procedure provides a system for reporting disclosures of improper conduct or detrimental action by councillors or employees.

Consultation within the organisation was undertaken as part of development of both the Protected Disclosure Policy and Protected Disclosure Procedure. It was also referred to the members of the Audit and Risk Advisory Committee for feedback.

#### Fraud and Corruption Policy Review

The Fraud and Corruption Policy outlines Council's commitment to the prevention, deterrence, detection and investigation of all forms of fraud and corrupt conduct. It demonstrates a proactive approach to preventing fraudulent and corrupt behaviour, and puts in place a mechanism for reporting this behaviour if it is suspected to be occurring. The policy was provided to the members of the Audit and Risk Advisory Committee for feedback. Council Procurement **Policy Review** 

As a requirement of S186 of the Local Government Act, Council must review its Procurement Policy at least once per financial year. The existing Policy was reviewed by staff and Council's Internal Auditors.

### **Curtis Stone's Stir fried rice noodles** with chicken and vegetables

### Ingredients

1/4 cup (60ml) oyster sauce

2 tbsp light soy sauce 1 tbsp Chilli Garlic Sauce (optional)

150g Thai Noodles

2 tbsp olive oil, divided

500g Coles RSPCA Approved Chicken Mince 120g fresh loose cup mushrooms, thinly sliced

carrot, peeled, cut into thin matchstick-size strips 1 (about 100g)

1 small brown onion; thinly sliced (about 150g)

1 Spring onion, thinly sliced

1. In a small bowl, whisk the oyster sauce, soy sauce, chilli garlic sauce, if using, and 2 tbsp water.

2. In an large pot of heavily salted boiling water, cook the noodles for 4-5 mins or until al dente.

Rinse the noodles under cold water. Drain.

3. Heat 1 tbsp of the oil in a wok or large heavy frying pan over medium-high heat. Add the chicken and cook, without stirring, for 2 mins or until the chicken is well browned on the bottom. Continue cooking, breaking up the chicken into small clusters, for 2-3 mins or until just cooked through. Transfer the chicken to a heatproof bowl and set aside:

**4.** In the wok over high heat, heat the remaining 1 tbsp oil. When the oil is smoking, add the mushrooms, carrot and onion and stir-fry for 2 mins or until the mushrooms are tender. Stir in the cooked chicken and then the sauce mixture. Add the noodles and toss until well combined and heated through.

5. Divide the noodle mixture among 4 serving bowls. Garnish with spring onion and serve immediately. Serves 4 Prep 15min, cooking 15min

### LEAVING ENGLAND ON THE FAIR SKY

The Fair Sky left England in early December 1962 on a month long journey to Australia with my family of seven and 1,643 other passengers and crew on board. I suppose it was rather a big ship, really? According to my research, The Fair Sky served with distinction in WW11 as an Assault Carrier named H.M.S. Attacker. She saw extensive service and was awarded **Royal Navy Battle Honours** for her support to the Salerno landings in 1943, the Atlantic campaign 1943-1944, and the South of France landings in 1944. She also saw service in the Aegean Sea in 1944. She was then refurbished and renamed as a passenger liner for migrants between Britain and Australia. How impressive!

But me, being not quite nine years old, had no idea about things like that when I found myself in a small cabin with two sisters, two brothers and mum and dad. Well actually we had two cabins. Colin, (my older brother) dad and six year old Glen had a cabin opposite ours. I often wondered why I went to sleep in Mum's cabin and woke up in dad's with all my other siblings, hmmm?

The first night on board the ship was calm and still, and after a fight with Glen about who would have the top bunk - (I was older and bigger at that time), I won! We all went to sleep. The next morning my dad told me we were at last on our way. "I know, I can feel it bumping." I said. "Oh, that's only the waves making the ship go up and down," he replied.

As I said earlier I fought with Glen for the top bunk. By the time that first day was over we were fighting for who would have the bottom bunk! Anything to ease the tossing and turning! I felt so ill I thought I was going to die! Kay, my 6 month old baby sister loved the rocking, Bridget didn't seem to be affected and neither did Colin or dad! Anyway I couldn't have cared less who else was ill. All I knew was that I was, and that was the most important thing! I think all I did in that first week was lie in my bunk and moan and cry for someone to ease my suffering. All I could eat was milk-arrowroot biscuits with butter spread on them, (to this day I still love them). Dad at one stage came in, tossed me over his shoulder and took me on deck." The fresh sea air will do you good" he said. Well, he must have been right because miraculously I got my sea legs not long after!

I then started to explore the ship with Colin. I seem to remember that the stairs from one deck to the other were very steep and we would sort-of slide down them rather than step. We found a cardboard box at one stage and slid down them, like on a sled, and got thoroughly yelled at by Rosa, our cabin lady who looked after our deck. As she was yelling at us in Italian (I think), we were just staring at her uncomprehendingly and then snuck away to find something else to do! Of which there was plenty! There was shuttle board, tennis, swimming, a library and a theatre, not to mention all the nooks and crannies to explore. We even had to go to school, which I wasn't too keen on.

The week before Christmas we had arrived at the Suez Canal and Aden. Mum and Dad and Colin went ashore at Aden and I chucked a tantrum because they wouldn't let me go too! (Rosa was to look after us) Colin, on his return said it was a good job I didn't go as it was terrible to see all the children begging in the street.

Mum had done quite a bit of shopping in Aden She bought things like wooden camel stools with leather seats, ottomans and elephant statues. (I remember years later she decided to unpick the leather from the camel seats for cleaning and found that they were stuffed with used bandages. I think we had a huge bonfire that day!) My Christmas present that year was a pair of bright blue embroidered sandals with a turned-up toe; they were beautiful, and a tall doll with a red velvet outfit that had a peplum skirt, very flash. I forgave my parents after that for not taking me ashore.

From one port to the other (Egypt to Aden maybe?) there were merchants in their Arab robes allowed on board to sell their exotic wares. I was fascinated with them, not having seen anyone like them before and spent a lot of time talking to them, most of it in sign language. I know they were fascinated by Bridget's red hair and freckles and they gave her little gifts.

I tried to sell her to them but they wouldn't have it (just joking). That was when I noticed the days starting to get really hot!

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### Getting behind neighbourhood houses in Central Goldfields Shire

The Andrews Government is delivering record new funding to neighbourhood houses across Victoria to support staff, their volunteers and the local communities they serve.

The Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said this week's budget commits \$21.8 million across the neighbourhood house network so that more families can access the activities and services they need and want, closer to home.

The Budget investment includes the biggest ever boost to coordination hours, with an extra 76,700 hours to be delivered each year to more houses across the state.

Ms Pulford said Maryborough Community House and Dunolly and District Neighbourhood Centre are both eligible for an increase, which would take their total of funded hours from 20 hours per week to 25 hours per week.

"We back neighbourhood houses because they're the heart of any community, including here in Central Goldfields Shire," she said.

"This is a boost that will have a real impact on all those connected to neighbourhood houses, whether it be their staff, their volunteers or the people that visit them," Ms Pulford said.


The extra funding takes the Labor Government's contribution to Maryborough Community House and Dunolly and District Neighbourhood Centre to \$73,801 each per year.

Minister for Families and Children, Jenny Mikakos, said it's the biggest ever increase in funding to neighbourhood houses. "In one Budget we're investing almost eight times what the former Liberal Government spent during their entire term," Ms Mikakos said.

Neighbourhood Houses Victoria CEO, Nicole Battle, said neighbourhood houses are used by almost 200,000 people each week.

"This is a much-needed investment that will ensure we support even more locals, whether it's with a warm meal, life skills and advice or just a friendly space for them to relax," Ms Battle said.

### Victoria Police Star Posthumously Awarded To Local Man

Descendants of Olaf Hoyem gathered at Victoria Police Glen Waverley Police Academy Chapel on Wednesday April 18 to witness Brien Mason receive Olaf's Victoria Police Star medal.

The Victoria Police Star was introduced in September 2005 and is a medal to recognize Victoria Police employees killed or seriously injured in the line of duty.

The inaugural Victoria Police Star was awarded at 2005's National Police Remembrance Day Service and honored Constables Stephen Tynan and Damian Eyre who were gunned down in Walsh Street, South Yarra in 1988.

Olaf was born in Logan in 1863 and joined the Victorian police. It was while he was stationed at Benalla that he met an untimely death while on duty. Transcribes from the event described the death in the following manner.

"At about 1pm on Saturday, 10th August 1895, Mounted Constable Hoyem was at Quandong Hill, 1.5 miles on the Benalla side of Devenish, having just completed his regular monthly patrol of the locality. He had just finished speaking with Mounted Constable Chenhal of Dookie and Mounted Constable Slattery of St. James and was attempting to mount his horse when it shied and he was thrown to the ground. His skull was fractured and he died three and a half hours later."

Olaf was 33 years old at the time of his death and his body was returned to Rheola cemetery where he is buried with his mother Bridget and half-brother John Wallis.

Brien Mason is Olaf's great nephew and received the medal on his behalf from Chief Commissioner of Victoria Police, Graham Ashton.

Along with the McIntyre connection to the Mason family are the Lyons/Ridge family from Logan who also feature in Olaf's family tree.

Descendants who attended the ceremony were Brien and Valerie Mason, Peter Ridge, Bernadette Ridge, Mark Mason, Jane Sharkey, Sarah-Jo Mason, Helen Mason, Peter Booth, John Mason, Jillian Harriott and Monica Mason.



### **Fire danger** period ends

The fire danger period (FDP) finished on Tuesday 1 May, in the following local municipalities;

- Central Goldfields Shire Council
- Greater Bendigo City Council
- Macedon Ranges Shire Council
- Mount Alexander Shire Council

CFA ACO for North West Region Gavin Thompson emphasised that although the FDP as ended it is important to remain vigilant.

"Residents who wish to conduct burn-offs on their private properties need to follow some basic rules. Register your burn-offs first and foremost, check weather conditions as well as monitor the wind, and follow local council laws and regulations."

Mr Thompson also emphasised the importance of communication, "It is important that as well as registering your burn-offs with ESTA, you are alerting your neighbours that they may see smoke on the set dates."

"Every year our CFA crews are wasting resources responding to false alarms because people are not registering their burn-offs. If you register your burn off and somebody rings, spotting smoke, the incident will be cross-checked with the burn-off register and prevent an angry CFA crew showing up on your door."

"There are few things that annoy CFA fireys more than being taken away from family, friends, work and potential emergencies over a false alarm caused by an unregistered burn-off."

Landowners can register their burn-off with the Emergency Services Telecommunications Authority (ESTA) by calling 1800 668 511 or emailing burnoffs@esta.vic.gov.au

Mr Thompson said that whether registering a burn-off by phone or email, people should be prepared to give some basic information including location, date, expected start and finish times, estimated size, and what they intended to burn.

"The burn off line is very easy to use – the operators are friendly, and prompt you by asking the key questions," he




