I know that they can be a menace for farmers, but surely there is another answer other than culling this beautiful creature.

My comment is about the road carnage and the distressing number of dead kangaroos on the side of the roads. I have been fortunate enough to never hit a kangaroo. However, I have had some near misses. Less speed is the reason I have been able to avoid an accident. When travelling at daybreak or twilight, I always allow myself enough time to travel slowly and be fully alert to the danger of kangaroos. Just because the speed limit is 100kph, it is very foolish to travel at this speed when kangaroos are on the move. Do we always have to be in such a hurry? Take time to smell the roses. Michael Whittle composed the emotive ballad Last Man



From Dunolly for friends and family travelling to France for ANZAC day. He was overwhelmed with attention after the ABC's Australia All Over program broadcast the song nationally. Mr Whittle said the 5,533 Australian soldiers who died in the 1916 battle of Fromelles inspired the song. ABC radio presenter lan 'Macca' McNamara announced Last Man From Dunolly as the top song of the year.

Mr McNamara, whose show features on 774 ABC's Sunday morning schedule, said Mr Whittle's composition was a "great little Australia song".

"Lots of little country towns like Dunolly lost lots of folk aged 18 to 25, so it's a little piece that says a lot about Australia and Australian country towns."

We are delighted that Mike Whittle will be coming to Dunolly to sing his ballad in The Queen's Birthday production of the *Dunolly Follies*.

Shire successful in Fire Access Road funding

Central Goldfields Shire was successful in obtaining funding from the Country Fire Authority and the Victorian Government's Fire

Access Road Subsidy Scheme (FARSS).

Through the 2017/18 FARSS, two Fire Access Roads have been constructed at Timor's Browns Road and Gane Street in Talbot with \$6,378.78 and \$11,771.16 being granted for the projects respectively. The Fire Access Roads will allow access for emergency service vehicles and local residents to evacuate if a crisis scenario should arise.

Gane Street provides a secondary emergency access for the Talbot Primary School to the north. Local residents on Browns Road, which is 2.64 kilometres in length, are concerned about maintaining road access during the fire season.

The Shire was also successful in receiving funding of \$7,350 to complete a Fire Access Road at Mortlocks Road in Archdale which will be completed in December this year. Central Goldfields Shire Chief Administrator Noel Harvey said the two Fire Access Roads will be of a huge benefit to the community.

"The Fire Access Roads on Gane Street and Browns Road will significantly improve local residents' safety and access for emergency services, particularly the CFA," Mr Harvey said.

"We are really pleased to be able to deliver this project for the community and we also look forward to establishing the Fire Access Road on Mortlocks Road, which has been a sought after initiative."

Background information

The total length of Fire Access Roads throughout the Shire is 51.7 km of which 10 km is maintained to standard above a Fire Access Road. The remaining 41.8 km is maintained to a fire access standard.

Graffiti prevention project a great success

More than 220 local students, aged 10 to 18 years of age, have participated in the graffiti prevention project – 'Sorry About Your Wall'.

Funded by the Victorian Government's Community Crime Prevention Program, the project was a partnership between Central Goldfields Shire, Victoria Police and the Central Goldfields Art Gallerv.

Central Goldfields Shire General Manager Infrastructure Assets and Planning Rebecca Stockfeld said the project had been well received by local schools.

"It has been fantastic to see a positive initiative around graffiti prevention being carried out across our community."

"Graffiti is a significant issue for most councils so it's great to see our local young people getting involved in this project which was led by a professional graffiti and mural artist."

The graffiti murals created by students will now go on display at schools across the Shire.

The 'Sorry About Your Wall' project aimed to:

- Contribute to the development of a youth-led graffiti prevention strategy and action plan for the municipality
- Inform young people about the laws pertaining to graffiti
- Provide art instruction and resources to produce privacy screen murals

Facilitate a travelling road show event which showcases works created by schools in graffiti hot spot areas

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Rego relief for families in Central Goldfields Shire

Central Goldfields Shire residents have embraced changes to car registration by taking up the Andrews Government's new, flexible short-term vehicle registration options.

The Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said a total of 2,517 Central Goldfields Shire residents have signed up for three or six-monthly registration since the changes were enacted in January, 2018.

Ms Pulford said the flexible payment option was relieving financial pressure on families and providing a boost to household budgets.

"We're relieving financial pressure on Central Goldfields families by giving them the flexibility to choose a payment plan that suits their needs," Ms Pulford said.

"Already, more than half a million people are experiencing the welcome relief of choosing more flexible and easy registration options and that's something that's helping budgets across Western Victoria," she said.

Of the eligible vehicle owners who have opted for the budget friendly short-term registration options, 51% have selected the three-month option and 49% have chosen to register their vehicles for six months.

Across Victoria, more than 24,000 people are signing up to the new short-term vehicle registrations each week.

The flexible payment option is proving most popular with the 26-35 year age group.

Owners of cars, utes, vans, motorcycles and other light vehicles are now able to make the switch to shorter term registration, or continue with an annual registration fee by creating a myVicRoads account. Creating a myVicRoads online account will allow owners to choose the registration option that suits them, and receive electronic reminders when their registration is due.

The Government has invested \$12 million to upgrade VicRoads registration systems, paving the way for short term registration.





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John Flynn and his wondrous inventions

Your story of John Flynn, of the Royal Flying Doctor Services jogged my memory of research work that I had done on wire strainers.

John Flynn Sr, a school teacher, was transferred from Moliagul to Macedon some time during the 1880s as Flynn was granted a Victorian patent number, number 4678 on August 21, 1886 for an improved wire strainer. His invention was also granted New Zealand number 2001 on September 6, 1886.

It would seem these patents lapsed as we next find Flynn and James Frederick Kilburn, Engineer of 15 Howitt Street, South Yarra, apply for a NZ patent for an invention for an improved wire strainer and key; it being given number 2439 on July 22, 1887. It was also patented in Victoria on August 2, 1887, number 5270, and Tasmania, number 472, 1887. Eventually patents were taken out in each state and in America. I have used the American drawings for clarity, however, the finished article has a straight arm B with ear like lugs D.

The wire strainer became an immediate success, being sold by major departmental stores, eg F Lassetter & Co, Svdney, McLean Bros., & Rigg, Melbourne.

Within a year of the successful 1887 patent, John Flynn had quit teaching, becoming "an agent for the sale of Mildura land and water rights.

A brief description of this wire strainer is that it strains the wire at any point between the posts and are then left permanently on the wire so that they may again be used for straining the wire when it sags or becomes slack. The body of this wire-strainer consists of a barrel which may be cylindrical at one end of which a strain-retaining finger is formed standing out at right angles to the barrel.

The extremity of the said finger is provided with a hook or bent point to retain and prevent the wire slipping off. The strain-retaining finger is the principal feature of this invention as by its use all descriptions of loose strain retaining pins or pawls are dispensed with.

At the other end of the barrel, two projecting claws or hooks are formed, for the purpose of gripping the wire to enable it to be wound upon the barrel as the strainer is rotated.

Further description of the strainer is available, but I think if I include it, this the article will become boring.

The relative position and form of the said claws or hooks may be varied. In the first and most preferable arrangement, the claws or hooks project outwardly from the end of the barrel and are formed parallel to each other, having their extremities pointing in opposite directions. A second and alternative arrangement of the claws consists in placing them at one end of the barrel, but at about right angles to each other. A third and other alternative arrangement consists in making the claws project from the periphery of the barrel near one end one of such claws being in the form of a tapered stud perpendicular to the barrel, the other being curved in the form of a helix so as to lead the wire on to the barrel when the strainer is rotated.


To rotate the wire-strainer, a key is provided, having a slot formed at one end to fit the flattened part of the retaining finger when it joins the barrel. A thumb-screw is fitted to the key for the purpose of securing it to the strainer whilst the operation of straining is being performed. An eye is formed at the other extremity of the key for receiving a handle
