It seems that our friends at DEWLP (Department Environment Water Land Planning) and CGFS (Central Goldfields Shire) require us to send them notification that Victoria has plague proportions of kangaroos causing untold damage to agriculture and huge damage to vehicles and people using our roads.

Madame Carandini

London-born Marie Carandini (1826-1894), *prima donna*, sailed to Hobart in 1833. She married an exiled Italian Count and travelled with opera companies around the Goldfields of Victoria before heading back to London to star at Covent Garden.

She may have been a dour diva, or a jolly soul, but her talent was undisputed. I certainly played her for laughs during Don Giovanni. In her hey-day, the goldminers would have been conversant with opera, as it was the music of the masses. It is likely that comedy would have been an integral part of the productions as they were for Shakespeare's plays. This music was not for the elite people would have hummed along to Mozart and Donizetti as they do with popular songs today. Madame Carandini was noted as being 'vivacious and piquant' in Donizetti's Daughter of the Regiment, claimed to be the most ambitiously-staged opera yet presented in the colonies. In June 1861 she sang at . Dunolly's Frayne's Opera Theatre - same year Melba was born. As an interesting aside, her grandson is actor Sir Christopher Lee, famed for his role as Count Dracula.

Travels with Cynthia

Anyone who reads my articles must get rather confused as I jump from the late 50s to the 80s and now I am progressing to the 2000s. A few short years ago Liz and I decided to go on a cruise to Turkey and the Greek Islands. In my young days of travelling, Greece had been one place on my projected itinerary, but which I had never made. Finally going there was certainly not a disappointment as Greece is one of the most beautiful old civilisations in the world. However, I never intended to write travelogues, as they have been done hundreds of times before. I will go back to our life on the cruise ship. After spending a few days in Athens where we walked and walked and walked, half the time because we couldn't find a booth to buy a ticket, just like our Myk now, we set off to the harbour at Piraeus to embark on our ship, the Cristal. First thing I noted was the last person's rubbish in the cupboard drawers so went up to the purser's office to report it. Did I make a mistake there because it turned out that our cabin steward was responsible and he was most upset. We finished up naming him Manuel because he so reminded us of Manuel in Fawlty Towers. He was a little Greek man, always bustling and over-attentive. I had to apologise for my oversight and from then on we almost had to chase him out of our cabin. He would bring us copies of the ship's bulletin, menus and always trying to please. Served me right.

Up in the dining room Liz and I chose the late sitting for meals and discovered we had the misfortune to share a table with six Americans; a couple who were retired teachers spending their lives on cruise ships travelling the world, adopting a superior attitude as a result, and four New Yorkers travelling together. We did not manage to get any scintillating conversation at that table. They were all almost non drinkers ,"Oh more than one glass puts me to sleep" and the New Yorkers were quite youngish. When Liz and I ordered a bottle of red the older woman said "Oh I suppose you will put a cork on it and take it away for tomorrow". Liz looked her in the eye and replied "Of course not. We are going to drink the bottle now." Shock, horror! One night the day's tour was being discussed and I mentioned how a lady from a different tour was waiting for the return of her group which she had left to go up the Arcadian Way. I was able to explain to her in French that they were not coming back but she needed to join them at the top. I was asked about my ability to speak French and Liz piped up and said "Yes Cynthia went to a French convent." Eyes opened wide because of course they all thought I had been schooled in France. Later when our superior lady was being a bit overbearing, Liz threw into the conversation that my family owned a castle. This wasn't strictly true as my ancestors had owned it in Scotland many moons ago, but it made everyone sit up and look impressed. What devils we were. Another drawback was having to sit next to the travelling husband because he was obsessed with Jaguar cars which he collected and restored and almost his entire conversation was Jags. Forgotten fire season arrives

Local fire brigades are urging Central Goldfields Shire residents to be mindful of house fires this winter during what is described as the "forgotten fire season".

The CFA and MFB launched their Residential Fire Safety Campaign this month to raise awareness of the winter fire season and to help people stay fire-safe around the house.

Last winter in Victoria there were around 15 percent more preventable house fires compared to other seasons, with the CFA attending 467 preventable house fires.

In 2017, chimney fires caused 121 fires in CFA areas and 29 fires related to wood-fuelled heating.

Cold weather-related causes of preventable house fires last year included fixed and portable heaters, central heating, chimney fire and combustibles too close to heating. Kitchens, bedrooms and lounges were the most common areas of origin of preventable house fires last year, with 1302 starting in kitchens, 245 in bedrooms and 219 in lounges.

The most common causes of preventable house fires in 2017 were unattended cooking, faulty electrical distribution, faulty electrical appliances and smoking.

Carisbrook CFA Captain Ian Boucher said the brigade sees more house fires during winter than any other fire season and urged locals to check their heaters and wood fires.

"We definitely see more house fires during winter, and you see a lot of fires started from wood fires at this time of year," he said. "Last year we attended a couple of preventable house fires that were caused by chimney flues being completely chocked up. People should get the flue on wood fires checked every 12 months, get a chimney sweep out as required and make sure it's clean. If you've got an open log fire inside don't leave it unattended because logs can roll out and cause fires. Make sure you get your gas heaters checked by a registered technician every 12 months. If you find yourself going to sleep by the heater at night it's probably a good time to get it checked. Heaters have been lying dormant over summer and probably haven't been cleaned out from the year before, or even a couple of years, and that's when things can go wrong."

Captain Boucher also recommended residents create an evacuation plan in case of a house fire. "If you've got a family, sit down and make sure you have a family evacuation plan. Make sure everybody knows what happens in the case of a fire and have a meeting point," he said.

Other fire safety tips include:

- keeping clothing a safe distance from heaters,
- cleaning the lint filters in clothes dryers,
- turning off electrical appliances that are not being used, avoid placing weighty objects on beds with electric blankets
- and taking care when cooking.

Jordan Ford was one of the patrons and will give you the theatre-goers perspective.



Council meeting outcomes

At its Meeting last week, Council adopted the 2018/19 Budget, following its display for comment (with no submissions received).

The 2018/19 Budget has more than \$11 million in capital expenditure (some of this expenditure is contingent on external funding). This includes \$4.1 million for recreational, leisure and community facilities, \$3.66 million for roads, \$0.85 million for parks, open space and streetscapes, \$0.35 million for urban and road drainage, and \$0.24 million for footpaths.

The average rate rise is 2.25 per cent in line with the State Government's rate capping level, while management of waste will remain cost neutral with kerbside rubbish collection charges to increase by five per cent. These waste management costs include the operation of landfills and transfer stations across the Shire as well as kerbside collection services (including recycling).

Other strategic documents adopted by Council at last week's meeting include the Domestic Animal Management Plan and Roadside Management Plan, which are now available on Council's website (www.loddon.vic.gov.au).

The Domestic Animal Management Plan sets out the framework for the planning and management of animal services across our Shire over the next four years. It outlines a number of strategic outcomes around issues associated with pets and pet ownership, such as increasing pet registrations and microchipping, decreasing the incidence of dog attacks and managing dangerous, menacing and restricted breed doas.

The Roadside Management Plan is Council's document for setting the direction for roadside management within the local rural road network in the Shire. It has four roadside management goals: maintain a safe road network, access for all road users, protect biodiversity and heritage assets, and increase awareness of roadside management and values.

Council also endorsed the reactivation of the Loddon Youth Council, which will use a range of engagement methods via new technologies, including a virtual Youth Council. Further engagement will include youth-led peer consultation, presentations by young people at Council Forums and a Youth Council Facebook group.

Council recognises the importance of young people to the future of the Shire and the value of working with our young people to ensure their voices are heard. The reactivation of the Loddon Youth Council will enable young people to get involved in the decision making process of Council, and assist them to develop the skills, confidence and opportunities to be active citizens.

Pick My Project deadline extended

Good news - the closing date to submit nominations for the Pick My Project grants initiative has been extended until midnight Sunday 8 July 2018.

If you haven't already heard about it, Pick My Project is a State Government initiative that gives community members the chance to suggest and decide on ideas that will make their community a better place to live. All Victorians aged 16 years and over have the chance to submit project ideas for consideration.

The closing date extension is a great opportunity for community members to try and secure funding for a favourite local idea or project that may not come under other grant programs.

Once you have your idea, you then need to partner with an eligible organisation, such as a community group, school or Loddon Shire, where appropriate, before you submit your idea.

Community members will decide on their favourite ideas by voting, with winning ideas receiving funding. Winning projects will be announced in September 2018.

Projects between \$20,000 and \$200,000 are eligible for the program, with a total of \$30 million allocated for Pick My Project to fund community ideas around the state.

Does it affect me?

Ticketmaster has notified by email, Australian customers who may have been affected.

All notified customers are being asked to reset their password before they next log into their account.

How do I stay safe?

There are a few simple steps you can take to help keep your information safe.

• Change your password on any accounts where you may have used the same email and password combination.



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- Use a strong password and don't reuse the same password on other websites.
- Use two-factor authentication so your account is protected by a second layer of security.
- Use a password manager to keep stock of all your passwords and login details.

If you are concerned that your personal information has been compromised and misused, you can contact Australia's National Identity and Cyber Support Service, IDCare or use their free Cyber First Aid Kit. If you have been a victim of a cybercrime such as fraud, report it to the Australian Cybercrime Online Reporting Network (ACORN).







