

I went out there today to have a look. Part of that article, unfortunately is correct. There were unfilled detector holes on the side of the road near Walkers' shed. About 7 all up and only about 1 to 2 weeks old, the deepest being about 250mm deep. I went around and filled them all in. But the holes in the picture of the article were not detector holes but pot holes, as the road was full of corrugations and water ruts or runs across the dirt road. The road did not look like to me that it had a grader over it for months. Some of the pot holes in the road I think are the same ones as the photos in the article. I'm trying to contact this lady that wrote the article to explain the difference between detector holes and pot holes.

Letter 5 - More About The Holes

After reading my letter in last week's Welcome Record, Bill Schulz, president of the Prospectors and Miners Association of Victoria Central Goldfields branch, left a message on my answering machine. During my Monday walk, I checked the holes in the road and to my delight found they had been filled in. As they had been well-compacted by Sunday's rain I could see it was not the council who had filled them in. When I rang Bill to enquire, he did confess to being one of the hole repairers. He said that PMAV members often repair the holes of mystery prospectors who failed to fill them in. He added that there was no excuse for holes being left unfilled as it clearly states on your miner's licence that you must fill in any holes you dig.

The PMAV have an information stall at the Maryborough Market every month, and they meet regularly on the third Tuesday of the month. They currently have about 190 members in the Central Goldfields branch. If you are new to prospecting and want to find out more about your rights and responsibilities call in to their stall at the Maryborough Market. They will be pleased to go through it all with you. He also said you are not allowed to dig up gazetted roads, which Alice Street is.

Maldon Community Bank's children's resilience grants announced

A grant of \$10,000 will enable Dunolly and Newstead primary schools to roll out the Secret Agent Society Program at each school. The innovative program provides tools for parents and teachers to understand and support children with social and emotional challenges.

"The Dunolly PS community is thrilled to once again receive support from the Maldon & District Community Bank. We are extremely excited to be able to offer the Secret Agent Society program in 2019. This program provides valuable social skills training for not only students but involves families as well in a 'wrap around' approach. We congratulate the Community Bank on their initiative to raise childrens' resilience in our region," said Dunolly Principal Katie Lovel.

The Maldon Neighbourhood Centre received \$4,000 to support playgroup activities in Maldon. Training and support for volunteers are key components of the project, as well educational techniques and activities to build skills and confidence in parents and carers.

The final grant of \$11,110 was presented to Castlemaine's Winters Flat Primary School's for a pilot program to develop reflective practice for teachers and early childhood educators.

Bank chairman Ross Egleton is looking forward to

seeing the three projects in action to address children's resilience in the region.

"This is the final round of funding addressing the priority of building children's resilience in the region. The community identified this as a chief priority three years ago for the bank to address in a new grants program."

"Our research told us that teachers and parents/families are key players in building resilience in children and that they needed more support. These projects focus on supporting teachers and parents, which in turn builds resilience in children."



Another interesting Dunolly visitor

Last weekend, on a couple of separate occasions, I had the opportunity of speaking to an interesting character, who had briefly stopped in Dunolly on one of his mammoth bicycle treks.

His bicycle is compactly stocked with everything required for his existence, not to mention also being armed with every possible piece of necessary technology, including tablet, solar panels and a drone. A tent, cooker and up to 45 days' worth of food, mostly super-greens, are also part of his home on two wheels. One would imagine that the bike would be too heavy to ride those distances; he states that its total weight is 103kg.

Garry Orriss, originally from New South Wales, had travelled to Germany many years ago to meet his birth mother and has now lived there for 30 years, working as an artist. Whilst venturing around town, including at Dunolly Community Market, Garry spoke of his travels, sold posters of some of his artworks and had listeners amazed at his exploits. A metal detector, with which he had found a couple of small nuggets, each around 1.5g, in the local area, had previously been part of his kit, however he was able to lighten his load slightly by selling the detector to a local prospector whilst at the Market.

Cycling for many thousands of kilometres across Australia and Europe during the late 1980s and 1990s gave him a taste for much more and on this trip alone, he states that he has already travelled 8000km. He has intentions of riding around Australia for the next three or four years, encompassing another 26,000km of Australian roads, interspersed with visits to friends and relatives in NSW and Queensland. Next on his list is Tasmania, then off to Cape York, Darwin, Perth and back across the Nullarbor. We may see him in Dunolly again at some stage, as he has friends in the area and the lure of yet another gold nugget may entice him back! Jenny Scott.





# Coaches replace trains as Ballarat Line Upgrade works continue

A nine-day works blitz on the Ballarat line began at the weekend, with coaches replacing trains from Ballarat to Southern Cross Station until 16th December.

The works began on Saturday and will enable construction to continue on station upgrades, new stabling facilities and track duplications, as works on the half-a-billion-dollar Ballarat Line Upgrade continue.

The works also include essential track and signal maintenance between Ararat and Deer Park. Coaches will replace trains for the entire journey between Ballarat, Wendouree and Southern Cross Station, while Maryborough trains will continue to run to and from Ballarat connecting with coaches between Ballarat and Southern Cross Station until Sunday, 16th December.

V/Line chief executive officer James Pinder said combining the V/Line works with Ballarat Line Upgrade construction would reduce the disruption for Ballarat, Ararat and Maryborough line passengers.

Our staff and contractors will use this time to complete maintenance work on parts of the Ballarat and Ararat lines, to ensure the track, signals and other infrastructure are in good shape for summer," he said.

"Staff will rappel down the 130-year-old Melton Weir viaduct and use underwater technology to inspect footings, as part of routine maintenance of our major bridges on the corridor.

"Track crews will replace rail near Parwan, as well as removing mud holes and vegetation overhanging the rail corridor between Bacchus Marsh and Ballarat."

Murray Basin Rail Project Stage Two works are continuing at Ararat Junction to allow freight trains to move more efficiently between the Maryborough to Ararat line and the interstate freight network.

Passengers are urged to plan ahead and allow 45 minutes' extra travel time while work is underway.

There will be a mix of express and semi-express coaches replacing trains, passengers can find a service that suits their needs by down-loading the coach replacement timetable from <a href="vline.com.au">vline.com.au</a>

The president (Wayne McKail) thanked the Interim committee for their efforts which has enabled the CGR&RAI to go into its first AGM with healthy membership and being financially secure. The meeting closed at 8.30pm with a thank you to the Committee and members and wishing all a safe Christmas and a good new year. Looking forward to 2019 and our AGM on 5th February 2019. See our members there, and hoping to see continued growth of this group.

# Wildlife warriors say goodbye after 30 years

Thirty years ago a tiny wallaby joey opened its eyes and looked up at Garry Cheers, who had just pulled the baby from its dead mother's pouch.

Overcome with compassion, Garry scooped it up and took it home to his wife Brenda, and from that day on the pair have dedicated their lives to caring for Australia's unique wildlife.

Brenda and Garry made the move to Maryborough from Boronia, Melbourne in 1985 and started the Maryborough Wildlife Shelter shortly after.

The shelter is well-known around the region as the place to take injured birds and animals, but after over 30 years of dedication and hard work, Brenda and Garry are hanging up their boots and calling it a day.

Brenda said she has been slowly closing down the shelter over the past 12 months and that she is looking forward to a well-deserved break.

"We're trying to slow down now, mostly because I want to spend time with my grandchildren before they get too old, and I want to do other things," Brenda said.

"You have to be here every four hours to feed animals so you're limited on what you can do and where you can go. I love it, but it's very wearing."

While the shelter is now slowing down, Brenda said people can still bring in wildlife, and that it is vital for animal's wellbeing that they are brought to a carer as soon as possible. "People can still call me and bring in animals and I'll pass them on to other carers," she said.

"You can also call the vet and they can organise carers. If you find something, call us. It's illegal to take home and keep wildlife. If you're caught and prosecuted the fines can be anything up to \$30,000. "Sometimes people keep animals for a few weeks which could've been saved, but by the time they're brought in it's too late for us to rehabilitate them."



# In the Vegie Patch

There is still time to plant tomatoes seedlings if you haven't already; provide shade if weather is very hot and keep evenly moist to avoid blossom rot. Plant in soil prepared with compost and manure, then liquid feed every two or three weeks when they start to flower and fruit. All varieties are better tied to stakes to keep stems and fruit off the ground, remove lower leaves to increase air flow and prevent disease.

Continue to plant successive sowing of dwarf beans. Butter beans can be sown now as they need warm weather to grow and mature. Beetroot can still be sown now and is a very handy veggie to have in the soil over the summer and autumn months. Sown at intervals will give a better chance of fresh roots over a long period of time. The short variety of carrots, the Chantenay is better sown after New Year and up until the end of March. They will grow and keep in the garden bed over winter, and into the late springtime.

Sow seeds of brassicas now to have the seedlings of cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli and Brussels sprouts to transplant near the end of January and in February. Broccoli can be planted later as it will mature in the early spring. Brussels sprouts are a winter-maturing veggie, and will not make sprouts once the warm weather sets in; the plant will only make growth. When transplanting these plants, cut off any long roots and long leaves. That will reduce the area from which moisture can be lost by the plant.

Water in the cool of the day. The best time is morning but, if you water in the afternoon, allow enough time for foliage to dry out before sunset. This reduces the risk of mildew and other fungi attacking leaves, and there's less chance you'll get caught by the evening shift of mosquitoes. Mildew frequently attacks pumpkin, zucchini and cucumber. Spray plants weekly with a solution made from one part cow's milk to 10 parts water. Repeat after heavy rain or irrigation. This remedy won't reverse mildew damage, but it's an effective preventative.

### **For Fruit Trees**

Hang pheromone traps in apple and pear trees to keep the codling moth grub controlled. Pick up all fallen fruit and destroy and remove any fruit showing signs of infestation. Cover trees with bird nets to prevent birds eating your fruit. Some summer pruning can be done on apricot trees, once the fruit has been removed. Also any non-bearing spurs on apple and pear trees can be cut out over the summer months, while they can be identified.


