80-year old warns residents of scams after losing \$26K

An 80-year-old Maryborough resident has fallen victim to a pre-Christmas scam, losing a total of \$26,000.

Magi Fowler, who moved to Maryborough last year, said she won't take it "lying down" and doesn't want anyone else to go through what she did.

"After it all happened I thought to myself, 'I've got to do something to stop other people suffering the same thing'. It was just awful," she said. "We moved here in July and my husband passed away not long after. The money was for some renovations the house needed. They almost cleaned out the account."

Ms Fowler said she was lucky to have realised what was happening before she lost more money. "I banged my head against the wall when I realised what had happened," she said. "I wanted to crawl under the table and hide for a while, but then I just got angry. I'm lucky they didn't take anything from my other account because that's where my pension goes. I live off that." Ms Fowler is the victim of a remote access scam, where scammers claim to need access to your computer to fix it or your internet.

Ms Fowler said she received a suspicious phone call and hung up the phone, but the scammers persisted.

"They said they were from Telstra and my internet had been running slow, they told me they needed to access my computer to fix it," she said. I hung up the phone straight away, but they called back the next day and said they were very serious, they thought I was being scammed." Ms Fowler was told she was going to be employed to help uncover the scammers who were attempting to access her computer.

"They told me I was getting paid to help uncover scammers trying to access my computer. They showed me the money going into my account," she said. "It was exciting I suppose. It was a bit of good news and I was just gullible. It was a different approach to what I've heard of other people having. It was awful."



Despite losing \$26,000 in a scam just prior to Christmas, 80-year-old Magi Fowler is all smiles and seeking to raise awareness of scamming in the community so others don't have to face the same thing.

To catch the scammers, Ms Fowler had to provide remote access to her computer and purchase iTunes cards to lure them in. The cards alone were valued at \$2000 and with remote access to her computer, the scammers gained access to her bank accounts. Although warned by local retail outlets about the iTunes card scam, Ms Fowler said the scammers were too convincing and told her not to tell anyone about her new 'job'.

"I'm not a stupid person normally, I was just a bit hazy those few days. They say your brain gets smaller as you get older," she said.

"Last year was all over the place for me; my husband died, I broke my shoulder and bought a house. "I think they (the scammers) are targeting people who are vulnerable and isolated. I'm very lucky to have such wonderful neighbours and friends."

Ms Fowler is urging community members not to answer calls from suspicious numbers. "I don't want to remain anonymous with this, I don't care if people laugh at me in the street. I just don't want anyone else to have this happen to them," she said.

Ms Fowler said she plans to speak with various local groups and organisations in a bid to raise awareness of the risks of scamming and her experiences.

Constable Michael McAuley, from the Central Goldfields Crime Investigation unit, recommends that residents contact the police if they notice anything suspicious or believe they have been scammed.

"Anything that doesn't seem right or looks suspicious, give us a call at the station and we can point you in the right direction and give you some tips," he said. Constable McAuley said reputable organisations, such as Telstra, will not call unless requested and will not ask for iTunes cards to be purchased. "That type of behaviour is suspicious straight away," he said.

"If an organisation asks for something like that, I would be calling the police for advice. Reputable organisations just won't do that sort of thing. These things are quite hard. If you're unsure, firstly I'd recommend calling the station and seeking some advice and secondly I'd visit ACORN's website for more information."

In December alone there were over 800 reports of remote access scams Australia-wide, totalling almost \$170,000 in losses. Australians lost over \$107 million to scams in 2018. For more information regarding scamming, visit:



Poor campfire knowledge fans fire fears

Only one-in-four Victorians know how to extinguish a campfire

21 January 2019: Park Rangers are concerned by survey findings that just over a quarter of people know how to correctly extinguish a campfire.

When presented with two options, only 26% of people correctly identified that water should be poured onto a campfire. The remaining 74% thought that a fire should be extinguished by covering it with soil or sand.

Campfires must always be fully extinguished with water, not soil, and must be cool to touch before being safe to

The findings come during a peak time for camping and as Victoria, one of the most fire-prone areas in the world. experiences a period of high temperatures.

With around 10% of bushfires caused by campfire negligence, Park Rangers have been out-and-about reminding people of fire regulations and to be aware of the very dry conditions.

In addition to assisting park visitors, Park Rangers perform an important role as firefighters and will be responding to bushfire situations this summer. The survey, conducted last month, also revealed half of respondents didn't know where and when a campfire could be lit in a national park. In national parks, campfires may only be lit where designated fireplaces are provided. Fires are prohibited on days of Total Fire Ban. Information about campfires is available from the Forest Fire Management website. Before heading out to camp, people should also check the Parks Victoria website for any changes to park conditions.

Travels with Cynthia

"I've been to Bali too", so the song goes, and it is certainly a very popular holiday place for Australians, being so close to us and cheaper than a trip to Darwin.

I was one of those tourists back in the 80s and I know the island is vastly different now. I went with a good friend and her 13-year-old daughter, who had red hair, which fascinated the Balinese. Quite by coincidence we ran into two of my friend's nursing colleagues and their partners, so we all teamed up for a few excursions. We started off at Kuta, which is the mecca of all the tourists, but we had plans to travel further afield. On Kuta beach young children went around selling Bintang beer and bottles of water. They were employed by big companies who paid the kids next to nothing. Viv and I befriended two of the little girls on the beach and they told us that it cost money to attend school, so their older sister was the only one who went to school and she taught the younger ones.

We discovered that they lived close to the magnificent Tanah Lot temple, an offshore building perched on a rocky outcrop with a Hindu shrine atop which was approached by a rocky path across the water. The girls told us they had never been there but had always longed to go, so we sent a note home asking permission to take them. It was duly given and it was so heart-warming to see the children's pleasure and excitement as they ran up the steep path and marvelled at the beauty of it all.

At that stage the street sellers were not as persistent and annoying as I heard they later became, and our breakfast boy would sit with us and teach us Indonesian. In turn we would help him improve his English. He directed us to his uncle's café for dinner, but refused money. It was a favour to the nice Australian ladies.

There is another side to tourists however. We noticed a bar called The Pub close to the airport selling cold Fosters beer and apparently a lot of the Aussie blokes propped themselves up on the stools on arrival and barely went further than the beach and then back to the bar. I wonder why they didn't just stay home. I have also seen in the news young tourists behaving drunkenly in the street, baring their bottoms etc, which is very insulting to the Balinese people's code of culture. Some of the Americans who stayed over at the expensive part in Sanur would take bus tours and often stay on the bus and tick off the places of interest in their travel diaries without visiting them.

We went off bemo hopping to Lovina at the top of the island, across the coast from Java, but that's for another time. Alas, bemos are no more as they have been replaced by more modern forms of transport.

Works update

Speaking of Australia Day, Council's Townscape Services crew is busy undertaking clean up and general maintenance works to make sure our Shire looks its best for the coming celebrations.

Grass mowing is also continuing across the Shire, as is bindii spraying – with a team assisting these spraying operations to try to control the weed.

The re-sheeting of Salathiels Road has been completed, as has the sealing of a section of Echuca Serpentine Road and construction of a section of Pyramid Yarraberb Road.

In terms of the grading program, from 1 October to 31 December last year, 355 kilometres of grading took place on gravel roads and minor gravel roads, and 881 kilometres of inspections on these roads.

Community Climate Change Adaption grants now open in Western Victoria

A further \$1 million is being invested by the Andrews Government to help regional communities prepare for the real impacts of climate change.

The Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said the new Community Climate Change Adaptation (3CA) Grants program will fund local projects that build the adaptive capacity and resilience of regional communities in the face of a changing climate.

Ms Pulford said grants of between \$25,000 and \$75,000 will be available for climate change adaptation projects across Western Victoria.

Eligible projects must either be led by, or implemented in partnership with a local council, traditional owner corporation, community group, or not-for-profit organisation.

Ms Pulford said the 3CA grants program is designed to support a range of project types with a spread of investment across the state.

"The Community Climate Change Adaptation Grants program is about backing local ideas and supporting resilient communities in Western Victoria as we combat climate change," Ms Pulford said.

"There is great work being done across Western Victoria to prepare for the impacts of climate change and this grants program will ensure the good work continues into the future," she said.

Funding is available for two project categories:




