## Osteoporosis service at MDHS

Central Goldfields residents can now receive osteoporosis testing in Maryborough thanks to new state-of-the-art technology which measures bone mineral density.

Maryborough District Health Service (MDHS) is now offering dual X-ray absorptiometry (DXA) scans using the next-generation DXA system from Hologic, Horizon.

The machine, which costs around \$90,000, was funded by a \$898,800 grant from the Department of Health and Human Services MDHS received around 18 months ago for X-ray and ultrasound equipment.

The hospital is currently averaging around 40 scans per month with the new technology and MDHS CEO Terry Welch said he is "delighted" to be offering the scans in Maryborough for the first time. "Being able to do bone scans here will dramatically help health outcomes for this community," he said. "This machine is the final suite of the equipment we received funding for."

According to the health service, osteoporosis often goes undiagnosed until a person experiences their first fracture, and once this occurs there is about a 50 percent chance the person will have another fracture. With an ageing population, Mr Welch said the new equipment will be particularly beneficial to older patients. "People over 70 are considered at high risk of bone disease like osteoporosis," he said.

"We know we have an older population and we know that travel is a challenge so this will eliminate the need to spend a whole day travelling to another town." Mr Welch said the new equipment is another step forward for the health service. "In the last 18 months we've been focussing on pursuing everything we can to get services here in Maryborough," he said.

## New ATM for the Rural Transaction Centre

Star ATM is the company that owns the ATM at the Dunolly RTC. There have been several owners of the machine since the community won the battle to have an ATM installed at the RTC in 2012. The current machine is well out-of-date and frequently breaks down (as we are all too often aware), so it is good news to learn that a new machine will be installed very soon. The company plans to make the changeover on this Friday 10th May, which will mean the service will be out of action for some or all of the day.

When an ATM was first installed, the provider agreed that no transaction fees would be charged for Bendigo Bank customers and a small monthly fee would be paid to the RTC as a form of rental.

However, that agreement is well-expired but subsequent arrangements informally maintained the status quo.

Star ATM, the current owners, have reviewed the usage figures for our ATM and concluded that the Dunolly ATM is not viable with the current arrangements. They point out that half of all transactions are for customers of the Bendigo Bank, so their income is derived from approximately 50% of ATM users.

The RTC considers our first priority is to ensure that our community and visitors continue to have access to an ATM, especially outside business hours. To maintain this service, all customers will be obliged to pay a transaction fee when using the ATM, as is the usual practice with commercial machines. The RTC will also forego the fee we receive for use of the space. We take this action reluctantly, but do so in order to maintain a useful community service. We hope that Bendigo Bank customers will make more over-the-counter transactions if they wish to avoid paying an ATM transaction fee and so boost the foot traffic for the Maldon Community Bank.

## \$150,000 ways to celebrate 20 years of community banking



The Dunolly and District Community have shared in the Maldon & District Community Bank® \$150,000 grants. Eleven groups from Betley, Dunolly, Eddington and Moliagul received grants at the Community Bank's 20th birthday celebrations in April.

Young people and families are set to benefit with a number of projects funded around the district. Funding was awarded to the Dunolly Primary School's library regeneration project – to expand the library's resources and books. The Dunolly Community Garden and Preschool will jointly benefit from a grant to purchase netting for the fruit trees at the preschool – so more fruit is eaten by young (and older) people and less by birds! The Dunolly Football Netball Club will use their grant to fence the playground, making this safer for the children. New lighting will improve productions at the Town Hall and is sure to be appreciated by performers and audiences alike. A new roof will ensure the protection of artefacts and displays at the Dunolly Historic Museum. The Dunolly Hospital Auxiliary's application for funding for reconstructing the Red Cross Garden at the hospital received support. A defib machine was provided to the Eddington Community Committee for the community centre. This grant includes training for the community to learn how use the defibrillator. The Dunolly & District Neighbourhood Centre's new program "Let's cook for one (or two)" is ready to go, with the bank funding the project to support skills and provide social connections for Dunolly and district residents. Sharon Hiley from the Neighbourhood Centre explained the program. "The targeted group we have in mind for our cooking program are men who are living on their own, single parents and lonely people who find it difficult to become active members of a community, as well as new residents who may have retired to our area.

Getting people together over a meal, learning new cooking skills and learning to be socially interactive will be of enormous benefit to our whole community. There is nothing like chatter, laughter and making new friends while enjoying and interacting over a meal!" said Sharon. Finally, a number of community facilities will see improvements thanks to the grants program. Funding for new heating and cooling will improve conditions in the Betley Mechanics Hall.

The Moliagul Reserves Committee received funding to continue to improve the amenity of the Moliagul hall, and new curtains will be fitted at the Dunolly Senior Citizens Hall.

Chairman, Ross Egleton, said the grants and birthday celebrations recognise the significance and impact of two decades of community banking in the region. The grants, ranging from \$500 to \$9,500, were presented to 41 successful grant applicant groups.

"I am proud to announce that we have topped \$3 million of funding back to the community. This includes the money going to tonight's grant recipients as well as funding over the last 20 years to buying community buses, learner driver training, tertiary scholarships, equipment and vehicles for emergency services, schools and preschools, arts and cultural events, sporting clubs, as well as many many festivals, facilities, programs and projects," said Board Chairman Ross Egleton.

Groups receiving grants in this latest round of funding come from throughout the bank's service area of Dunolly, Maldon, Moliagul, Betley, Baringhup, Newstead, Eddington, Guildford, Muckleford, Harcourt and Mount Alexander Shire.

Ross said the locally-owned and operated branch had grown from strength to strength since it was established.

"As our profitability grows, so too does our ability to provide an important source of sustainable revenue for communities to help fund projects and initiatives that strengthen our communities.

- ½ tsp vanilla essence

### Community grant applications open until 30 May

Applications for Council's Community Grants Scheme are now open until 4pm, Thursday 30 May 2019.

Grants of up to \$10,000 are available for not-for-profit clubs and organisations based in the Loddon Shire to deliver projects that directly benefit residents.

The Community Grants Scheme aims to help not-for-profit organisations enhance the provision of activities, facilities or delivery of services to people in our community.

Successful grant applications are funded on a two-to-one basis. This means for every \$2 provided by Council, the successful applicants must contribute a minimum of \$1 towards the cost of the project. Up to 50 per cent of an applicant's contribution can be in-kind.

Please note, applications must be submitted online through Smarty Grants. Council's Community Support team are available to assist with completing your application online via phone or an appointment can be made to meet to complete the application.

### National Road Safety Week

Every year, more than 1200 people are killed and another 35,000 seriously injured on Australian roads.

This week is National Road Safety Week. Running from Monday 6th to Sunday 12th May, the week highlights the impact of road trauma and ways to reduce it.

The week is an annual initiative from the Safer Australian Roads and Highways (SARAH) Group, partnering road safety organisations and Government.

Additionally, the week honours those we have lost and pledges to make the roads safer for everyone.

The theme for this year's National Road Safety Week is Drive so others survive. People are asked to pledge to drive so others survive.

This includes driving as if your loved ones are on the road ahead and removing all distractions and never using your mobile phone while behind the wheel. The pledge also asks people to be aware of road and people working in the road environment who are vulnerable, slow down, and drive safely near them.

### Recycling – what happens to green waste?

This financial year, Loddon Shire has collected 156 cubic metres of green waste. Green waste is treated for contamination and shredded on site to be re-used for site rehabilitation, landfill cover and beautification.

Council offers separation of green waste/organics and materials such as timbers, furniture, construction and demolition materials in domestic quantities to be broken down and retreated.

The separation from the green waste and organics pile provides maximum efficiency and cost to Council during the shredding phase.

It also reduces contamination of re-useable material onsite and provides maximum return of available materials to be used on Council's parks, gardens and open spaces.

### Did you know?

Having mentioned last week that the draft Activating Open Spaces Strategy is now open for public comment, did you know that there are 113 or more parcels of public open spaces located within our Shire? This diversity of public open spaces includes parks, playgrounds, sports ovals, bushland, footpaths, cycling/walking tracks, rivers and lakes.

### Feedback for 2019-2020 Proposed Budget invited

Central Goldfields Shire Council endorsed the 2019-2020 Proposed Budget at the

Tuesday 23 April Ordinary Council Meeting.

The Proposed Budget is now on display and open for feedback from residents.

The Proposed Budget delivers a surplus and reflects the Council Plan which sets the strategic direction for Council and reflects our vision to be a vibrant, thriving and inclusive community.

A key focus of the Proposed Budget is infrastructure with Council investing \$10.29 million into local roads, Maryborough Sports and Leisure Centre, Gordon Gardens Masterplan, community buildings such as Carisbrook and Talbot town halls, sustainability and waste.

Some of the highlights from the Proposed Budget include:

- Community plans for eight towns across the Shire—\$120,000
- Significant funding to roads funded through Regional Roads Victoria and Roads to Recovery—\$2.74 million
- Carisbrook levee works—\$900,000
- Energy saving programs for buildings—\$222,000, 50% grant funded
- Waste projects at transfer stations including monitoring systems at old landfill sites and bin roofs—\$180,000
- Support for the Australian National Pipe Band Championships—\$10,000

"Our Budget invests into our community infrastructure and is complemented by strategic planning that will guide Central Goldfields Shire's economic, tourism and recreation needs into the future."



## In the Veggie Patch



We are into the last month of Autumn and still waiting for the rain to come.

This month is more for preparing the soil for Spring and early Summer planting. Most fertilisers and manure are better spread on top of the soil, and then dug in with a fork. Over the winter any garden bed that is not in use, is better turned over and the soil left open as much as possible to let the air enter the soil. Air is just as important as fertilisers in the garden soil, compacted soils do not grow good crops.

There are some winter plants that can go in the soil this month. Broad beans can be sown from May to July. Prepare bed well ahead with manure (not chicken as it is high in nitrogen) and a generous dressing of lime. Later sowings are more reliable, the early sowings are more likely to get the brown spot on their leaves.

Sugar snap or snow peas can go in, they need a tall trellis or tepee to grow on. Prepare beds as for broad beans, sow seeds two centimetres deep, water well and do not water again until shoots appear because the seeds are prone to rot.

Plant seedlings of early maturing onions, the red or

white varieties, do not cover as bulbs should sit on the surface of the soil. Seed of the long keeping browns can be sown in seed beds or trays to be transplant later. Onions take six to eight months to mature but can be used when smaller. They are ready when the tops start to dry and fall over. Pull them and leave to dry for a few days. Store in a cool, dry airy place.

Strawberry runners planted out this month, will bear for a longer period. These plants are better treated as annuals. Left in the soil for two or more years, the soil sets hard and the weeds get a hold on and are very hard to control in amongst the plants.

Rhubarb crowns can be planted out this month. The best method is to divide the crowns. That way you can choose the variety that you prefer. Rhubarb will adapt itself to climate conditions. It is one of the few perennial plants, that can be left in the same soil for a few years, providing the soil has been well prepared before planting with generous feeding to get the best results.

### Fruit Trees

Rake fallen leaves away from fruit trees to prevent leaf-borne disease from recurring. To treat fungal disease spray with copper spray or lime sulphur in alternate years. The first spray should be in late autumn at leaf fall just before the tree enters its dormancy. Spray again at bud swell or bud burst in late winter or early spring. Once the leaves have opened out it is too late to spray for peach leaf curl and many other fungal diseases.

### Autumn Garden Hints

Remove old foliage from established hellebores, leaving new growth, This tidies up the plants and will allow flowers to be seen. Remove any build up of mulch around base. For tall shrubby species leave foliage on until after flowering and trim in Spring.

Feed plants with any complete fertilizer with nitrogen, potassium and phosphorous and give a light dressing of dolomite lime.

If you need to move or divide Hellebore x hybridus plants then autumn is also the right time.

Spring-flowering bulbs are traditionally planted in autumn, any time between March and mid-May. They're really not fussy. To plant, dig the soil over to get rid of any clods and weeds.

Scatter complete fertiliser. Remember not to use fresh chook manure, because that can burn the bulbs. Planting depth is quite important. Plant at least twice as deep as the bulb is high, and you obviously plant with the neck up and the roots down the bottom. The only exception is with Ranunculus. Always have the legs going down.

Before planting tulips and hyacinths put them in a paper bag and then into the crisper part of the fridge for about six to seven weeks. That enables them to have a very strong flowering shoot.


### Top frost protection and prevention tips

In the lead-up to cold weather spray water tender plants with a seaweed-based solution, which will help develop an internal resistance to frost. Seaweed solution takes about a week to take effect if you spray it on the leaves, and two to three weeks if applied to the roots

Anti-transpirant products such as Drought Shield and Envy, which are used during transplanting and for heat protection, also provide frost protection if sprayed over the leaves of frost-sensitive plants before frosts occur these are biodegradable so should be applied monthly during cold weather and after applying seaweed solution to ensure the seaweed solution gets taken up by the plant. Physical barriers also protect plants from mild frosts. Place plastic, cardboard or sheeting over plants overnight. Remove coverings in the morning.
