Charlotte Plains Hotel

Did the shire issue a demolition permit for an historic building? A simple question that they have not answered. Last month the former Charlotte Plains Hotel on the Carisbrook Eddington Road was demolished. So too were the old pine trees on the road reserve outside the hotel. I contacted the Central Goldfields Shire and asked if they issued a demolition permit for this historic building and gave them the building's citation number from the Central Goldfields Heritage Database. To the permit they haven't responded. As for the citation number they haven't been able to relate that to a particular property.

After three weeks they have not been able to work out where the building was or who owns the property. They have even suggested it is in the Mount Alexander Shire! Why would a building on the Central Goldfields Heritage Database be in Mount Alexander?

It seems obvious that if the shire cannot match an historic building in their own database to an actual location then how can they protect it? If the owner had asked about any heritage on their property, then the shire could not have told them.

The Central Goldfields Shire has made several statements in the media about its commitment to heritage. Its total failure in this instance shows otherwise.

Children's facilities capital program opens in Western Victoria

The Andrews Government is providing grants for state-of-the-art kindergarten facilities across Victoria ahead of the three-year-old kindergarten roll-out next year.

Applications are now open to local councils and other kindergarten services for grants to build, expand and improve early year's facilities.

Major grants of up to \$2 million are available for new facilities or significant upgrades, while grants of up to \$50,000 are available for expansions and refurbishments of existing facilities.

The funding is part of the record \$473.2 million investment from the Victorian Government to build and expand the kinder facilities needed for the state-wide roll-out of three-year-old kinder.

I urge our local councils and providers across Western Victoria to apply for the Children's Facilities Capital Program. This is a great opportunity to expand and refurbish existing facilities, and create brand new Early Learning Centres and Integrated Children's Centres in Western Victoria.

The roll-out of three-year-old kindergarten will start next year in six local government areas including Buloke, Hindmarsh, Northern Grampians and Yarriambiack.

In 2021, three-year-olds in an additional 15 local government areas will be able to access two years of subsidised kindergarten programs.

From 2022, children across the rest of the state will have access to five hours of three-year old kindergarten programs each week. This will be progressively scaled up to reach the full 15-hour program by 2029.

Small business advice heads to Central Goldfields Shire

Small business operators in Central Goldfields Shire will be able to access support and government business services when the Small Business Bus visits in early July.

The Small Business Bus is part of a wide package of assistance offered by the Andrews Government, from cuts to payroll tax in Regional Victoria to mentoring and advice services.

The Small Business Bus will have on hand business mentoring specialists to provide advice on marketing, finance, human resources and sales. These experts have extensive small business and management experience.

The Small Business Bus gives Central Goldfields businesses owners access to expert, face-to-face advice.

Regardless of whether you're thinking about starting a small business or are already well established, the Andrews Government's Small Business Bus will be there to help you grow and thrive.

This program plays an important part in providing Victorians with greater access to government support services to encourage business and jobs growth across the whole state.

In 2018 more than 1,047 small businesses accessed free on-board mentoring, while a further 2,556 received assistance from information officers.

The Small Business Bus will be located outside the Maryborough Resource Centre at 91 Nolan Street on Monday 1st July from 10am to 4pm.

Then on Tuesday 2nd July, the bus will be outside Dunolly's Rural Transaction Centre at 109 Broadway from 10am to 4pm.

Freemasons Support Scout Camps

St George Lodge of Dunolly nominated Mataranka Scout and Guide Camp at Goldsbrough as the charity to be supported by the Freemasons Foundation of Victoria who have generously made available \$5,000 to every Masonic Lodge in the state to use for support of charitable causes. The campsite committee received the full grant of \$5,000 to help with roof repairs on the Mataranka building.

When presenting the cheque during the annual Baden Powell Lodge awards night at Waverley Masonic Centre, Worshipful Brother Ken Calder indicated that a new water tank would also be a big help. A small crowd funding exercise then ensued where a total of \$2,220 was raised which will fully pay for a new 22,000 litre water tank.

During the evening, awards were made to Venturer groups for magnificent volunteer works carried out at various camping facilities used by scouting groups.

Further presentations of cheques were made; firstly, by Keith Murray the Grand Master of Freemasons Victoria who presented \$1,000 to Harkaway Scout Camp to assist in repairs from vandalism and theft of a heart-starter machine and then by Baden Powell Lodge who nominated Harkaway River Camp as the recipient of their \$5,000 Freemasons Foundation Grant.

While Baden Powell was not a Freemason, he set up the Scouting movement with very similar values and the Baden Powell Lodge has numerous scouting leaders as members.

Freemasons provide \$10,000

Freemasons cheques were presented to Mataranka Campsite Committee by St George Lodge Director of Ceremonies Ken Calder; bringing the total Freemasons contribution provided to upgrade the campsite situated at Goldsbrough west of Dunolly to \$10,000. A large proportion of the funds were made available through the Victorian Freemasons Foundation.

With the Polymaster water tank already delivered and connected, the recent rain has already half-filled the 22,000-litre storage which will now guarantee a good supply for cooking and cleaning, besides servicing toilets and showers.

Accepting the cheques on behalf of the Campsite Committee, Anthony and Verena Doyle pointed out that plans to re-roof the building are arranged for September, while these extra funds are to be used to upgrade the interior of the building.

Vets warn dog owners about kennel cough as cases rise



Maryborough Veterinary Practice's Dr James Chadwick and four-legged friend Meg are urging residents to be aware of a number of kennel cough cases in the area.

Vets warn dog owners about kennel cough as cases rise. Maryborough is one of several areas across the state where a large number of "severe" kennel cough cases have been reported.

A highly contagious disease in dogs, kennel cough is caused by upper respiratory viruses and spread by affected dogs being in close proximity to healthy dogs. Maryborough Veterinary Practice's Dr James Chadwick said kennel cough generally isn't fatal, but of the 40 cases which have been brought to the clinic this month, some have been "severe". Kennel cough is a general term for a number of infectious diseases. It basically causes laryngitis in dogs," he said.

"Symptoms to look out for are a nasty, hacking cough. Most owners describe it as the dog having something stuck in their throat.

"We have had one dog present with a temperature of over 41 degrees, which is very high."

Dr Chadwick said kennel cough has been spread throughout the state by racing greyhounds, who have spread it to domestic pets.

"Greyhound Racing Victoria put out a press release saying a lot of dogs have been affected," he said.

"Racing greyhounds travel all over the state, so it's been spread fairly easily.

"To avoid your dog contracting kennel cough, we advise getting your dog vaccinated. We have a vaccination which works in 72 hours which is pretty good.

"Also avoid unknown dogs if your pet isn't vaccinated and I would be concerned about animals with weaker immune systems being exposed."

Dr Chadwick said winter is generally slightly worse for cases of kennel cough, however Maryborough has experienced fewer cases over the past five years.

Dr Chadwick recommended that dogs which haven't been vaccinated for kennel cough in the last 12 months should get a booster, particularly if they're young, old, have a weak immune system or go out in public frequently.

CENTRAL GOLDFIELDS RATEPAYERS AND RESIDENTS ASSOC. INC.

Continuing on with my life's adventures in my younger days, before Dick went away, we had bought an acre and a half of bush in St. Andrews where we planned to build our house. It was about a mile up a dirt road from the township which consisted of a general post office/store, a school, a pub and another shop up the other end which later burnt down. While we lived there, the town expanded to a mudbrick restaurant, the North Riding, a craft bakery and a gallery shop.

When the farmhouse where we had been living was sold, we moved to a very quaint house up the Buttermans Track, named because the butter man used it as the route to Yarra Glen.

This house had been built, or should I say put together, by a very eccentric man who experimented with every type of building material. There was a wall of fibro, a wall of red brick, a timber wall, one of mudbricks and a wattle and daub one. The back room had an earthen floor, so we threw an old carpet over it and it became the kids' playroom for rainy days. The plughole in the bath ran directly down to the ground underneath, no plumbing whatsoever. The light system all depended on one switch, each room connected to the main one. The toilet was a dunny can inside its little room, no plumbing of course, so that had to be transported outside where it belonged. This house was on a hill overlooking Kinglake and we never needed a TV because in the evenings we would sit at the big window and watch the changing sunsets. We had two goats, Mavis and Mabel which we milked for our own consumption. They kept getting out and I would have to chase them, and I think I lost a stone in weight that first summer.

Our landlord had a second-hand shop in Yarra Glen and he used to dump any unwanted goods outside another cottage he owned, in the valley below us. This place was occupied by a very fey, elderly lady who had been evicted from her city house because she had too many dogs, so she settled in the bush for peace and quiet. Her "house" was never finished; it had inside walls but no outside ones, just timber struts where the walls should have been. Miss Ellis had two dogs, the two Nips, same name each and two goats, Penny and Tuppence. I remember them well as they demolished our entire veggie garden one day when we were out. I used to keep an eye on Miss Ellis and she showed me all the treasures she collected from the pile of stuff our landlord left near her house. She had taught herself shorthand and Spanish and read history books from the things she found there. Our kids were the bane of our lives bringing back old toasters, jugs and an ancient set of kitchen scales which I still have. There's a replica in Dunolly museum.

Miss Ellis did not believe in wearing pre-worn hats as they had the previous wearer's brain waves which interfered with those of the next wearer. She would not enter the little shop if the TV was on as it dispersed harmful waves. Dear old Miss Ellis.


Despite Council's assurance that this will benefit the community groups who occupy around 100 Council-owned buildings across the Shire, it will definitely impact many, by at the very least formalising their previous arrangements, with the likelihood for some, of increased operating costs. All groups who use the relevant buildings will be contacted in writing and invited to comment. There is to be a Q & A session on the Policy on Wednesday 17th July at the Community Hub, Burns St. Maryborough. Submissions are to be received by Thursday 1st August, with a hearing of the submissions on Tuesday 13th August, 2019.

Other suggestions arising out of the Economic and Tourism forum conducted at our last meeting included one for a constantly-updated listing by Council of priority programs, with information constantly being disseminated to the public; also improved and more open accounting processes; the need to promote the Shire as a destination with choices, with direction for all towns and with more effort being applied to ensuring venues are more community-friendly, thus having a positive effect on tourism.

CGR&RAI Membership fees are now payable for the 2019-20 Financial Year. Membership is \$10 per person per annum, which assists us in paying hall hire fees and other expenses incurred during the year.

A new place to put your e-waste

From 1 July, 2019, all Central Goldfields Shire residents can dispose of their e-waste at any of the local transfer stations at Carisbrook, Talbot, Dunolly and Bealiba.

Smaller e-waste items can also be delivered to a sorting storage unit at Council's Customer

Service Centre at 22 Nolan Street, Maryborough, Maryborough Resource Centre and Talbot Post Office. E-waste is any unwanted product that has a cord or a battery attached. This initiative will help reduce e-waste ending in landfill and minimise our impact on the environment.

Draft Property Occupancy Policy

The Draft Property Occupancy Policy was endorsed at the May Ordinary Council Meeting. Representatives from community groups and organisations will be invited to an upcoming Q&A session at the Community Hub, Burns Street, Maryborough on Wednesday 17 July, 2019 from 6pm. The draft policy will benefit community groups who occupy Council owned or managed land and buildings by providing tenure security, an equitable and transparent pricing structure and a clear understanding of any maintenance and reporting responsibilities. Council provides a number of buildings and public spaces to community groups to allow them to perform their valued roles in the community. Community and recreation groups provide much-needed services in our Shire and Council is committed to seeing these groups flourish by providing a secure future to those who utilise Council-owned facilities.

This draft policy will help make Council more accountable for its actions, which is a key priority highlighted in the 2017-2021 Council Plan. Council will engage in extensive public consultation in relation to the Draft Property Occupancy Policy. The draft policy will be on public display for two months and members of the community are invited to provide feedback. In addition, each group that uses a Council-owned building will be contacted in writing and invited to provide comments or feedback.

It has been quite a while since I have mentioned the Loddon Mallee Waste Info App, and given the focus in recent columns around waste and recycling, I thought it was worth a reminder.

This free app has been developed to help Loddon Shire residents make quick and simple waste and recycling decisions, while aiming to reduce contamination and increase recycling levels. The app provides you with a personalised bin collection calendar (with optional reminders) and an A to Z list of materials and images showing which bin to put materials in. It also offers information, hints and tips to help with waste management, provides details about Council's waste and recycling services and facilities (including contact details, opening times and maps), and lets you report a problem directly to Council.


The app even has push notifications to let you know of changes to collection dates, events and programs.



**Power bill relief on the way
for some households**

Electricity bill relief is on the way for some local households with the introduction of the State Government's new Victorian Default Offer (VDO).

From July 1st, more than 130,000 Victorian households paying more than necessary for their electricity will be automatically switched to a cheaper deal under the offer.

The VDO was recommended by the Essential Services Commission and typical residential customers on standing offers and using 4000 kWh of electricity per year could save between \$310 and \$450 per year. Small businesses will also benefit from the VDO with 30,000 businesses also switching from July, saving between \$1380 and \$2050 per year. Minister for Energy, Environment and Solar Homes, Lily D'Ambrosio, said this is one of the biggest reforms to the energy sector in over a decade.

"This is not just available to people currently on standing offers, anyone can ask for the Victorian Default Offer," she said. "We've set a fair price based on advice from the experts, delivering automatic savings for thousands of Victorian households and small businesses from July 1st."

Prices will vary depending on distribution network and location, and the Central Goldfields Shire falls under Powercor's distribution zone which encompasses much of western Victoria.

The commission estimated the annual bill for residential customers using 4000 kWh per year in the Powercor distribution zone will be \$1411, a saving of over \$400.

Ms D'Ambrosio said the VDO comes on top of the Labor Government's solar homes package which is helping Victorians take control of their energy bills by rolling out solar panels, solar hot water or solar batteries over the next 10 years.

"The VDO is just one of the ways we're putting power back into the hands of Victorians, as we put solar on 770,000 homes and cut the cost of energy," she said.

Here are two of the new coolest features.



Australians are losing more money to NBN scams, with reported losses in 2019 already higher than the total of last year's losses. Consumers lost an average of more than \$110,000 each month between January and May this year, compared with around \$38,500 in monthly average losses throughout 2018 – an increase of nearly 300 per cent.

"People aged over 65 are particularly vulnerable, making the most reports and losing more than \$330,000 this year. That's more than 60 per cent of the current losses," ACCC Acting Chair Delia Rickard said. "Scammers are increasingly using trusted brands like 'NBN' to trick unsuspecting consumers into parting with their money or personal information."

Common types of NBN scams include:

Someone pretending to be from NBN Co or an internet provider calls a victim and claims there is a problem with their phone or internet connection, which requires remote access to fix. The scammer can then install malware or steal valuable personal information, including banking details. Scammers pretending to be the NBN attempt to sell NBN services, often at a discount, or equipment to you over the phone. Scammers may also call or visit people at their homes to sign them up to the NBN, get them

a better deal or test the speed of their connection. They may ask people to provide personal details such as their name, address, date of birth, and Medicare number or ask for payment through gift cards. Scammers calling you during a blackout offering you the ability to stay connected during a blackout for an extra fee. It is important to remember NBN Co is a wholesale-only company and does not sell services directly to consumers.

"We will never make unsolicited calls or door knock to sell broadband services to the public. People need to contact their preferred phone and internet service provider to make the switch," NBN Co Chief Security Officer Darren Kane said. "We will never request remote access to a resident's computer and we will never make unsolicited requests for payment or financial information. If someone claiming to work 'for the NBN' tries to sell you an internet or phone service and you are unsure, ask for their details, hang up, and call your service provider to check if they're legitimate. Do a Google search or check the phone book to get your service provider's number, don't use contact details provided by the sales person," Ms Rickard said.

"Never give an unsolicited caller remote access to your computer, and never give out your personal, credit card or online account details to anyone you don't know".



Local farmers urged to take care on quad bikes

The Andrews Government is taking action to protect and educate farmers and workers in Western Victoria with a renewed call for vigilance on and around all-terrain vehicles or quad bikes.

Labor Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said the campaign is part of an ongoing push to reduce the number of deaths and injuries on quad bikes.

The campaign includes WorkSafe television commercials that depict how easily quad bikes can roll and the devastating consequences they can have when not operated properly.

To help farmers manage the risk of rollovers, the Labor Government introduced a rebate in 2016 to fit operator protection devices to existing quad bikes, or to switch to more terrain appropriate vehicles such as side by sides.

So far, more than \$4 million has been spent to fit more than 2,600 operator protection devices, and to assist with more than 1850 purchases of more suitable vehicles.

Ms Pulford said the campaign is reinforcing the message that no two rides are ever the same and that rollovers happen quickly and without warning.

"Any death on a Victorian farm, factory or workplace is one too many and that's why we're running this campaign, so families don't have to experience the grief of losing a loved one," Ms Pulford said.

"Farmers across Western Victoria use quad bikes every day to carryout vital work on their farms and we're taking action to reduce injuries and deaths on farms, and make sure we're supporting our farmers to work safer and smarter," she said.

Since March 2018, WorkSafe inspectors have issued more than 460 improvement notices on quad bikes, including 347 that have directly related to adequately controlling the risk of rollover.

Last year, the Labor Government announced \$20 million in funding for the new Victorian Agriculture Skills Statement: Smarter, Safer Farms.

The Smarter, Safer Farms program includes \$10 million in farm safety and wellbeing initiatives to change Victoria's farm safety culture and reduce the number of deaths and injuries on farms.

The Labor Government has also extended its rebate to install roll-over protection on quad bikes, or to substitute them for more terrain appropriate vehicles, to September this year.
