## The Arts Hub Craft Exhibition 2019




Aprons, dream catchers, paintings, an exquisite coat, pressed-flowers, metal art made with old cutlery — the owl and eagle. And so much more.

With great fanfare on the 8th May 2019 the Dunolly RTC in *The Welcome Record* announced that a new ATM was to be installed at the Dunolly RTC. Great, at last an improvement of what was an embarrassment for our town. What a dismal failure that has been over the last eight weeks or so "out of service", how familiar.

I quote from the announcement — "The Dunolly RTC considers our first priority is to ensure that our community and visitors continue to have access to an ATM especially outside business hours." Also quoted was half (50%) of all transactions are for customers of the Bendigo Bank. Why therefore could the Dunolly RTC not get a Bendigo Bank ATM to complement the Bendigo Bank Branch ("Community Bank") at the Dunolly RTC?

Or is it better to have a high fee charging ATM, sucking the last dollars from a low-socio economic society to make a corporate profit.

The Dunolly RTC and Bendigo Bank could and should be able to make this happen, and give us the community a decent ATM service.

Public hearings for the Commission are set to run from Tuesday 2 July until Friday 26 July and will be held at the Melbourne Town Hall.

# In The Veggie Patch



July is not a good gardening month.

With very little sunshine, and plant growth, only the weeds grow well.

Any gardener who needs to save space for spring and summer planting, could try their luck at container planting. Most veggies will grow in containers, providing suitable ones are used. Choose a potting mix that is suitable for veggies in containers. Or you can mix your own. Seven parts of friable soil, three parts of peat moss, and two parts of clean sand. Coarse sand is the best, it helps to keep the mix friable. Containers can be moved to receive the most sunshine, which is very little in July. Feeding and watering can be controlled to the plants need. Crops in containers may not be as good as in the garden bed, but at least some early fresh veggies can be harvested before the garden bed ones are available.

Some planting out and sowing of seeds can be done this month. Seeds of parsnip, radish, silverbeet, beetroot, leeks and brown mignonette lettuce. Brown mignonette lettuce will grow better during the winter than the green ones. Long-keeping onion plants are best left until near the end of July.



Strawberry plants can be sown now until the end of August. If planting runners remove the packaging and rinse the roots in fresh water. Remove any dead leaves using scissors or secateurs. Always plant bare root plants on the same day you get them, into a moist soil enriched with compost. Trim long roots to around 10cm, plant them pointing straight down and don't allow the roots to 'double back' when planting. Water the plants immediately after planting. Protect young plants from frost until established. Apply fertiliser in spring for a great crop in summer.

If early broad beans are making too much growth, nip the top off, they will shoot out and make more stems to produce pods.

## Fruit Trees

Peaches and nectarines that weren't pruned after fruiting should be cut back now. Spray trees with copper spray, to prevent leaf curl and other fungal diseases as the buds swell, before the leaves and flowers start to open. Remove any mummified fruit on the tree as they can become a source of fungal infection as the new leaves emerge. A July spray with white oil will get rid of overwintering scale insects

Plant, bare-rooted fruit trees. Dwarf fruit trees are ideally suited to small gardens. If you need more than one variety for cross pollination (as with, apples, pears, cherries etc.), try planting two trees together in the same planting hole. It can be surprisingly successful.

## Winter Garden Tips

- ◆ Winter is the best time to move smaller deciduous plants around the garden. Dig up a good portion of the root ball and place the plant on a tarp to move to its new location. Plant it to the same depth it was growing before and water in well.
- ◆ Resist the urge to prune frost bitten plants as there will be more frosts. Plants that have already suffered from frost bite will be more susceptible if pruned, so wait until all frosts have passed before removing burnt or unsightly foliage.
- ◆ Start pruning roses, remove any dead or spindly growth and cut back to outward facing buds. The harder you prune, the bigger your flowers, but the fewer you get. Conversely, the lighter you prune the more flowers you get, but they are smaller. Clean up around bushes removing any old leaves.
- ◆ Plant bare rooted roses. Soak in a bucket of water for a minimum of one hour prior to planting. Dig a hole that is wide enough and deep enough to hold the rose's roots when spread out. This should be approximately 40cm wide and 60cm deep, Mix a small spadeful of well-rotted manure with the soil in the hole. Make a mound in the bottom to spread the roots over then back fill gently and water in well.
- ◆ Feed growing bulbs with liquid fertiliser every few weeks
- ◆ Divide clumps of day lilies now to make more plants for yourself or to give away to friends

## Sweet Potato, Pumpkin and Lentil Soup

| 1 onion - chopped                  | 1 tsp. ground coriander |
| 400g orange sweet potato - chopped |                         |
| 350g pumpkin - chopped             | 1 cup red lentils       |
| 6 cups vegetable stock             | 1/2 tsp. ground cumin   |
| 1 tblspn oil                       |                         |

Cook onion, coriander and cumin in oil until onion is soft. Add pumpkin, sweet potato, lentils and stock. Bring to boil, simmer covered for about 30 minutes or until pumpkin and sweet potato is tender. Blend soup until puréed. Serve with a dollop of Greek yoghurt or sour cream. Enjoy!



### Annual Residents Satisfaction Survey 2019

The results of Council's annual community satisfaction survey are in, which saw more than 400 residents provide their thoughts about a range of Council services.

Overall, satisfaction with Council's performance increased, with an index score of 58, which is equal to the average for small rural councils. According to the survey, Council's top five performing areas included waste services (weekly rubbish collection and fortnightly recycling collection), public swimming pools, playgrounds and parks and reserves.

One area particularly noted for improvement was financial management. This includes perceptions of rates being fair and reasonable, which had a relatively low performance among

Council understands that rates are always going to be a contentious issue; however, Council continues to ensure that responsible financial management remains a key focus of its activities and in delivering services.

In terms of the recent adoption of Council's 2019/20 budget, the 2.5 per cent average rates rise is in line with the State Government's Fair Go Rates System capping level – which is set each year by the Minister for Local Government.

According to an article published in the Herald Sun on 1st July 2019, Loddon Shire had the smallest average annual rates bill of all 79 councils across the state, at \$1206 per household.

Services that Council delivers include aged services, animal management, community support, disability access, economic development and tourism, early years services (such as Maternal and Child Health), parks and streetscapes, road maintenance, local laws, sporting reserves and more.

### Ripon locals urged to be wound aware

Ripon MP Louise Staley is urging the local community to take care of chronic wounds before they become a problem.

Wound awareness week, which runs from 1st to 21st July, is an opportunity to raise awareness and remind the community of the importance of being wound aware.

Each year, around 420,000 people suffer from some kind of chronic wound. People struggle with pain as well as embarrassment, large treatment costs and being unable to enjoy normal work or social activities.

"A chronic wound is a skin break that doesn't heal normally or without complications. If that happens to you or a family member, you must see a healthcare professional immediately," Ms Staley said.

"If a chronic wound is not treated quickly and properly it could lead to severe illness, amputations and even death."

According to Wounds Australia, you should take action if a wound:

- becomes red, swollen, hot or very painful
- bleeds regularly
- becomes black or yellow
- has a thick, yellowish fluid or unpleasant smell
- takes longer than a month to heal or has not decreased in size.

Ms Staley is encouraging locals to check in with older relatives because people over 65 are more likely to develop a chronic wound.

"As a community we tend not to talk about these types of medical concerns, but it's important not to suffer in silence," Ms Staley said.

**New Woolies defibrillator ready to save local lives**

Woolworths Maryborough now has an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) to help in emergency situations.  
 The AED was installed late last month and is part of a Woolworths program that ensures rural and regional communities, or areas where it may be hard to access immediate medical help, receive the device. Woolworths Maryborough store manager, Danny Hughes said the AED is not just for customers, but anyone within the community.  
 "It's not just a Woolies thing, it's a community thing. We are pleased to have a defibrillator installed in our store which everyone can have access to," he said.  
 "You never know when a sudden cardiac arrest might strike and in the unfortunate event that it does, having the local community able to access this treatment could help to save lives. "The best medical advice tells us that access to an AED early on can greatly increase the chance of survival." The AED is used to shock the heart with electricity during cardiac arrest, also known as a heart attack and is designed to be used by anyone, with clear step-by-step voice instructions who can guide members of the public through the process. The device is located inside the right entrance door of the store, directly in front of BWS.



"Plastic-free July is an important reminder that we all have a role to play in eliminating plastic from our marine environment.

"As fishers, our priority is the ocean. We advocate the health, sustainability and future of our ocean. It's our livelihood and the future livelihood of generations to come."

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
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## Police warn locals of black ice threat in frosty weather

With cold weather settled in, local police are reminding drivers to stay safe on the road and be aware of black ice throughout the region.

Central Goldfields Highway Patrol Senior Constable Paul Schroeder said the message is to drive to the conditions and not to the timetable you have. "It's better to be late than to drive outside of your capabilities and have an accident, particularly when it's wet or foggy — it's better to be late than dead on time," he said. Although Sen Con Schroeder said there aren't many roads affected by black ice in the immediate area, he said they still present a concern for police and bridges throughout the district can present a hazard to road users. "Especially when we're having little bits of rain and cold weather overnight, anywhere there could be a collection of water could freeze," he said. "Bridges in particular can be quite dangerous and there's more potential for black ice to be present on them as they've got cold air from above and below. "Generally you're not going to be able to see the black ice. If you're unsure, slow down and see if you can find a better route to get to your destination."

Sen Con Schroeder said because black ice is difficult to see, drivers can often only realise they're driving on it when their car loses traction. He said to keep an eye on the weather and conditions to be prepared for the possibility of black ice. "Generally the only thing you've really got to go on in identifying whether black ice will be around is if we've had a bout of really cold weather overnight and if there's ice on your car," he said.

"If you're walking out to your car and it's got heavy frost on it there's a potential for that to be on the road as well."

If caught in black ice, Sen Con Schroeder said drivers should avoid making sudden movements, such as steering sharply or breaking hard.

"Black ice is generally pretty short and the main thing is to not try and do any sudden movements. Just let the car continue in the direction it's going to go in until you get traction again," he said.

"You don't want to be trying to steer and cause more of a problem, it's very easy to lose control in conditions like that." Sen Con Schroeder said maintaining a roadworthy vehicle goes a long way to improving safety on the road and urged community members to make sure their vehicles are up to scratch. "Making sure your car is roadworthy in the sense it's got good tyres, the windscreen wipers and your demister work, everything to maximise visibility — make sure your headlights are working so you maximise not only what you can see, but also make sure other people can see you on the road," he said. "We just want people to plan their trips according to what the conditions are and to do what they can to remain safe."

### New garden set to bloom

The front of the Dunolly Hospital is set to undergo a facelift next month, with a project set to rejuvenate the 60-year-old garden area.

Jointly funded by the Dunolly District Hospital Auxiliary, Maryborough District Health Service and the Maldon and District Community Bank, the project will see the garden returned to its former glory.

Originally established 60 years ago by the local branch of the Red Cross, the origins of the garden are a mystery as its construction doesn't appear to have any anniversary of significance, but Dunolly District Hospital Auxiliary president Fiona Lindsay said bringing the garden back to its former glory is something well worth doing.

"It's an exciting project, it will bring benefits to not only the health service, but also to the community because this is an open space — it's accessible and can be used by anyone in the community," she said.

"The project is also a way of respecting the work that's been done in the past.

"There was a real commitment to getting it established in the first place and you really want to pay respect to the people who've done that."

Ms Lindsay said the project will feature significant community involvement and once complete, will provide a social space for residents of Dunolly's aged care facility and the broader community. "The project has an incredibly simple layout; it's designed to be accessible with wide paths and wheelchair access as well as seating," she said. "We've got the earthwork lined up to happen and we're also ready to source as many plants as possible through local propagators which is good."

The Dunolly District Hospital Auxiliary will be looking for community support to offset the cost of plants for the garden with fundraisers on the horizon.

"We'll be running street stalls with some cakes and other bits and pieces for sale," Ms Lindsay said.

"As part of the cake stall, residents from the aged care facility will be baking as part of their activities day so they'll be making a contribution in terms of cakes, biscuits and slices and perhaps one or two will be helping to sell items at the stall. "We have this lovely integration with the community and residents for this project."

The street stalls will be held on Broadway, near the Dunolly Bakery on Saturday July 27th from 10 am.

A Father's Day raffle will also kick off at the street stall later this month and continue through August, with tickets then sold outside the supermarket.

**Children’s facilities grants open in Western Victoria**

The Andrews Government is providing grants for state-of-the-art kindergarten facilities across Victoria ahead of the three-year-old kindergarten roll-out next year.

Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said applications are now open to local councils and other kindergarten services for grants to build, expand and improve early years facilities.

Major grants of up to \$2 million are available for new facilities or significant upgrades, while grants of up to \$50,000 are available for expansions and refurbishments of existing facilities.

In recent years, the Children’s Facilities Capital Program has delivered funding to kindergartens in Rainbow, Horsham, Beaufort, Warracknabeal, Stawell, Dimboola, Willaura, Goroke, North Hamilton, Donald and Casterton.

It’s part of the record \$473.2 million investment from the Victorian Budget 2019/20 to work with the sector to build and expand the kinder facilities needed for the state-wide roll-out of 3-year-old kinder.

Ms Pulford urged local councils to take advantage of the new round of funding.

“I’d encourage local councils and providers in Western Victoria to apply for the Children’s Facilities Capital Program. This is a great opportunity to expand and refurbish existing facilities, and create brand new Early Learning Centres and Integrated Children’s Centres,” she said.

Applications will close at midnight on the 9th of August, 2019.

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### New number plate tech to help police

Unauthorised drivers will now have a tougher time on local roads, with a new Central Goldfields Highway patrol car kitted out with the latest in automatic number plate recognition (ANPR) technology.

Rolling into active service earlier this month, the brand new car and its state-of-the-art technology enables police to detect drivers who are suspended, disqualified or unlicensed in unregistered and stolen vehicles or with stolen number plates. Just one of more than 220 ANPR vehicles to be deployed by early 2021, Central Goldfields Highway Patrol Sergeant Noel Jacobs said the technology will be a "massive" boost to Highway Patrol capabilities.

"Pretty much you start the car up, drive down the road and it'll be checking every car as we drive past. Anybody that's unlicensed, unregistered, wanted on a warrant — it'll pick them up," he said. "The ANPR has the capability to scan around 5000 number plates in a 10 hour shift. Entering number plates manually, you could probably do anywhere from 40 to 150 in a big shift, so it's massive numbers.

"Detection wise, this is going to be a great tool."

Sgt Jacobs said the ANPR database updates daily and will also assist police in keeping an eye on vehicles of interest.

The vehicle is also fitted with in-car video to record audio and visual evidence which can be used in court.

"It's certainly going to be a good tool for us and one capability we can use in relation to our local target offenders, so with recidivist offenders, we can actually punch their details into the system and it will flag for them when it picks them up as well," Sgt Jacobs said.

"When you get a hit, say for an unlicensed driver, there's a different sound and for an unregistered driver there's a different sound again. It'll show which camera the plate was checked on so you'll know where the vehicle is — it's pretty high-tech stuff, you know what you're looking at with that car and what offence it could possibly be."

Sgt Jacobs said the device not only increases the amount of number plates police can check, but will also enable officers to "keep their eyes peeled" for other offences.

"The worst part about manually typing in number plates is the time it takes; you've taken your eyes off the driver and you're missing things," he said.

"Rather than one police officer manually keying in number plates, the ANPR allows both patrolling officers to keep their eyes peeled for other offences such as mobile phone use and seatbelt offences."

Sgt Jacobs said a review of fatal collisions in 2016 showed that unauthorised drivers were at fault in 16 percent of cases.

"By removing dangerous drivers from our roads it will help address the road trauma we see, that's what we're looking at with the ANPR technology," he said.

Victoria's current road toll sits at 163 lives lost, with 98 of these on rural roads. Sgt Jacobs said the current road toll, as well as road trauma accidents have "without a doubt" led to the introduction of the new technology.

"The message to these people who are driving unlicensed on the road and unregistered vehicles is that they're going to be caught," he said. "If you take the chance, we're going to catch you." Sgt Jacobs said black spots in mobile service and internet connection areas means that officers may still occasionally need to manually enter number plate data. "We can actually report blackspots and get service increased in those areas. Worst case scenario, if the ANPR didn't pick up a car that I wanted it to look at, I could enter that car into the system manually or intercept it and do a check over the air," he said.

At this stage, the Highway Patrol ANPR vehicle will be the only one stationed locally, however there may be more operating in the area in the future.


