



Offensive Slogans

Dear Editor,

Readers of *The Welcome Record* would no doubt have spotted a growing number of vehicles on our local roads displaying offensive images and slogans.

Some of the material is horrendous and I'm really pleased that the Andrews Government is taking steps to ban it.

This decision has been taken in response to offensive slogans displayed on camper vans, such as Wicked Campers, which operate around Australia.

My office receives numerous complaints each week from people offended by some of the crude images and slogans seen on the campers and other vehicles.

Under new legislation, any Victorian-registered vehicle that displays sexist, obscene or offensive slogans can be referred to the Ad Standards Community Panel, which will review it against the Australian Association of National Advertisers Code of Ethics.

If the Panel finds the slogan breaches those standards, then it must be removed – or the vehicle's registration will be cancelled.

The new legislation will be presented to Parliament later this year and it's my hope that this approach will be adopted by other states and territories so we deal with offensive slogans and images at a national level.

Our community — especially children — do not need to see these sort of disgusting messages and slogans and I'm delighted that the Labor Government is working towards a solution.

Have your say on volunteering in Central Goldfields Shire

Residents in Central Goldfields Shire are encouraged to share their experiences and ideas about community life and volunteering in the region, to help develop Victoria's new Volunteer Strategy.

Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, is inviting everyone in Central Goldfields Shire to participate by taking a survey that will help inform the strategy, and better support the state's fast-changing and growing volunteering sector. The strategy will also be informed by workshops, roundtables, and meetings in regional areas right through to May 2020.

The Andrews Government has invested \$500,000 to support volunteering initiatives over two years in the 2018-19 Victorian Budget, including digital literacy and leadership training programs.

This year, the Premier's Volunteer Champions Awards received a record number of 245 nominations for awards that recognise the hard work and dedication of volunteers in communities across the state.

Ms Pulford said many hundreds of Central Goldfields residents participate in formal volunteering activities each year, with many others contributing through informal volunteering.

"Volunteering is a vital part of community life in Central Goldfields Shire, and our collective voices will play an important part in informing the Volunteer Strategy. I encourage all Central Goldfields residents to share their experiences and ideas on how to shape volunteering in our community, and urge your friends, families and colleagues to do the same," Ms Pulford said.

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Behind the Scenes with:

Greg McGregor

How does one abbreviate many years of incredible dedication; a mind that creates not only a vast supply of products, but an impressive facility that is almost a town in itself? Though this article can fill an entire paper, we will endeavour to sum up as much as we can and share our discovery about a man of many skills, talent, and a baron in the retail sector. This admirable man's name is Greg McGregor.

As we all know, Dunolly and the surrounding towns are part of the "Golden Triangle" with visitors coming from all states and those escaping metropolitan Melbourne. When asked what draws them on a path of discovery, they reply with: the goldfields history, detecting and equally important, the heritage buildings and architecture.

With real estate development and expansion, many of our old heritage style homes slowly disappear and along with them the irreplaceable fixtures such as lead-light windows, and sizes and varieties of timbers unavailable these days. Rebuilding a heritage home is always a challenge, sourcing the same type of materials used in the original construction. And one of the largest and best go-to suppliers in the state of Victoria is right here in Dunolly! Just outside of town you will find Dunolly Demolition and Salvage located on Betley Road, Dunolly and run by Greg for over thirty years,

Greg started the business in Melbourne while sourcing materials for a friend's building project and, not one to let an opportunity pass by, the business expanded, as did his visionary flair to create a place of supply, intrigue and notable interest.

Greg, a very talented knock-about-man who can try his hand at almost anything, was born and raised in Mildura. As a young man Greg travelled to Adelaide, working as a slaughterman in a meatworks. Realising there must be more to life, he travelled to Darwin, working construction on the wharf precinct, then moved to Melbourne, working in the demolition industry. Greg found himself in Dunolly, sourcing materials for a job and realised the location, in Central Victoria, seemed an ideal place to set up a demolition yard. Besides, country living was much more peaceful than the busy suburban life.

Yet again, another opportunity fell into his lap when the old "Cairns Reef" mine site presented itself for sale; the present location for Dunolly Demolition and Salvage. Over time the storage sheds grew to the Bunnings-sized warehousing complex you see today, a credit to this talented man of vision.

His complex is stocked with recycled timber; de-nailed, trimmed, sized and stacked just like a modern timber yard, the fundamental difference being you can't buy a lot of this timber anymore. Anyone restoring a heritage-style building need not look any further than Dunolly Demolition and Salvage for hard-to-get varieties of timber such as Baltic pine flooring, the various oaks and ashes and even New Zealand Kauri. Lead-light windows and doors, doublehung sash windows with lead-lighting from the late 19th and early 20th centuries; even the old pressed red bricks for paving and building are available, also lighting, bric-abrac and more. This place is amazing!

Another credit to Greg, and in gratitude for Dunolly, is the vast number of consumers who visit because here is where they find what they're looking for to complete the

renovations or to improve their homes or offices.

An efficient, practical and approachable man, Greg, with an immense raft of knowledge, is only too happy to help people out for renovations. There are enough materials such as heavy steel beams, roofing iron, C-section, roller doors and trusses to build several large farm sheds, or even a quirky house of your own design.

After more than thirty years of collecting there is so much to see, and every time you visit, there is always something new to discover. It pays to ring first as Greg may be out on a job, dismantling a grand old house.

Greg believes part of his reason for being here on Earth is to preserve our heritage, even being, "a bit of a Greenie". This is a man of consideration, forethought and remarkable ethics for the greater good of future generations. What he creates speaks louder than words



by preserving and promoting recycled products.

Greg and his partner live in the Dunolly township and have a retail outlet next door to the Bakery where they sell their antiques and collectable wares; another impressive business that also brings buyers from all places. This in turn helps other businesses to continue.

CENTRAL GOLDFIELDS RATEPAYERS AND RESIDENTS ASSOC. INC.

Our last meeting, held in Talbot, addressed a variety of issues, including a report on the recent Skate Park workshops held at the Hub in Maryborough.

The workshops, conducted on 31st July, focused on the possible design and location of the new park. *Convic*, the firm of consultants, will now formulate a Draft Plan, followed by, hopefully, further community consultation.

The Draft Property Occupancy Policy Q & A session, held on 17th July, was also discussed, with the meeting being informed as to some of the recommendations made by people in attendance. This Draft Policy is essentially of a fairly complicated nature, due to its need to be tailored to cater for many different types of community groups. Whilst many understand that it is a process which will allow Council-managed buildings to be 'on the same page', it has been viewed in the early stages by some groups as a potential upheaval, possibly affecting their financial viability. One of the strong recommendations which had arisen, was that a second round of public consultations be held, following a further Draft and before Council meets with representatives of the groups, in order that the public gain a better understanding of the process and implications.

Our next meeting is to be held on Tuesday, 3rd September at 7.30pm at the SES Building in Broadway, Dunolly (entry at rear of building). Everyone is welcome, you do not have to be a member to attend. Ngardang Girri Kalat Mimini set to arrive at Art Gallery

A major exhibition titled Ngardang Girri Kalat Mimini (Mother Aunty Sister Daughter) will open at Central Goldfields Art Gallery on Saturday 17th August, 2019.

This is the first collective exhibition by members of Ngardang Girri Kalat Mimini which is a network of Victorian Indigenous women artists, with a particular focus on those regionally based. Over 20 artists from around Victoria are included in the exhibition. Visitors will have the opportunity to see the work of established artists such as Yorta Yorta woman and 2018 Koorie Heritage Trust Art Show winner Janet Bromley and Aunty Marlene Gilson, who had a soldout solo exhibition at the 2018 Sydney Biennale.

The exhibition also includes the work of emerging artists including artists from the Shepparton TAFE and artists who have come through the Torch program, which supports Aboriginal men and women in prison and post release to connect to culture through art. The exhibition will draw on an exquisite and unique collection of artworks and cultural objects from across the state, some of which come from private collections and are not often offered for public viewing. There is a huge diversity of mediums and techniques from weaving, to painting and installation which celebrates the uniqueness of south-eastern Indigenous art and culture by women, while at the same time challenges stereotypes of what Aboriginal art looks like.

Opening celebrations commence at 1pm on Saturday 17th August with a large Cultural Ceremony outside the Maryborough Resource Centre, corner of Alma and Nolan streets, Maryborough. The ceremony will include a Welcome to Country, traditional smoking ceremony and several cultural performances. Following the ceremony, everyone is invited on the short walk to Central Goldfields Art Gallery for the official opening of the exhibition at 2pm by Central Goldfields Shire Chief Administrator Noel Harvey followed by remarks from exhibition curator and artist Georgia MacGuire.

Ngardang Girri Kalat Mimini has been made possible through funding received from Creative Victoria, Regional Arts Victoria, National Exhibitions Touring Support Victoria and Central Goldfields Shire Council.

The Market Committee would like to thank all those who attended and managed to stay to the end. Their attendance was so much appreciated that the Market Committee decided not to collect fees from these brave people.


The SES held the BBQ this month and demonstrated their training by helping a local who was choking by dislodging the food he had stuck in his throat. Well-done Rick and Leanne.

A Cost for all Victorians

Transurban's recent profit announcement grossing \$813 Million from CityLink is good news for Transurban investors, but comes at a cost not only for commuters, but for all Victorian consumers. Transurban have negotiated a deal with the Victorian Government that allows CityLink tolls to increase by 4.25% every year until 2029. The announcement highlighted a 5.5% increase in heavy vehicles, accounting for 20% of CityLink users.

"Trucks now account for one in every five vehicles on Melbourne's tolled roads, Rail Freight Alliance Chair, Cr Glenn Milne said.

"What legacy is this Victorian Government leaving for future generations? These additional costs will not just be borne by the users of CityLink; these costs will now be attributed to all Victorians as the costs of goods will increase due to a reliance on road freight in Victoria and increase cost associated with this mode."

The Murray Basin Rail Project (MBRP), heralded by the Andrews Government as removing 20,000 truck movements from the Victorian road network per year and moving more freight on to rail was due to be completed by 2018.

School Days

Thinking about my school-teaching days has brought back memories of school life in the 80s. Teachers did not experience nearly as many problems then as we read about now. Students did not have electronic devices; there was one computer room where classes had access to it in twice a week lessons.

In high school, the juniors were generally well-behaved, as they were still finding their way in the transition from primary school. The middle school were the ones who needed a firmer hand as they had found their niche in the school and were mostly bursting with confidence, and thus could be a handful. The seniors were starting to get serious about their studies and rarely caused problems.

I chose to take classes at all levels in order to keep my hand in on the discipline side. I had seen teachers shy away from middle school and when they had to take a fillin class for absent staff, they were often overwhelmed by some of the trouble-makers taking advantage.

I had a teacher friend who lived not far from me in St. Andrews and when the need arose, for example a petrol strike, we would give each other a lift to school. There was a rather badly-behaved boy, named Wayne, in my 10th form; a big sturdy fellow with shoulder-length blonde hair, and he was always trying to get under my skin. This particular day I got a lift with my friend, whom I will call John (as we still keep in touch and he lives in Castlemaine) and Wayne saw me get out of John's car when arriving at school. In the middle of class Wayne put up his hand and said he had a question. It was: "Mrs .Lindsay, are you and Mr. D - having an affair?" I looked Wayne straight in the eye and replied, "Yes Wayne, we are having a mad, passionate, love affair. Is there anything else you'd like to know?" Wayne went bright red and put his head down on the desk. What Wayne didn't know, but some of his classmates did, was that John was gay. Got you there, Wayne.

The funny thing was that years later I was at the local market and a big strapping fellow came up to me and asked if I remembered him from school. In a flash I saw Wayne back in the classroom. He said he remembered giving me a hard time and I replied that he certainly did but I remembered giving it right back to him. Ah schooldays, schooldays!

Mr Hoober said the earlier the teams register the better and that with a new organising committee, next year's event is already shaping up to be a good one.



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

"The MBRP is now at a standstill after Minister Allan has walked away from it, announcing the project was out of funds, with stage 2 of the 5-stage project incomplete. Cr Milne said If ever there was a catalyst to get this project back on track surely an announced 5.5% increase in heavy vehicles would be it"

"If ever there was a time to invest in rail freight in Victoria it is now, the continued reliance on bigger and bigger trucks does nothing for road safety, congestion, amenity nor reduced vehicle emissions. Rail is the most cost effective and safe transport mode for freight, Cr Milne said. The Murray Basin Rail Project was to be the start of a revival in rail freight in Victoria, for the Andrews government to walk away from this commitment will cost all Victorians dearly. "With rural and regional Victorians already feeling the Andrews Government have left them high and dry, it appears that Daniel Andrews campaign slogan of "Say What You Do, Do What You Say", doesn't cover all Victorians, but the failure to complete the Murray Basin Rail Project will certainly impact all Victorians. More trucks, bigger trucks, an expensive freight

system, will see the cost of living in Victoria continue to rise as will Transurban's revenue. Cr Milne said." Media Release


BOOK WEEK PARADE

Scam Watch (from scamwatch website):

"Many people are confident they would never fall for a scam but often it's this sense of confidence that scammers target," ACCC Deputy Chair Delia Rickard said. People need to update their idea of what a scam is so that we are less vulnerable.

Scammers are professional businesses dedicated to ripping us off. They have call centres with convincing scripts, staff training programs, and corporate performance indicators their 'employees' need to meet."

Investment scams are one of the most sophisticated and convincing scams and continue to have the highest losses. Nearly half of all investment scams reported this year resulted in a financial loss

These scams are prominent on social media, with 'Facebook lottery' scams, the 'Loom' pyramid scheme, and cryptocurrency scams particularly common.

If you do receive a phone call, an official-looking email or SMS, DO NOT give out your personal information and rather than click on the links provided, do your own independent search. Go to the website independently, or phone. Usually, you'll find you've dodged a scam. The best way to beat them? Absolute scepticism.

If you do get caught out ring your bank and tell them what has happened and they can either keep a watch on your account and/or change your account details/number and then take your computer in to be checked over to make sure they haven't installed any backdoor access to your computer



Illegal wood harvesting targeted to protect significant wildlife habitat in national parks

Healthy Parks Healthy People[®]

Tuesday 13th August 2019: To protect the habitats of native animals, Parks

Healthy People Victoria authorised officers have stepped up patrols and surveillance over the past month following several cases of illegal tree felling and removal within parks and reserves in northern Victoria.

Significant hollow trees have been cut down and removed from national parks, destroying important habitats for mammals, reptiles, birds and invertebrates.

Since July, "Operation CROOKWELL" has targeted people who are allegedly cutting down trees to supply buyers with firewood.

In the latest seizure on Thursday 8th August, Parks Victoria authorised officers and Victoria Police intercepted a man in possession of more than two cubic meters of wood, allegedly taken from Chiltern-Mount Pilot National Park. The man's vehicle, three chainsaws and the wood were confiscated. He will be charged with several offences, including cutting and taking firewood in a national park, driving off road and destroying wildlife habitat.

At least six other people will be charged with various offences as part of the operation and a total of three motor vehicles, six chainsaws and seven cubic metres of wood have been seized as evidence with the operation ongoing. Firewood can only be collected from designated collection areas in certain areas during permitted seasons. Quince Paste

Ingredients:

6 Quinces peeled and cored 1/2 cup water

Method:

Cook in pan until quinces are soft. Add equal parts sugar and cook until candied, or comes away from sides and is ruby red. This could take 2-3 hours. Pour into a greased tray and leave overnight. Place in a slow oven for 3-4 hours until dry.

When cold cut into squares and store in an airtight container. Paste will keep longer in the refrigerator.
