

Between a Rock and a Vast Space



Australia has thousands of parks and Dunolly artist Val Wilkinson has explored, photographed and painted more than 600 of them.

In her radically modified 60-series Landcruiser, Val "ticked-off" the parks on a state-by-state basis during what she describes as "the best decade of my life".

"Many of the most iconic parks are very remote. Access tracks can be badly corrugated, impossible when wet, and a long way from roadside assist even if there was a phone signal which there was not!" However, Val says the hardest to reach parks invariably provided her the most inspiring subject matter to paint and photograph.

A new 300 metre stretch of footpath is being constructed along Bull Street, between Market Street and Havelock Street and will provide a connection to the entrance of the Dunolly Hospital.

The second project involved the construction of a new 100 metre stretch of footpath along Market Street, from Bull Street to the Dunolly Swimming Pool.

Both projects are funded as part of the 2021-2022 Council Budget.

Supported by the Victorian Government through the Regional Recovery Fund, Shine Maryborough is a retail recovery project which aims to investigate creative ways to help local retailers bounce back from COVID-19 and how to work out the best way to make Maryborough shine.

The recovery program aims to support local retail traders by identifying ways to benefit from major new projects in and around the CBD at the Railway Station, Art Gallery, Hospital and recreation precinct.

Ideas for collective branding, marketing and how to retain local spending in the online retail environment will also be developed.

New funding for COVID safe outdoor precinct activation has recently been granted by the Victorian Government, so there are opportunities to get some COVID-safe outdoor events and street infrastructure happening.

This will build on recent outdoor dining installations and support trade while limits on indoor numbers remain.

Free green waste disposal to help community get fire ready

Central Goldfields Shire is offering free green waste disposal to encourage residents to prepare their properties for the upcoming fire season.

Council is offering free green waste drop off for residents at the Carisbrook, Talbot and Dunolly transfer stations every weekend from Saturday 27th November to Sunday 19th December.

Residents should start preparing their properties by:

- Clearing undergrowth and fallen branches.
- Moving firewood away from the house.
- Cleaning leaves from gutters.
- Ensuring that grass is cut.
- Preparing a Fire Plan.

Council is also playing its part in preparing for the upcoming fire season.

Over the past few weeks, Council's slashing crew has been busy cutting grass in the Dunolly, Timor and Bowenvale, Majorca and Bromley areas, with crews to move to Majorca, Daisy Hill, Talbot, Eddington and Carisbrook in the coming weeks.

Central Goldfields Shire Maryborough Ward Councillor, Wayne Sproull, said "No matter where you live in Central Goldfields Shire — whether you're in a town or on a farm — your property is likely to be at high to extreme bush or grass fire risk.

"Take the time to increase your understanding of the fire risk where you live; prepare your property and talk to your loved ones about what you'll do to stay safe from fire."

Council's Fire Prevention Officer will soon be inspecting properties to ensure they are ready for summer. Notices may be issued to property owners who do not properly clean up their properties — if not acted upon, property owners may be fined.



St David's Bealiba 150th celebration

Putting up the 150th celebration sign onto the front wall of the tiny brick church in Bealiba while fine hail was falling made our prayers for good weather look futile. However, at 2pm on Sunday 14th November 2021, the sun shone on our celebration. St David's Anglican church was opened on 12th November 1871. We felt duty-bound to celebrate our brave pioneers' great achievement in building such a fine upstanding church from bricks of local clay and timber gathered from our beautiful box ironbark forests which surround Bealiba.

The ceremony began with a church service; Rev Canon Jan Harper designed a faith affirming simple liturgy. Each member of the invited congregation received a lovely booklet with the service, the words of the two hymns and some lovely colour photographs of some of the special events in which St David's had participated in recent times. Also included was some history of the original Dedication celebration 150 years ago.

The Anglican Bishop of Bendigo, Matt Brain's sermon reminded those present to "Rejoice in the Lord always: again I will say, Rejoice" which is a line from a verse in Philippians in the Bible. Bishop Matt dwelt on the words of the Patron Saint of the church, St David — Patron Saint of Wales — the Saint said "Be joyful, keep the faith and do the little things in life." Or so the mid-sixth Century scholars tell us.

Wendy Newitt was welcomed back to Bealiba and played the organ, or rather coaxed the ancient organ, while the congregation sang heartily.

After the service, the weather kindly permitted us to have a group photo with the 150th sign and as the rain fell, all retired to the church hall for the cutting of the cake. We asked Ian Lovel to cut the celebration cake as Betty Lovel is in Ballarat Base hospital, following her operation. Betty has long contributed to the continuation of worship in the lovely old church with her monthly fund raising efforts in Bealiba Community Hall, as well as Pancake Day for Bealiba School children.

Folk were reticent to leave, enjoying the shared memories of Sunday School picnics, recalling skilled, kindly Ministers who had shepherded their flock over the many years of happy fellowship from this tiny little building in the heart of box ironbark forest in Central Victoria.

Support for your kids to get active

Does your child love sport and being active? Does your family have a Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card? You may be eligible for up to \$200 to put towards the cost of your child's participation in physical activities.

As children return to sport over the coming months, the Get Active Kids Voucher Program helps eligible families get their kids involved in organised sport and active recreation activities.

Under the program, children may be eligible to receive up to \$200 to help with the cost of membership and registration fees, uniforms, and equipment.

The program also provides a special consideration stream to support children residing in care services as well as temporary or provisional visa holders, undocumented migrants or international students.

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Central Goldfields Ratepayers & Residents Association Inc

On Tuesday 9th November 2021 we held our first online *Zoom* meeting. Eleven members were in attendance — so different to sitting at table in person.

This was the first meeting where there was not one councillor present. Twelve months ago several newly elected councillors attended our meeting with much vigour. Unfortunately not one of the issues raised or presented to our councillors (from that meeting) has been resolved, though many other issues have been acted upon. We thank the council and councillors for that. At this meeting we discussed the Carisbrook levee; the recent Ten Year and Financial and Council Plans; the Ombudsman and FOI investigations still active; the Disability Action plan (this one is a doozy — stay tuned); mentions of the Airport; Men's Shed and several other topics.

The ongoing issue around the Carisbrook levee was interesting to see how the council in August 2021 claimed to be waiting for funding. We contacted our federal member and they informed us funding has been made available, then council changed the delay from a funding issue to planning issues.

We have a concern with many community projects which still have not been completed, and pose the question when will they be completed? The Dunolly mosaics desperately need repair, the book seats need final installation, the Youth Hub, and the airport desperately need maintenance, the Carisbrook levee has to be completed — to mention a few. The confidence in the council and the system needs to be improved. Great to see these issues being talked about, but action is required.

The reports of the lack of confidence in the council's Deliberative Engagement have left a lot of question marks



around its processes and outcomes. This is mainly information along the journey with these committee meetings, and council actually heeding and acting for our community. The community participation is commendable, but the council's secrecy and handling is questionable. The latest issue around the airport has been raised with an attempt by council to finally rectify a long term water issue. After last week's 20mls of rain council had to return to the botched work on the previous botched job and sand bagged the area. They now need to build spoon drains to redirect the water to another area. This will possibly be several tens of thousands of dollars wasted on something which should have been done correctly in the first place. Twelve months with the new elected councillors, the fence built and the water issue worked on — and our airport which was given Priority Listing at the councillors' first meeting and it is in the worst situation it has ever been in. Of late, there has been a question raised regarding the CGR&RAI's attention given to the council. The aim of a ratepayers association is to raise issues and be the council's and the community's eyes by assisting council to have a more comprehensive understanding of issues which have been brought to their attention. When council avoid these issues, a good ratepayers association would also raise their presentation to council. This process will continue until there is a confidence in the community with management of council where a ratepayers association is no longer required.

The involvement of CGR&RAI's existence is governed by the actions of the council and councillors. CGR&RAI looks forward to that time where there is no need for an organisation like us. The increasing communication we are receiving from the community could possibly indicate that sadly local issues and confidence in the council is not improving. A 53% community satisfaction survey result seems to indicate this.

Just three years ago Bass Shire Ratepayers involvement and community support was huge, now they basically do not exist. This is due to the actions of the council and councillors. The CGR&RAI looks forward to being out of a job. Council's working with community, listening to and respecting opinions and visible actions will achieve this. The next *Zoom* meeting will be held on 7th December 2021. This will be our AGM. All positions will be vacated, nominations called for and proxy voting will be permitted. Please contact CGR&RAI for more information or forms. Only financial members can vote, nominate and be nominated as per the Model Rules.



What's on at the Neighbourhood Centre?



Kymberley Williams is a proud Narungga woman. She's originally from the Yorke Peninsula coast of South Australia and grew up in Bendigo, travelling back and forth throughout her childhood.

Kymberley is inviting the First Nations community to meet up for a yarn about local health needs. Sometimes it can be difficult for members of the mob to speak about their health or ask for help. Kymberley is here to support Koori and Torres Strait Islanders and hopes to be the person to close the gap between the hospital and the mob, making them feel comfortable to come forward and talk about health issues in a safe and comfortable environment.

Since starting her job in August, Kimberley and CEO Nickola Allan have met with local elders like Aunty

Marilyne Nicholls to talk about a local reconciliation action plan, identifying the needs of local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders to help shape local health programs and services.

The Fund will deliver grants of up to \$10 million per project, with a minimum funding amount of \$150,000 per project.



Local author launches new book

Last Thursday, 11th November, a group of ladies attended the Dunolly Neighbourhood Centre to congratulate Em Goldy on the launch of her book of poems, *Invisible Connections*. 
Thank you Em for this insightful and interesting take on saving our planet.
