

Minister visits Dunolly Library

After opening to the public last year, Minister for Local Government Shaun Leane visited Dunolly last week to officially mark the opening of the Dunolly Library.

The brand-new facility opened to the public in July last year following a \$140,000 transformation, funded through the State Government's Living Libraries Infrastructure Program, to house the library inside the historic Dunolly Police Station Building which dates back to 1958.

The new library replaced the previous outreach service offered by the Maryborough Regional Library, after the Goldfields Library Corporation stopped servicing the town in 2016.

The library facility features more resources, services, computer access and activities, a ramp and accessible amenities.

Speaking during the minister's visit, Central Goldfields Shire mayor Chris Meddows-Taylor said the new library is a wonderful community facility.

"It's great to have the minister visit because without the funding the Victorian Government provided, we wouldn't have this wonderful facility," he said.

"This is a fantastic thing, it's a project the community wanted and is something we'd worked on for quite a few years to come up with the right solution; but this is more than that, this is perfect."

Minister Leane said the importance of libraries in their communities throughout the COVID pandemic has only increased.

It's exciting to launch this new library for Dunolly locals at the iconic heritage police station with support from the Living Libraries Infrastructure Program," he said.

"Libraries are about so much more than books and services like computer access — they foster learning and social connections and are a meeting place for the local community.

"Libraries are a great social hub and have found ways to connect the community and support individuals even when libraries weren't open.

"This is a small building but it's the people in it who make such a big difference and these people will continue doing fantastic work into the future."

The Dunolly Historic Precinct Committee has worked with council for a number of years to see the project realised and committee member Kath Ryan said the facility was particularly important for Dunolly.

"We're really thrilled to have our museum space used in such a vital way," she said.

"Libraries are such an important space for any community but for a small, remote community like Dunolly it's a real benefit."

The Dunolly Library, located at 42 Market Street, is open from 9am until 1pm Tuesdays and 1pm until 5pm on Thursdays.



Much later I discovered that her life there was similar to a doggy boutique, with special meals, leg massage for her arthritis, baths with hot towels.

Who could blame her for her excitement when she bounded out of the car and rushed through Carolyn's front door.

When Maddie first moved in I took her to an obedience class and she gained her diploma, proudly framed on the wall.

I trained her never to come near anyone at the dinner table or when eating.

As a result, if she came over for a pat and saw me eating something she would turn around and go off to wait, until the coast was clear and she could forage for crumbs.

If ever someone came to the front door and I was in the back garden, Maddie would come and tell me.

If she woke me at night to go out, I would go back to bed until she returned.

She would pop her head in the bedroom door to let me know she was back and then head off to her bed.

Sadly arthritis set in over the past 12 months and despite medication we all know there is no cure.

Maddie's back legs started to give out and she was having falls so Carolyn and I both accepted that the time was coming close.

Then when she was unable to climb into the car and lost her huge appetite we knew it was time to say goodbye to a loyal and faithful, loving dog.

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Urban Magpies

The adolescent magpie was sure it was going to get a snack from the old man eating fish and chips on the bench in a Maryborough street the other day.

It glanced at me quickly as I walked past. Just making sure I was not going to step on it really.

Once reassured it transferred all its concentration back to the old man. It did not squawk at him as it would have done a month earlier. Clearly it had learned some manners, but it did jiggle from leg to leg waiting impatiently for the expected treat to arrive.

Magpies are very good at begging. During the nesting season they are the most easily identified around my house. Once they leave the nest they are even worse. From early morning to evening they follow their parents and siblings constantly squawking. They do have to grow quickly so their appetites must be enormous, but do they have to be so noisy?

I have seen baby magpies begging from other magpie fledglings and from people kneeling in the garden as well as their parents and older siblings. How so many survive to adulthood often amazes me, especially when they wake me up at sunrise.

Because magpies eat almost anything it is interesting to watch them. The adults bring a piece of food, perhaps a worm or a grub, and the young gulp it down greedily and often manage to squawk again while it is still swallowing. How they learn what is and is not food while swallowing so quickly is a mystery. Human infants play with and squish their food, taking time to learn colours, smell and textures. An annoying process for any parent cleaning kitchen surfaces — yet again. But it is one we totally understand. Magpies, having a much shorter lifespan than humans obviously need to learn much quicker, and develop a much broader appreciation of all their food options.

I did not look back to see if the old man did give the expectant magpie any food. I just expected that he did. Many humans get amusement and pleasure out of feeding birds, and the birds happily capitalise on that.

Joyce Chivers — memoirs

In January 1942 I started work at the Commonwealth Bank in Collins Street in Melbourne.

My title was paying teller's clerk; this was a new job for a girl; beside me was Valda who was the teller's clerk.

These positions were usually the starting point for an 18-year-old male beginning his banking career. But no young men were available as all fit 18-year-olds had been called up to serve in the War.

Our two tellers were middle-aged men: great people and wonderful to work for. In March the Americans came to Melbourne and also Ballarat.

General MacArthur arrived having escaped from the Philippines; also his wife and son. For a time they lived at the Menzies Hotel in Queen Street, I think. In those days very elite, but Government of course. At that time the Children's Hospital had just been built, so the Americans took that over.

Then came something I will never forget. The bank had a very large space opposite the tellers' cages, beautiful floor, etc. You can imagine my amazement when I looked up (incidentally we sat rather concealed behind the teller's box) and there were four Americans at my teller's and over along the wall stood men with three "tommy guns".

I do not think they got that much money but one cheeky beggar put up a note "telephone number please". Joyce hid out of sight.

My next move was to a receiving teller's clerk, a little more complicated; and finally upstairs to overseas teller's clerk. As well as writing up sheets, payments etc I did a lot of counter work. Very interesting, meeting all kinds of people.

Parents sending £5 (five pounds) to an Air Force son in England or Canada. I have often wondered, as we lost so many RAAF boys, if they ever came back.

When the War finished I did not know where I would be put so Joyce resigned and came home to farm life, helping Mum and Dad. My Mother had not been well, she was doing outdoor work, even spraying in the orchard, as all the men had been called up, so it was milking cows for me, but I never minded that.

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Three separate grass fires in Raglan Street

Local fire brigades were put to work last week battling a grass fire burning close to the centre of Dunolly which "could have turned into something nasty," according to Dunolly Fire Brigade Captain Ken Duell.

The fire broke out in three different locations along Raglan Street just before 7pm on Monday 10th January.

Captain Duell said the fires were in three separate paddocks and tackled by seven units including from Dunolly, Tarnagulla and Maryborough.

"It could have turned into something nasty, the crews did a magnificent job getting on top of it," he said.

"It was particularly tricky because it started in three different spots on separate properties along Raglan Street.

"One was right on the corner of Raglan and Moliagul roads which burnt about the size of a house block, just up from there it burnt around half an acre, then further up past a house that's where it really got going and took out about 20 acres.

"The wind was taking it in the direction of the main road (Broadway) and there's a couple of houses down



there that had to be protected, especially as the resources had to be split up between three different spots."

While a police investigation into the incident is ongoing, Captain Duell said he believes it was sparked by a tractor.

"Police have investigated it but we're classing it as accidental and believe it was started by a tractor travelling down the road and sparking the dry grass," he said.

Captain Duell said it's a warning to

everyone to take care during summer.

"Be careful when you're using machinery. Everyone knows how hot it is at the moment, anything will take off very quickly with a little bit of wind," he said.

"We were lucky the wind wasn't heavy with this fire. If there was more wind it might have been a different story."



There's no doubt local businesses have endured a challenging two years, but a newly formed Dunolly business group is turning this adversity into strength. Dunolly Traders Incorporated comprises more than 12 Dunolly-based businesses who have recently come together to formulate some big plans for the future.

The idea of Thea Hillier, of family-owned business Dunolly Nik Naks & Gallery, the group formed from conversations about the challenges of COVID-19 and decided to do something about it. Ms Hillier said it's important that Dunolly is on the map for tourists but more importantly, so locals are aware of just what the community has to offer. That's all there for visitors to enjoy, but it's also so important that locals get involved and spend Dunolly dollars in Dunolly.

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

Bull & Mouth Hotel Dunolly

The Bull & Mouth Hotel was an important hotel in Dunolly, but only for a short time. It was where the Dunolly Post Office now stands.

William Hendry and James Lyle opened the Bull & Mouth Hotel in September 1856. They also had a coach and got contracts to deliver the mail to Kingower, Korong, Newbridge and Maryborough. In 1856 the Bull & Mouth was also the Cobb & Co stopping place.

Later in the year Lyle bought out Hendry but they seem to have still maintained a close connection.

In April 1857 Hendry disappeared on his way back from buying gold at Kingower. His cart was found in the bush north of Dunolly along with his hat and coat. There was no trace of him or the £600 worth of gold dust, and about £900 in cash. The scene suggested he had been murdered. £200 was immediately offered for the discovery of the murderer.

Hendry had orchestrated the whole robbery himself. He shaved off his moustache and beard, dressed as a digger, walked to Bendigo then caught a coach to Melbourne with intention to sail for England. His undoing was when Simeon Cohen, who worked for Solomon & Levy, saw him in Collingwood. Cohen then alerted the police. Hendry was arrested the next day in Bourke Street. Due to a technicality Hendry was allowed out on bail. He absconded and was not seen again.

James and Teresa Lyle had the hotel rebuilt in brick later in 1857 making it about the third brick building erected in Dunolly. The building consisted of the hotel, residence and stables at the rear. By 1858 the council were meeting in the large room at the hotel and another room was rented as the Town Clerk's office.

In April the stage coaches transferred their stopping place to the Bendigo Hotel. This meant a big loss of

business to the Bull & Mouth. The next month Lyle locked the Town Clerk out of his office. Presumably this was for being behind in the rent. The council responded by threatening to sell the hotel for back rates.

Lyle sold the hotel to James Henderson for £350. Henderson let the license lapse. It reopened for a while in 1862 and 1863 but closed again about April. Henderson offered the property for sale but got no takers. In May 1863 he had the building demolished and the bricks used to make two smaller shops. It seems the stables remained until pulled down in 1890 to make way for the Post Office.

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Ingredients

- 4 eggs 2/3 cup
- (150g) caster sugar
- 1 cup (150g) self-raising flour
- 1/4 cup (35g) cornflour
- 25 gram soft butter, chopped
- 1/3 cup (80ml) boiling water 4 cups
- (270g) desiccated coconut

Chocolate Icing

- 4 2/3 cups
- (750g) icing sugar mixture
- 1/2 cup (50g) cocoa powder
- 20 grams soft butter
- 3/4 cup (180ml) mil

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 180°C (160°C fan-forced). Grease and flour a 20cm x 30cm lamington pan, line base with baking paper.
2. Beat eggs in a small bowl with an electric mixer until light in colour. Gradually add sugar; beat for 8 minutes or until the mixture is thick. Mixture should form thick ribbons when the beaters are lifted.
3. Meanwhile, sift flour and cornflour together three times. Combine butter and boiling water in a small heatproof bowl.
4. Transfer egg mixture to a large bowl. Sift the flour mixture over the egg mixture; using a balloon whisk or a large metal spoon, gently fold the flour into the egg mixture, then fold in the butter mixture.
5. Pour mixture into prepared pan. Bake in a moderate oven for about 25 minutes or until sponge springs back when touched lightly in the centre and comes away from side of pan. Turn cake onto a wire rack to cool.
6. Cut cake into 20 even pieces.
7. Meanwhile, to make chocolate icing, sift the icing sugar and cocoa into a large heatproof bowl; add the butter and milk; stir over a medium saucepan of simmering water until icing is smooth and thick enough to coat the back of a spoon. Divide icing mixture into 2 small bowls.
8. Place coconut in a shallow bowl.
9. Using a large fork, dip each piece of cake briefly into icing until cake is coated in icing. Hold over bowl to drain off any excess. Dip half the cake pieces in one bowl of icing and the other half in the second bowl of icing. (We have separated the icing into two bowls, as cake crumbs will thicken the icing and make it difficult to use.) If the icing becomes too thick, stand it over hot water while dipping, or reheat gently with a little more milk. If necessary, strain the icing into a clean bowl.
10. Toss cake gently in coconut. Transfer cake to a wire rack; stand until set.




