IS OUR COUNCIL LISTENING?

Dear Editor,

I have been trying to deal with the Compliance Dept. AT THE CENTRAL GOLDFIELDS SHIRE in regards to getting a vacant block cleared for the current fire season. With great difficulty I must say.

The block is in Dunolly town boundaries. Two years ago this block caused a severe grass fire and spread into paddocks and trees behind it.

The block is adjacent to two adjoining houses - one occupied by very elderly owners who do their best to keep their block clear.

The council mowing did not cut the verge grass of this property earlier.

The block owned by absent owners is now covered by 10 foot gum saplings and high grass after the wet spring we have had.

I have not had any feedback about my complaints to the CGSC Compliance Dept. OR action on getting the block cleared which is now urgent with the on-going high risk, fire days still to come.

Surely this clearance could be done by the Shire and the cost added to the owner's rates payment.

The community is very un-nerved by the lack of attention by this department.

I am awaiting a reply from our local Councillor.

MOTHER'S DAY CLASSIC STEPS UP FOR BREAST AND OVARIAN CANCER

rganisers of Australia's most loved national fun run and walk, the Women in Super Mother's Day Classic (MDC), calls for more to be done to increase funding for medical research, to elevate women's health, prevent deaths from breast cancer, and improve the survival outcomes for ovarian cancer.

For the first time, this year's annual event, in which more than 70,000 participants will walk or run nationwide on **Mother's Day, Sunday, May 12**, will also raise money for ovarian cancer research, partnering with the Ovarian Cancer Research Foundation.

In 2024, MDC participants will have the option of taking part in support of and fundraising for breast cancer research, ovarian cancer research, or both.

Ovarian cancer is the most lethal gynaecological cancer, which claims the life of a woman every eight hours in Australia.

The five-year relative survival rate for ovarian cancer is just 49 per cent, with 1,054 deaths every year.

The MDC is the biggest donor to the National Breast Cancer



Foundation, having raised \$44 million over the past 26 years. In that time the five-year relative survival rate for breast cancer has increased from 84 per cent to 92 per cent.

For the 2024 Mother's Day Classic, 70,000-plus people will start their day by walking or running at one of more than 70 locations across the country to support and honour those touched by breast cancer or ovarian cancer.

The National Breast Cancer Foundation and the Ovarian Cancer Research Foundation both acknowledge that research is the key to improving outcomes for women and saving lives.

Registrations are now open for

the 27th Mother's Day Classic at mothersdayclassic.com.au.

Participants can save up to 33% with VIP pricing, plus 'Kids Go Free in Feb'. T's and C's Apply.

In the 26-year history of the Mother's Day Classic, \$44 million has been donated to fund gamechanging breast cancer research. In 2024, the event is going further and inviting MDC participants to run or walk and accelerate progress towards the day that no Australian families suffer the devastation of losing another woman to breast or ovarian cancer.

Many years ago, before I even considered becoming a councillor, a group of locals and Council developed the Gordon Gardens Master Plan.

After a lot of work and community consultation, the final plan was published in September 2019.

The aim of the plan is to provide a framework and directions to guide Central

Goldfields Shire Council's future work including planting and development of the gardens. For example new paths, new trees, shade sails, seating, new facilities and removal of old facilities.

Work has been done in the years since, as money has become available either through grants or Councils' own funding, but the plan is not quite complete. I am stoked to announce that more work is planned in the next couple of months by the Operations Team, with available budget from this financial year. The scope of works to deliver the next parts of the master plan is as follows:

- 2 DDA (Disability Discrimination Act i.e. accessible) compliant tables and benches.
- Purchase of 15 Trees (compatible trees) and planting.
- Removal of old skate park and new path installation – approx. 100m
- Installation of a disabled access ramp for the Dunolly Bowling Club on Barkly Street.

This is exciting news for Dunolly, especially the disabled ramp at the Bowling Club which a lot of people have been asking for.


Naming the ELEPHANT in the room

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CELEBRATING OUR DUNOLLY HOSPITAL AUXILIARY



International Women's Day is celebrated every year on March the 8th. It began in 1911 to raise the status of women and strive for parity in education, society and the workplace. Over the past 113 years there have been a lot of gains but there is still some way to go. In Dunolly there are a number of committees wholly run by women and each one, in it's own unique way, raises the

status of Dunolly women.

The Dunolly and District Hospital Auxiliary (Inc.) is one such committee. Members were quick to point out that they have no rule against men joining them but so far no males have applied. The current committee has only four members Faye Nicholson, Rosemary Mecredy, Joyce Vater and Barbara Coupland who describe themselves as very mature, middle aged. Since COVID 19 hit it has been impossible to recruit new members to replace those who have retired.



First, some history:

The Dunolly Hospital Ball Committee was the main Dunolly Hospital fund raising body for many years, organising balls, concerts and card parties amongst other things. When support for these activities waned during the 1980s, reviving an old group was considered. A Dunolly Hospital Auxiliary existed previously and did tasks such as mending and other jobs as needed. It disbanded in the 1960s due to a lack of members. Around 1990 it re- emerged and while it initially did do some mending it soon took over as the major fundraising body. The mending soon disappeared.

It held an annual White Elephant Sale, wood raffles, and cake stalls. The Dunolly Golf Club had a hospital day tournament and the Auxiliary, splitting into morning and afternoon shifts, did the catering. But changes to government regulations pertaining to catering have made food preparation and sales

difficult now. Funds raised have been spent on hospital client needs.



In the years from 2003 to 2015 the Auxiliary spent more than \$45,000 on client welfare. A lifting chair was bought, as were special shower and geriatric chairs. Doonas and covers were also purchased. Committee member Joyce once bought 15 different silk scarves for clients. Christmas and Easter gifts are bought for all clients. Director of Nursing Donna Bell always gives a report at Auxiliary meetings as well as indicating where funds could be spent.

Currently, they are running several fundraising raffles a year with prizes such as vouchers from local retail or at times, even a fat hamper.

They all find it pleasant to sit on Broadway selling raffle tickets. With a cuppa in hand, they chat to each other, (they do this in pairs) and all passersby are usually very happy to buy a ticket or two in support of the hospital.

Annually, they give \$100 vouchers to the two most improved students (senior and Junior) at Dunolly Primary School. They also provide a \$1,000 scholarship to a local applicant who is going forward with their nursing studies.

One innovative Dunolly hospital worker introduced aromatherapy to the clients and it was very popular. Responding to that, the Auxiliary provided funding for required essential oils. It is an ongoing program but now clients pay for their own oils.

The Auxiliary's greatest aim is to see long planned independent living units up and running. A lot of work and lobbying has gone into this over the years and they hope it will secure government funding eventually.

All Auxiliary members said the satisfaction they get from assisting the Dunolly Hospital is immense. Friendships formed with other Auxiliary members and social interactions outside your home as well as being a useful member of the Dunolly community are other reasons they continue to be members of the Auxiliary.


to the safety of her coop.



Gender Pay Gaps Exposed

he exposure of the gender pay gaps in large Australian organisations is a turning point for gender equality, but more must be done to hold employers to account.

Workplace diversity expert Professor Carol Kulik says the Workplace Gender Equality Agency (WGEA's) release of gender pay gaps for large Australian employers is a great first step but its impact will depend on the actions of organisations to narrow the disparity.

The WGEA – a statutory agency responsible for promoting and improving workplace gender equality has published gender pay gaps for Australian private sector employers with 100 or more employees. It is the first time that large organisations will have their gender pay gap data exposed.

In 2023, the WGEA reported that the average gender pay gap was 21.7%, meaning women in Australia are earning, on average, \$26,393 less a year than men.

Professor Kulik, who has based her career on researching effective management of workplace diversity particularly in relation to gender and age, is a member of the SA Gender Pay Gap Taskforce, an advisory board reporting to the Minister for Women



and the Prevention of Family and Domestic Violence. She says the revelation of gender pay gaps in large corporations is a pivotal moment in advancing gender equality.

"We now must be asking employers, in what roles and what levels of employment are pay gaps most prevalent? How are you (the employer) supporting employees' caring responsibilities? What are you doing to ensure women move into roles where they are paid more? How long will it take for you to close your pay gap? Until we show employers that their pay gaps influence our behaviour, they are unlikely to make the changes needed to narrow pay gaps." Prof Kulik said. "The gaps widen further when women take extended career breaks to have children. Women end up retiring with only two thirds of the amount of superannuation compared to men," she added.



Protect yourself when Gardening

ardening is a fun, safe pastime and it is also a great way to get some fresh air or get the family or grandkids outside.

However, there are some precautions we should take to look after ourselves.

Did you know that Legionella longbeachae bacteria, which can cause Legionnaires' disease - a rare form of pneumonia, are found in commercial potting mixes and are also in compost and soil?

The simplest ways to avoid breathing in or spreading Legionella bacteria are to:

- Wear a face mask and gloves while handling soil, potting mix or compost - gloves will also protect you from any sharp objects or biting insects living in the soil
- Wash your hands with soap and water after gardening, before eating, drinking, smoking or placing your hands near your face or mouth
- Open bags of potting mix in a well-ventilated space and directing the opening away from your face to avoid inhaling the mix
- Dampen potting mix with a light spray of water to reduce the risk of airborne particles, and water gardens and composts gently using a lowpressure hose

Although most people who breathe in the bacteria



don't become ill, the risk of disease increases with age, chronic lung disease, smoking, and in people with weakened immune systems.

The symptoms of Legionnaires' disease usually begin to appear within six days of being exposed to the bacteria.

Early symptoms are like the flu, and include headaches, fever, chills, muscle aches and pains, and a dry cough or shortness of breath. If you experience these, you should see your GP for treatment.
