Single-Councillor Wards for 2024 Central Goldfields Shire Council election

entral Goldfields Shire Council (CGSC) will move to a single-councillor ward structure for the 2024 Council Election.

The change is the result of the Victorian Electoral Commission's (VEC) electoral structure review, which takes place every 12 years.

Currently, Central Goldfields Shire Council is divided into four wards with a total of 7 Councillors — one ward with four Councillors (Maryborough Ward) and three wards with one Councillor each (Flynn, Paddys Ranges and Tullaroop).

The electoral structure will move to a single -councillor ward structure with a total of 7 councillors across 7 wards – with one councillor per ward before the October 2024 local government general election.

The wards will be titled:

- Flynn Ward
- Maryborough Central Ward
- Maryborough East Ward
- Maryborough North Ward
- Maryborough West Ward
- Paddys Ranges Ward
- Tullaroop Ward

Central Goldfields Shire Council is one of 39 Councils to have its electoral structure reviewed due to new requirements under the *Local Government Act 2020*.

Prior to the completion of the review, Council made a submission to the VEC.

Council's submission supported the change to single-Councillor wards and also suggested the four wards covering Maryborough should include the name of the town and compass directions – north, east, south and west.

The review has not changed any external boundaries in the Central Goldfields Shire municipality.

For residents there will be no significant difference to the way that they participate in the 2024 council elections based on this change.

To ensure that all Councils meet the requirements under the Act, the Minister for Local Government formed two panels to conduct electoral structure reviews.

The reviews were held over three rounds, concluding in January 2024.

Sustainable communities that are diverse and inclusive, through planning for the health, wellbeing and prosperity of their people and planet; Liveable communities that have digital capability, helping to equip people with the skills to live, learn and work in a digital society.

Funds will be available for new or existing not-forprofit programs to help them scale their impact to help more Australians in rural and regional areas become better connected.

Applications for the 2024 Telstra Connected Communities grant round has just opened at 9am on Tuesday 27th of February 2024 and will close at 5pm on Wednesday 27th of March 2024.

This round will make \$200,000 available for applications of up to \$10,000 each. Successful grants will be announced in June 2024 and successful applicants will have 12 months to complete funded projects.

Fruit Fly Trees

Dear Editor,

In response to an article, published in *The Maryborough Advertiser* on Friday 16th of February, titled "*Dunolly's share table supporting community*", I feel the need to disagree with the Central Goldfields Shire Council's decision on the risk of fruit fly inhabiting the Black Plum tree that is currently offered as an option for street tree planting.

These trees do, in fact, harbour the Queensland fruit fly, which are becoming an ever increasing threat to Victorian fruit production.

The following quote is taken from the Burke's Backyard website - https://

www.burkesbackyard.com.au/fact-sheets/in-the-garden/flowering-plants-shrubs/flowering-plum-blossom/: "These trees are grown for their flowers and rarely produce fruit however they should be checked after the main flowering time to see if any fruit has formed. If fruit has formed, clip it off. Fruit that is overlooked on ornamental trees (such as peaches) can become infected by pests such as

Queensland fruit fly. So, despite it not being edible, it may still produce fruit which could in turn harbour insect pests. In addition fruit that remains on a tree can produce fungal spores which then infest other trees. Do not leave fruit lying around. Put it in a bag and into the garbage bin." I understand that people are planting all sorts of fruit trees in their own gardens, but these street trees are much less likely to be monitored in the same way. Can the council guarantee that the plums on these trees will be harvested and thoroughly monitored in a timely manner? It seems to me that a much simpler and less costly idea would be to not plant these trees in the first place.

FLUTTERBIES OR BUTTERFLIES

Well after a few warm days and nights, you will have seen the white butterflies milling over bushes looking like they are receiving electric shocks.

In the evening, I see them hanging from grasses and flowers suspended in sleep.

While I may say White butterfly you may say Cabbage Moth! We can differ in opinion and name. But if you are a gardener, it may send you into a frenzy - on watch for their green caterpillars on the green vegetables in your plot.





Spot the butterfly

Sitting in a gully in the bush one Spring, I was amazed to see a continuous stream of White butterflies using it like a freeway. They were on a mission!

Our Spring has been a bit disrupted this season so it has affected our insects as many other things.

While most butterflies may be showy in colouring, many moths have subtle shades. But moths are very important in the fertilizing process as they work both day and night. Many plants open their flowers at night specifically to attract moths.

So when you may have a low opinion of the 'Common moth', rethink about their purpose. In their short life helping to play a role in the plants life cycle and our food chain.

CAT TRAPS

In March our Animal Control Team will commence setting traps to capture feral cats, starting with the Dundas Road area in Maryborough.

To reduce feral colonies, captured cats are checked for microchips, desexing

and registration, then returned to owners or placed in the pound for observation. Feral animals can cause disease outbreaks in domestic pet populations, while also impacting native animal populations.

To ensure animal welfare, traps are set in the evening and then checked the following morning.

Unregistered animals may attract a fine for owners.

BRINGING MUSIC TO OUR REGION

"If Music be the food of love, then play on..." - Shakespeare

It is exactly this passionate Love of Music and particularly of Local "Live Music" that fueled a group of musicians who simply "wanted to do something for local music" to form the Goldfields Music Club. It all started simply in 2018 with casual Friday Music

It all started simply in 2018 with casual Friday Music Nights at Pete's Bistro in Dunolly which was short-lived when Covid struck. In September 2021, a collective voted to form the Dunolly Music Group which eventually morphed into the Goldfields Music Club Inc. (GMC) at an informal meeting outside the Welcome Stranger Café in March 2022.

The Goldfields name is a more accurate reflection of the Club as the dedicated audience at their gigs are coming from far and wide; and allows GMC to provide

a "turn-key" working structure for music performances, events and festivals. This ensured no need for personal equipment by musicians at gigs as the group provides required equipment such as PA's, microphones etc.

Chris explains, "We all love playing music, and socializing at gigs with good people. I've been playing for a long time and have all this experience and knowledge to pass on."

"We're always improving as a player by playing music." added Kez.

Natalie agreed, "There is also a symbiotic relationship between our audience and musicians."

Sue concluded, "Our group is across two Shires, we go out to the community and give people somewhere to go to listen to music or play music and where they can afford a meal."

Nine currrent GMC Committee members including Chris Jobson (Bass), Kath Walker (banjo & singer), Andy Ball and Natalie Conlin (both guitar & singers), Kez Jongebloed (guitar, drums, harmonica, mandolin, ukelele) and Sue Hayman (percussion & singer) plus Ray (the Phantom) Higgins were members of the original group.



GMC is easily Identified by a distinctively, striking logo designed by musician Melinda Traves (from Two Little Fish Graphic Design) who visually married "the old and the new" featuring an antique microphone and a guitar crossed over by a mandolin.

GMC gigs are very casual, laid back with no or low cover charge with cheap meals from \$10 BBQ, \$1 Dim Sims, so punters have something to eat while drinking and enjoying the music. With recent cancellations of large music events such as "Groovin' The Moo", smaller, more local events have taken up the mantle of providing live music to local communities in the regions. Previously, live music was regularly held at RSL Halls which have now gone the way of Pokies, the GMC serves a vital purpose of continuing live gigs at more intimate local venues and events.



The Club aims to have a "GMC on Tour" performing circuit and looks to engage with youth by mentoring and workshops—providing advice on playing, learning about equipment such as mixing desks. stage craft etc. For 2024, GMC will be re-launching a new, bigger Vibes on Broadway, Dunolly's Street Festival. For GMC to provide these music events and opportunities, they need volunteer help. There are various ways to help at once-off event gigs or on a more regular basis AND having fun whilst volunteering. GMC is CES accredited for volunteers.

Our last four batters tried their best and were able to play some amazing shots without much success as Colts were definitely on in the field.


The team effort was there and this was one of the strongest batting displays of the season, unfortunately Colts were the better team restricting us to 123 - 4 runs short . **Well done all.**
