Local Veteran Grants Program

TICTORIAN COMMUNITY RECOGNISES THE SERVICE OF LOCAL VETERANS

Local organisations in northwest Victoria have received funding to commemorate the service and sacrifices of local veterans through the latest round of the Albanese Government's Saluting Their Service (STS) Commemorative Grants Program.

Successful applicants in the Mallee include Redcliffs/ Irymple RSL and the Rural City of Mildura.

Across Australia, more than \$1 million in grant funding will be shared amongst 90 successful applicants.

Minister for Veterans, Natalie Suleyman MP: said "Victoria is grateful for the great sacrifice of our servicemen and women. Recognising their service and contribution through local, community driven projects such as these ensures their stories will never be forgotten."

Minister for Veterans and Defence Personnel, Matt Keogh added, *"Saluting Their Service grants support local communities undertake projects that recognise and commemorate the service and sacrifice of our Defence personnel, veterans and their families."*

MOSQUITO DISEASE PREVENTION

The risk of mosquito-borne diseases is highest in October to late April in Victoria, as mosquito numbers peak.

Mosquito-borne diseases include Japanese encephalitis (JE). JE is a rare but potentially serious infection of the brain caused by a virus that can spread to humans through mosquito bites.

The best way to prevent mosquito-borne diseases is to avoid mosquito bites.

- Cover up wear long, loose-fitting, light-coloured clothing as mosquitoes can bite through tight clothing.
- Use mosquito repellents containing picaridin or DEET on all exposed skin. Apply over the top of sunscreen and reapply after swimming or sweating.
- Limit outdoor activity if lots of mosquitoes are about.
- Remove stagnant water where mosquitoes can breed around your home or campsite.
- On holidays make sure your accommodation is fitted with mosquito netting or screens.
- Remember the kids always check the insect repellent label. On babies, you might need to spray or rub repellent on their clothes instead of their skin. Avoid applying repellent to the hands of babies or young children.
- Use 'knockdown' fly sprays and plug-in repellent devices indoors.

STS is an ongoing national grants program aimed at honouring the history of Australia's Defence personnel, veterans, and their families.

Applications for the next round of STS grants are open now, until 20 June 2024.

Grants are available to a wide range of applicants, including ex-service organisations, community groups, schools and local councils.

STS Grants come in two categories: Community Grants: Up to \$10,000 for local, communitybased commemorative activities.

Major Grants: Between \$10,001 and \$150,000 for significant commemorative projects with national, state, territory, or regional impact.

- Mosquito coils can be effective in small outdoor areas where you gather to sit or eat.

Vaccination: -

Be prepared – JE is a rare but serious infection. Vaccination can protect you.

If you are going to high-risk areas for seasonal work, you are eligible to have a free JE vaccination, regardless of Medicare status.

Eligibility: - JE vaccine is free for eligible Victorians, visit your GP or local immunisation provider.

Please note, while the vaccine is free-of-charge. Some providers may charge an administration or consultation fee.

Be sure to check if this applies to you, especially if you live or work at properties with pigs, or are going to high-risk areas for seasonal work.


In a world first in 2024, Telstra is partnering with the event to provide internet and mobile phone coverage.





New breast cancer screening clinic opens in Maryborough

reastScreen Victoria and Maryborough District Health Service (MDHS) recently announced the opening of the new Maryborough Breast-Screen Clinic.

Located at 75-87 Clarendon Street, Maryborough, within the medical imaging department at Maryborough Hospital. It has a designated waiting area, and is run by caring and qualified woman radiographers

According to BreastScreen Victoria CEO Rita Butera, the new clinic will enable women aged 50 to 74 to get easy access to a breast screen (mammogram) which is recommended every two years.

"A new permanent clinic in the heart of town allows women in the Central Goldfields region to get access to breast screens at a time convenient to them all year round."

"Women no longer need to wait two years for the mobile screening service to return to town, or travel to regional centres such as Ballarat or Bendigo to get a breast screen." said Ms Butera.

MDHS CEO Nickola Allan said the new clinic, expected to complete around 1,000 breast screens a year, is part of a long term plan to expand women's health services. "The participation rate for women in the Central

Goldfields for women aged 50-74 years is around 49% [49.1%], which is lower than state average. Our goal is to increase participation rates to at least 55 % in the next few years, consistent with the Victorian state-wide target," Ms Allan said.

BreastScreen Victoria provides free 10 minute breast screens to women and trans and gender diverse people aged 50 to 74 with no breast symptoms, every two years.




