# **Recent Storm Clean-Up Effort Continues**

ork to clean up the destruction caused by Tuesday's severe storm event is continuing across the Central Goldfields Shire.

High winds up to 130km/h were recorded during the storm, along with rain and temperatures of 38<sup>0</sup> lashing the Shire. The storm damage was widespread with hundreds of fallen branches and power outages. Council's Recovery Officer is available to residents who feel they may need further assistance.

Meanwhile, tree and debris clean-up is continuing. We ask the community to be patient as Council's Operations team work through debris and tree removal to ensure roads, parks and gardens are clear for community safety.

It is expected the clean-up will take around four weeks to complete with Council calling on contractors to expediate the process.

Residents are reminded to please take care around trees and roads over the coming weeks as this work is carried out — overhanging branches may be a safety risk.

Council asks the community to be patient with our Customer Service team as they work through a backlog of work due to high number of calls. Central Goldfields Shire Mayor Cr Liesbeth Long said she was proud of the way the community had responded to the storm event.

"I'd like to extend my thanks to all Council staff involved in responding – from our Emergency staff, operations teams and customer service – you have all done a brilliant job and we thank you for your efforts. "I'd also like to extend my gratitude to Maryborough SES and the wonderful volunteers who support this service, our local Victoria Police officers for their contribution and to the community members and local farmers who have also supported to clear trees and debris from roads to ensure our road network could be restored as soon as possible."

All municipal councils play an important role in the event of an emergency. They facilitate emergency management planning at the local level and are responsible for coordinating relief and recovery support for affected communities.

### NOTE:

Residents needing support in their clean-up efforts can access vouchers for FREE green waste disposal at Council's transfer stations at 22 Nolan Street, Maryborough between 9am and 4pm on weekdays until Friday 23 February.

# Tech Talk

Your passwords should be different for everything you sign up to e.g. Email, Facebook, YouTube etc. Keep yourself and your data safe and DO NOT SHARE your passwords.

Make sure your recovery information, such as your phone number and backup email address, are up to date - if they are not, you may lose access.

### **Password Management**

Subscription to LastPass. LastPass is a password management tool that integrates with just about all web browsers. There are even android and IOS versions.

Of course, LastPass isn't the only password management tool on the block, and **both Google Chrome and Microsoft Edge have built in password management tools that are very good**.

They both work best with their respective online accounts (Google Account for Chrome and Microsoft account for Edge) and they are very much, well worth looking at. Bitwarden, Keepass, Padloc are all opensource (opensource means the software is available for anyone to review) and offer both free and paid versions. How does Chrome and Edge protect your passwords?

Well, all you need to do is have a password or PIN on your device and the password databases are then encrypted. Any miscreants who get hold of your device and try to bypass or reset the password/PIN without knowing the original password/PIN, won't get access to the encrypted password database. If your password has been compromised it will alert you.



### **WORLD DAY OF PRAYER**

Theme: I beg you...bear with one another in love

Dear Editor,

The World Day of Prayer is an ecumenical movement inspired by the motto "informed Prayer and Prayerful Action." We follow the example of Jesus Christ, who prayed from a place of knowledge and care for the world, and who acted from a place of prayer and connection to God.

The World Day of Prayer, as an international, interchurch organization, enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world, their hopes, concerns and prayers. WDP is celebrated in over 170 countries on the 1<sup>st</sup> Friday of March each year.

An ecumenical group of Palestinian Christian women have prayed and reflected together ,over the past several years, to respond to the invitation to write the 2024 program.

Their theme is "I Beg You...Bear With One Another in Love" and is based on Ephesians 4:1-7.

This program calls us to bear with each other in love, despite all difficulties and oppression.

The Palestinian Christian women who wrote this worship service have invited the world to pray for peace, justice and freedom of religion and freedom of movement.

Their prayers specifically call us to pray with women, refugees, person experiencing homelessness, and all who are sick, dying and grieving.

They also call us to confess to our collective role in causing the climate crisis, and to commit to repairing what we have destroyed.

Finally, they call us, the global church, to be united in treating all with justice and love.

This program was developed entirely in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Taking on the responsibility of being a "right" country is always a rigorous journey, but it was particularly difficult given the changed realities of a world suffering under a global pandemic. We are grateful to our Palestinian Christian sisters for navigating this process with grace and patience.



### **New Rural Roads Technology To Save Time And Costs**

ew road assessment technology for regional and rural roads promises significant time and cost savings for asset\_owners such as regional and rural councils.

Tasked with tackling challenging road damage, exacerbated by floods, a new car-mounted technology has been designed to make detection and repair management up to 10 times more efficient and provide the evidence they need to access crucial disaster relief funding.

Western Project Services (WPS), an RSK Group company, is an infrastructure project management consultancy and has launched a car-mounted camera technology to help councils get pre- and post-disaster evidence to secure State Government disaster relief funding. How does it work

The system takes high definition photos every 10 metres at speeds of up to 100 km per hour. In-built laser profilometer technology records the depth of road defects and a roughness sensor gauges irregularities on the road pavement.

A dual-band GPS sensor accurately records the location to geographically link all data. A 360 degree camera system is also available for specialised applications.

Councils can also download data onto other devices for field work. The analysis software links all the



data together in a GIS environment, and can be viewed and analysed through the free issued software. The software is not subscription-

The software is not subscriptionbased and sits only on the user's systems.

WPS spokesperson and Engineering and Contracting Operations Director for RSK Australia Dion Killiby said: "The system captures in-depth road conditions by taking photos every 10 metres at speeds of up to 100 km per hour, allowing condition data to be obtained at normal traffic speeds.

It includes laser profilometer technology to record the depth of road defects and a roughness sensor to gauge irregularities on the road pavement.

A dual-band GPS sensor accurately records the location and road condition features."

He said this information provided vital data and evidence for councils seeking disaster relief funding.

Mr Killby added that traditionally, council staff would physically inspect the road to take photographs, then log that information manually on their computer, including GPS coordinates.

The new system offers a safer and faster alternative because staff don't need to get out of their cars to collect the data.

Once they've collected the data, staff can download it in the office using a safe desktop environment to conduct their defect assessment work.







### STORM RECOVERY

Following storms this week, we have a lot of debris lying around across our Shire, along with varying degrees of damage.

Our Disaster Recovery Committee wishes to advise those impacted by the storms to:

- Contact the SES for emergency assistance with damage on private property
- Contact Council directly for damage to public property

Our Ops Team is working hard to clean up, especially in our parks and gardens which suffered significant damage. The walking paths around Lake Victoria and Princes Park have now been re-opened.

To help the community with their clean-up efforts, we have free tip vouchers for those impacted by storms, to assist with disposal of green waste. The vouchers are available in person from our Customer Service Centre, 22 Nolan Street, Maryborough. **Ends Friday 23rd February.** 



### **SAFETY CHATS**

Our Local Laws Team have asked that parents speak with children about ensuring they use school crossings whenever possible.

School crossing areas are generally much safer due to the reduced speed limits surrounding them. Young people should be reminded to dismount from bikes, and to avoid using mobile phones when crossing. Parents and carers are also asked to use crossings when around schools, to set a good example in front of younger children, even if accompanying them back to a vehicle.

### PEACH AND GINGER CHUTNEY

1.6 kg peaches; 85g peaches; 2 large onions; 6 garlic cloves; 3 small dried red chilies

5 cm piece fresh ginger; 510gm mixed dried fruit (apricots and raisins); 4 cups cider vinegar

680g light brown sugar.

Yields 1.8-2.2kg of chutney.

### DIRECTIONS

- Immerse peaches in boiling water and peel. Chop the flesh and discard the pits.
- Chop the onions. Crush the garlic and chilies. Finely grate the ginger.
- Put the peaches, onions, garlic and dried fruit in a pot. Stir in the chilies, ginger and vinegar. Stir in the sugar.
  Bring slowly to a boil over low heat,
- Bring slowly to a boil over low heat, stirring occasionally. Once the sugar has dissolved, increase the heat and simmer for 30-40 minutes until thick, stirring often.

Ladle the chutney into jars and seal.

Some of our workers have had to hide their own sticks in order to ensure they are not sold.


Op Shop has many other health aids and devices for sale. Walkers, commodes, bottles, trays, to name a few.

# The main topic of this week has been the scary weather on Tuesday.

Dunolly seems to have missed the worst of it, but places close by were not so lucky.

I went in to Maryborough on Friday and was surprised at the lack of damage on the way in. There is a huge tree down at the reserve near the tennis courts and branches down further out. There was a heap under the tree I often stop under for my after shopping coffee .

# Safer Jet Skiing—"Cool your jets"



Whilst the weather starts to hot up again, Jet skiers are being urged to "cool your jets" this summer.

The Safe Transport Victoria program backed by a joint - agency compliance operation aims to change the behaviour of the small number of jetski riders who don't follow the speed limits in place to protect swimmers and other recreational boaters.

The simple message to "cool your jets when riding a jet ski" means slowing down to 5 knots when within 50 metres of other jet skis, other vessels and swimmers.

Kate Maheras, Interim Director Maritime Safety, Safe Transport Victoria said, "'The 'Cool your Jets' program will help create a safer, more positive experience for everyone out on the water.

Jet ski riders should cool their jets and ride safely when near other boaters, swimmers and the shoreline. It's easy to follow the 5-knot rule — if there is a visible wake behind your jet ski, then you're going faster than 5 knots."

A 5-knot speed limit also exists close to the shoreline with rules for different types of waterways.

On coastal and enclosed waters the speed limit applies within 200 metres of the shore, on bayside beaches at the southern end of the Mornington

Peninsula it's 500 metres, and on most inland waters it's 50 metres.

The joint-agency operation by Safe Transport Victoria, Victoria Police, and Parks Victoria will see compliance officers out on the water throughout this summer making sure jet ski riders do the right thing.

"Parks Victoria is working with the Victorian Water Police and Safe Transport Victoria, monitoring and responding to illegal, poor and unsafe rider behaviours in the Bays. Please be considerate of other waterway and beach users and stay safe.

Parks Victoria rangers will be on the water over summer to issue infringements to people behaving irresponsibly around other waterway users and marine mammals." added Graeme Davis, Parks Victoria District Manager.

Boating and swimming zones were established by Parks Victoria between 2010 and 2016 that create swimming-only and boating-only zones within Port Phillip Bay, to allow all recreational waterway users an opportunity to safely enjoy the water.

Boaters and jet skiers must know all the rules that apply to the waters they're on.

Safe Transport Victoria will provide behaviour change materials to jet skiers through social media, online communications, and at in-person activation events across the summer.
