

News MARYBOROUGH HOSPITAL MAJOR MILESTONE

he major \$115 million redevelopment and expansion of Maryborough Hospital is one step closer with the Victorian Government's project now topped out.

Member for Ripon Martha Haylett recently announced the new hospital structure has officially reached its maximum height, with the completion of the last concrete slab at level two.

"The massive redevelopment of the Maryborough hospital will make sure our community has access to the very best care, close to home."

"It will also deliver world-class facilities for our hardworking local nurses and doctors to work in." Ms Haylett said.

Minister for Health Infrastructure Mary-Anne Thomas added, "A bigger and better hospital will provide the community with access to the best care and treatment closer to home, reducing the need to travel for healthcare."

Upon completion later this year, the redeveloped hospital will include a new urgent care centre, two operating theatres and recovery spaces, a day medical centre with imaging, pharmacy and pathology

STUDENT BROADBAND PROGRAM

o you know about the Australian Government's School Student Broadband Initiative (SSBI) powered by NBN Australia?

The program has been extended, giving new families until 31 December 2024 to sign up. Act fast, and you could enjoy nearly two school years of free internet until December 31, 2025!

If you are already connected via the program, your free internet will automatically continue until the end of 2025.

Eligibility:

- Have a child living at home that is enrolled in an Australian school.
- Do not currently have an active NBN network internet service at home (having a mobile internet service does not affect eligibility).
- Live in premises that can access the NBN network through a standard connection.
- Have not had an active NBN connection during the previous 14 days.

Support from the National Referral Centre:

- Eligibility checks the National Referral Centre team will assess the family's need and check their residential address against the eligibility criteria.
- Call back, webchat and interpreting services are available for families and organisations.

services, consultant suites and additional car parking.

Featuring a new 32-bed inpatient and maternity unit, the completed hospital will ensure more local women have the option to give birth in Maryborough, closer to their family and support networks.

The modern design and layout will also improve patient flow and deliver a safer and more efficient workplace for staff and better care for patients – giving the hardworking doctors and nurses the facilities they need to treat an additional 4,000 patients every year.

The bigger and better hospital will also expand access to improved primary and community health services, helping locals get the care and treatment they need, leading to better health outcomes.

The redevelopment adds to the Victorian Government's investment in the Maryborough's health services – with a \$4 million accommodation hub for healthcare students and trainees having opened in December.

\$4.3 million was also invested in a new Support Services Hub, that once open, will expand the logistics capabilities for Maryborough and District Health Service.

DUNOLLY TOWN CRIERS

unolly, like many towns in England at the time, had a Town Crier. This was often a council appointed position but not all towns had them dressed in their local regalia. The Town Crier in Dunolly would put up posters for events and walk around the streets with a bell vociferously asserting the merits of one business over another or a performance coming up at the Town Hall. Then the next week he was paid to say the other business was better.

William Fitzgerald better known as 'Old Fritz' was the Town Crier from 1856 to 1861.



He was also an actor on the stage at various venues in Dunolly. His demise came in March 1861 when he was declared a dangerous lunatic and sent to Castlemaine. Thomas Mawson was the next Town Crier. This was 1862 to 1865. He went by the name of 'Bolivar'. As well as **Town Crier bill poster** and bellman Mawson would also sell items on commission and act as

an auctioneer.

Mawson was also in the Dunolly Amateur Dramatic Club and Dunolly Fire Brigade. He had been born in England c1839 and after retiring from his position lived at Stawell, Orville and Donald. In 1882 he got 14 days in Maryborough Gaol for insulting language.

ohn Lopas was the final Town Crier for Dunolly. He was known locally as 'Stentorian Lopas' on account of his loud voice.

John White Lopas with his wife Elizabeth and four young children arrived in Victoria in 1853. He was a newsagent at Burnt Creek before moving to Dunolly as the town crier.

They had a weatherboard house at 66 Broadway which had one room that they used as a wine saloon. John Lopas died in Dunolly in 1891 aged 81 but had retired as town crier several years earlier.

MAYORAL COLUMN So much happening at the Deledio Recreation Reserve in Dunolly, both physically and behind the scenes at Council and Deledio Reserve Sports Committee meetings. Two weeks ago, 230 cubic metres of concrete was poured

for the new netball courts over two days.

There's a curing period of 28 days before the acrylic surfacing can then be applied. During this time, there will be installation of footpaths, shelters, drainage, LED lighting and much more. This project is jointly funded at nearly \$1M (\$727,707 from the Victorian Government and \$242,293 from Council). Completion will hopefully be in May, weather permitting!

At last month's Council meeting it was recommended that we support an application to the Sport and Recreation Victoria's (SRV) Regional Community Sports Infrastructure Fund (RCSIF) for Deledio Recreation Reserve Pavilion.

This was passed unanimously by all councillors present. Upgrades to the Deledio Recreation Reserve Pavilion have been a long-standing priority for the Dunolly community, identified in the Dunolly and District Community Plan, Deledio Recreation Reserve Masterplan

and Council's Priority Projects Plan.

The existing club rooms are no longer fit for purpose and the local community envisages a complex which not only provides modern, inclusive change facilities, but which can also be used to host community events.

The costing completed as part of the concept plan's development, estimated a project budget of \$5M in 2020.

Officers have assumed a conservative escalation of approximately \$1M.

Unfortunately, the funding stream under the RCSIF, which is most appropriate for this project, has a maximum grant amount of \$1M.

Therefore, officers have investigated opportunities to undertake a prefabricated and modularised approach allowing the pavilion to be built in stages.

POOL

Works are well underway on the 25-metre indoor pool at the Maryborough Sports and Leisure Centre, with preparation of the pool shell for the new tile installation now proceeding.



The project is on track for completion late May and is thanks to funding through the Federal Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure program.

SAFER COUNTRY ROADS: HAVE YOUR SAY

R ACV is asking Victorians to provide feedback about how safe they feel on roads in regional Victoria as part of their My Country Road survey. Launched on March 26, the survey will run for six weeks.

The survey uses an online interactive map that shows high-speed roads with large concentrations of crashes causing death or serious injury in regional Victoria.

The map highlights roads with speed limits of 80km per hour or higher where there have been fatal or serious crashes for the five-year period between 2018 and 2023. Participants can provide feedback by clicking on one of the highlighted roads and filling out a survey.

Participants are also welcome to nominate another road in regional Victoria that poses a risk to drivers.

My Country Road is also an opportunity for motorists in regional Victoria to let RACV know what they think of electric vehicles, and barriers to uptake. RACV General Manager Automotive Services, Jackie Pedersen, explained how RACV is using the survey results to help make regional roads safer for all Victorians - "We will share the results with all levels of government, so we can work together to improve safety outcomes for Victorians."

Of these, 16 have seen infrastructure upgrades commence or committed to by government.

"In 2023 there were 174 deaths on regional Victorian roads, that is an almost 30% increase on the previous year. Given these tragic numbers, it is more important than ever that Victorians help us to make country roads safer by completing this year's survey.

> "Once again, we want to find out what people think of the state's most dangerous regional roads. For example, is the speed limit too high given the condition of the road? What are the potential dangers in the road design like narrow lanes, power poles or trees too close to the road? Are the roads poorly sign posted or damaged? Or are there regularly unexpected things on the road like livestock, or native animals?

"We want to gather as much data as we can to encourage the state government and local councils to make commitments that deliver safer regional roads and help save lives." Ms Pedersen said.

The survey is part of RACV's Have Your Say series to listen to Victorians and includes the RACV My Home and My Melbourne Road surveys.


