HANG UP! STOP Remote Access Scams

ustralia-wide, more than \$15 million was reported lost from 8,975 remote access scam reports in 2023, according to ScamWatch.

Remote access scams occur when fraudsters gain access to individuals' computers or devices under false pretences, resulting in financial losses.

While recent National Anti Scam Centre data shows that these hacking scams are down 10% on the same period last year, Bendigo Bank is calling for ongoing vigilance as scammers continue to evolve their tactics. "Scammers will use every trick in the book with the aim of gaining access to your phone or computer," said Bendigo Bank's Head of Customer Fraud and Scam Protection, Jason Gordon.

"Once access is granted, scammers may install malicious software, steal sensitive information, or initiate unauthorised transactions, leaving victims and their bank accounts vulnerable," 'If you did not originate the call and you're being asked for information or to enable remote access, hang up!" he said.

Almost half of all remote access scams reported to ScamWatch in 2023 were by phone, but they can also be via text, social media or email. Scammers establish trust by claiming to work for your bank, a utility company, delivery service, telecommunication services (such as NBN), or a government agency. Be wary of calls, text, emails

Be wary of calls, text, emails about online banking in which there is a request to:

- download programs or software that allow screen sharing to be enabled
- reset your password after a recent series of scam attacks
- purchase a new modem to fix your internet connection



- update your account or device with new security features, or
- provide personal details to verify your account activity.
 Note that Banks do not call to ask you to transfer funds, send money or ask for your PIN/Password.
 They will never ask you to download software or enable remote access to your devices. If you're unsure if someone claiming to be from your bank, hang up and call them directly to

To be safe, follow ScamWatch's advice:

be sure.

1. STOP – Never give money or personal information to anyone if unsure.

Scammers will offer to help you or ask you to verify who you are. They will pretend to be from organisations you know and trust like Services Australia, police, government, or a fraud service.

- 2. THINK Ask yourself could the message or call be fake?

 Never click a link in a message.

 Only contact us, businesses or government using contact information from their official website or through their secure apps. If you're not sure, say no, hang up or delete.
- **3. PROTECT** Act quickly if something feels wrong. If you notice unusual activity or if a scammer gets your money or information, contact your bank to report it and get support.



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Help Shape Our Roads

entral Goldfields Shire Council is the road authority for around 1,300km of roads and is now seeking community feedback to an updated Draft Road Management Plan 2024.

This report sets the parameters by which Council will operate the road network over the next term of Council, determining the way in which Council manages, inspects, repairs and maintains its roads.

Central Goldfields Shire Council Mayor Cr Liesbeth Long said, "Our roads do take a beating; from the significant rain events we have experienced over the past few years, as well as harvest time with heavy trucks moving grain from farm to silo.

"What many people in our community may not realise is that we manage around 1.300 kilometres of roads in our Shire. Of these, 39% are sealed, 48% are gravel and 13% are tracks. Plus, to support these roads we also have 79 bridges and 175 major culverts throughout the Shire. For a small rural council, it's a huge amount of infrastructure to maintain and the reality is roads aren't cheap to upgrade or maintain.

Residents are invited to review the Draft Road Management Plan, learn more about the road issue process, and provide feedback by Visiting:

engage.cgoldshire.vic.gov.au/ roadmanagementplan2024

Feedback is required by 5pm, Friday 10 May 2024.



What happens when a road issue is reported:

If you report a road issue, Council's Assets team will inspect it between two and 10 days (depending on the type of road).

From this inspection the issue will either:

Be rectified immediately if the defect needs intervention (as per Road Management Plan)

- Be blocked off to ensure public safety if it cannot be repaired immediately.
- Be added to programmed defect inspections program which happen "regularly (every six to 12 months depending on the type of road)"
- if the issue doesn't require. intervention immediately. Works are then scheduled if those issues or defects reach a threshold following the next routine inspection.
- If no issue or defect is found during the inspection, no works will occur and the area will be monitored through the routine defect inspections program that occurs every six to 12 months depending on the type of road.

Please note that any defects that are flood related are being handled separately.

They will perform basic to complex motor skills and movement patterns and become creative and confident according to their level of age and ability, all while having a great time.



116 golfers from across 28 teams enjoyed perfect playing conditions at Maryborough Golf Club run in partnership with True Foods and Maryborough Golf Club to raise funds for programs, services and equipment at Maryborough District Health Service.

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AVOID ELECTRICAL HOME FIRES

ictoria's fire services are calling on households to keep the safety and maintenance of their electrical equipment and appliances.

Once a house fire starts it can spread rapidly and engulf your home in a matter of minutes. By adopting fire-safe habits and reducing potential hazards there is a lot you can do to protect yourself and the people you live with.

In an average year, Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV) and Country Fire Authority (CFA) respond to more than 3,000 residential fire incidents across the state. Too many of which are preventable.

Fire Rescue Victoria Commissioner Gavin Freeman, AFSM said Victorians should be wary of overloaded power boards, phone and laptop chargers and electric blankets.

"Make sure you're not overloading power boards. Don't leave your phone charging overnight. And never put electrical appliances like hair straighteners and laptops on soft surfaces.

"Take the time to service your ducted heating and clean your range hood and oven regularly, prevention is the best policy when it comes to fire safety." he said.

For as little as \$20, households can help safeguard their homes and loved ones by purchasing and

installing affordable smoke alarms in all bedrooms, hallways and living areas.

Remember, for electrical appliances:

Using damaged electrical equipment and appliances can result in a fire. Only use appliances in good working order.

- Turn off all electrical appliances at the power point when not in use and ensure your home office is set up safely.
- Never use double adaptors.
- Only use power boards according to manufacturers' instructions, never overload or have loose cables, and check regularly for damage.
- Ensure monitors, laptops, televisions, and other equipment have good air flow around them and are not in confined spaces or covered.
- Only use certified electrical trades people to repair damaged/faulty electrical appliances, wiring or equipment.
- Do not charge electrical devices like phones and laptops on soft surfaces such as couches and beds.
- If you are going away, make sure to turn off power to electrical appliances and let a neighbour know you are away.

WOMEN IN SPORT MATTERS

new report by Victoria University (VU) researchers found that representation of women in coaching and officiating roles in community sport can challenge attitudes and positively influence gender bias among children.

Women remain significantly underrepresented as coaches and officials across community sport, which means children are denied the opportunity to see and experience women in leadership roles.

A total of 75 children (aged between four and 17) and their parents shared their first-hand experiences and attitudes of women as coaches and officials, including in Australian rules football, basketball and swimming. Of the children who provided insights into their experiences, 96 per cent had exposure to men as coaches, while only 65 per cent had exposure to women as coaches.

The report called *Shaping attitudes: Exposure to women coaches and officials influences children and parent perceptions* was funded by the Victorian Government's Office for Women in Sport and Recreation through its Change Our Game Research Grants Program.

Minister for Community Sport Ros Spence said, "Giving children the opportunity to experience women as coaches and officials in community sport brings enormous benefits. This research demonstrates how the representation of women in coaching roles within community sport can increase satisfaction and actively reshape the attitudes of both parents and young boys and girls."

The VU research team, led by Dr Kara Dadswell added "The study confirms that there is a bias among children towards linking men as being coaches and officials, rather than women. But these engrained gender roles can be shifted for both girls and boys by providing them with an opportunity to experience women as coaches and officials at an early age,".

Key findings reveal:

Previous experiences with women coaches positively influenced children's belief that women can be great coaches.

 Parental attitudes significantly influence their children's attitudes.

Girls' satisfaction levels with having a woman coach and/or official was higher than boys.

The report offers a number of recommendations for community sporting clubs to help address the lack of representation of women in coaching and official roles, including:

- Create targeted plans to attract, develop and retain women as coaches and officials
- Enlisting the assistance of parents to voice their



positive support for women in these roles, and

Supporting the representation of women fr

• Supporting the representation of women from diverse backgrounds as coaches and officials.
